## Re-Kindling The Flame: Bronco Volleyball Continues After A 40 Year Absence

Tradition in sporting events allows both the spectator and participant to connect at a deeper level with their sport. It is a way not just to connect to a sport, but also to those who made the sport great.

We hear talk about a winning tradition, but tradition is not winning or losing. It is simply tending a flame somebody else started while a storm threatens to blow it out. That is the only function of those charged with its preservation.

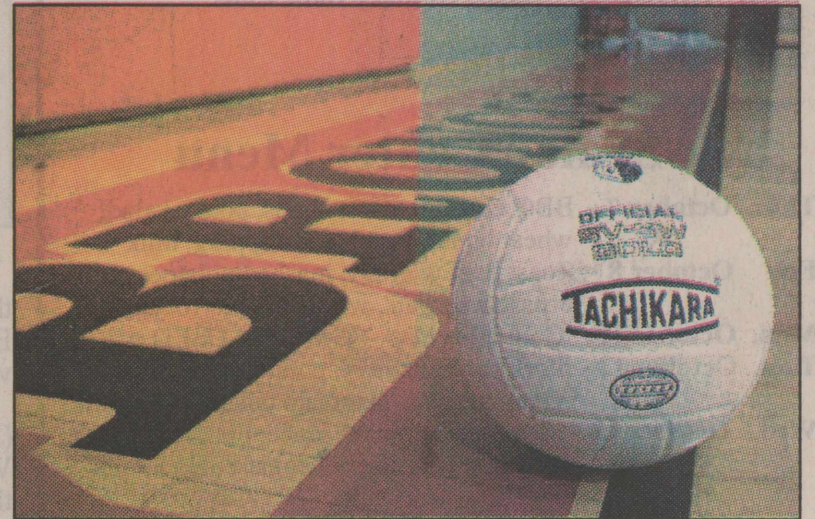
The flame of tradition never really dies, and at times recedes into smoldering coals. The coals of that tradition burn under a layer of ash until a wind of change blow the ashes off and create a fire brand. That brand floats

on the currents until it takes ground and lights a new flame, one that has the strength of the original fire but the hunger of a young one. The 2010 Sonora Volleyball program has such a flame in them.

While many Sonorans have watched their first Bronco Volleyball matches this year, the history of the sport actually began in 1947 where records indicate that was the year of the first Sonora Bronco Volleyball team. Red and White were present on the volleyball court for 5 years before it was discontinued in 1951. Eight years later it was picked up again and continued for ten years before it was suspended for over 40 years. Even with the stop-and-go history of

Bronco Volleyball there is an established winning tradition that the 2010 team can build on.

From the onset of this new sport, administrators were able to establish a coaching staff that instilled a winning mentality to their athletes. The first few seasons were overseen by Coach Scott, niece of the Baseball Hall of Fame member Tris Speaker (the Grey Eagle). In the 1950-51 season the Lady Broncos captured a district championship. The coach of that team, Jewel Pye went on to teach in the P.E. department at Angelo State University where (during her career) she influenced and educated many of the coaches found

throughout West Texas. Members of that 1951 team still reside in Sonora or continue to have strong ties with the community. Some of those names include Myrtle Mckee Armentrout, Bobbie Drennan Smith, Nancy Neill, and Nancy Eaton.

Even with the historical precedent behind them, the newest installment of Bronco Volleyball is faced with a difficult task. They are charged with building a sport from the ground up after a 40 year absence. Current High School Head Volleyball Coach Wendy Robertson commented that, "right now we are focusing on making sure that the girls know the fundamentals, and to get a good grasp of how to move around the court". Assistant Coach Jamie Waites added that, "we have now started specializing more than what we did in the beginning. During the first

few weeks everybody started at the same level (from 7th grade to high school), but now that we have some of the fundamentals down we can focus a little more on specific skill sets". The entire coaching staff works together (from high school to jr high) to build a cohesive unit, and try to build a culture around the sport.

When posed with the question as to whether Volleyball takes away from other sports in terms of athletes- coach Waites commented that, "these girls will be better conditioned through volleyball when they go to compete in other sports. If you look at the stance of these volleyball players you will see how similar it is to the defensive stances we need these girls to take in both basketball and softball". High School team

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# Diabetes Complications

If you have diabetes, you have likely been told by health professionals about the possibility of developing complications such as loss of vision, painful feet, heart attack, or stroke. Do these things really have to happen? Are complications an inevitable result of having diabetes?

Complications are not inevitable. According to diabetes experts, the most important thing you can do to reduce your risk for complications is to keep your blood glucose within the recommended ranges. Keeping your blood glucose within recommended ranges also helps you reduce the pain and discomfort of problems like nerve pain.

Keeping your blood glucose in the right ranges requires that you consistently do certain things:

- Select the right foods in the right amounts.
- Do physical activity most every day.
- Take medicines when prescribed by your doctor.
- Check your blood glucose to make sure it is staying in the recommended range.

There are other actions that can help, too, like having regular check-ups that include lab work such as a hemoglobin A1c to check your average blood glucose over the past three months, cholesterol and triglycerides, and others tests your doctor might order for you. If you are a smoker, stopping smoking signifi-

cantly reduces your risks for many diabetes complications, too. Regular check-ups also help your doctor find problems earlier when they are more treatable. Most doctors recommend you return to see them every three months if your blood glucose is out of range or every six months if you are in range. Seeing your eye doctor and dentist once a year is important, too.

Texas AgriLife Extension Service Sutton county is offering a five class series with nine topics called Do Well, Be Well with Diabetes. These classes are being taught by a team of volunteers. Come to these classes and learn how to not only make your life with diabetes easier, but how to reduce your chances for complications. Classes are free and being held on Wednesdays from 3:00 - 4:30 PM at the Civic Center. Call your county Extension office at 387-3101 to enroll now.

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### Prospects Looking Good for Texas Deer Season

AUSTIN – Texas deer hunters could be blessed with too much of a good thing this fall, at least early on, as excellent range conditions throughout the state have set the stage for what could be a season to remember.

The Texas deer hunting season opens Saturday, Oct. 2, for bowhunting and Nov. 6 for the general gun season. A special youth-only weekend season is set for Oct. 30-31. The general season runs through Jan. 2,

2011 in North Texas and Jan. 16, 2011 in South Texas. A late youth-only season is also slated for Jan. 3-16, 2011. For additional late season deer hunting opportunities, consult the 2010-11 Outdoor Annual of hunting and fishing regulations.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists equate good habitat with healthy wildlife populations and suggest you don't have to look hard to find plenty of both

this year. Timely rainfall that began last winter and continued throughout the first half of 2010 has helped maintain range conditions and provide an ideal environment for deer to flourish.

Estimates of high fawn production in most regions of the state with upwards of 100 percent fawn survival on some intensively managed ranches, coupled with quality native food supplies, should give hunters a lot to look forward to this season. It also means that like last year, hunting

over corn feeders may not be as productive because of the abundant natural forage available.

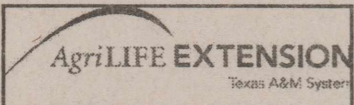
"Acorn crops have been pretty good and there is plenty of vegetation in South Texas, so the deer have plenty to eat," said Alan Cain, TPWD whitetail deer program director. "That's going to make it difficult for bowhunters to attract deer to supplemental feeding locations."

TPWD field biologists are concerned last year's drop in overall deer harvest could

carry a double-edged sword into the 2010-11 season. Nearly half of all deer taken by Texas hunters occurs in the Edwards Plateau and last season marked the lowest harvest in 10 years, attributed mainly to reduced deer movement. The upside is there should be a greater percentage of older-

aged bucks in the population due to the carry-over of bucks that weren't harvested last year. The downside is there likely are more deer in the population than the habitat in many areas can adequately support without being degraded when range conditions return to normal.

### Home Horticulture Tips for October

Fall is finally here, and the weather is becoming slightly cooler. Though many will put up their gardening tools, there are still plenty of "opportunities" for chores in the home landscape. Let's talk about a few.

Now is a perfect time to add a new tree or a grouping of shrubs to the landscape. Or perhaps you have an area in the landscape that needs 'remodeling' or rejuvenating. The fall may be the best season to plant, surpassing even the spring.

Many people prefer January through March for planting, but the fall months of September through December have distinct advantages. Fall planting follows the heat of summer, before a cool winter season, and trees and shrubs planted in the fall use this to good advantage. Plant roots grow anytime the soil temperature is 40 degrees or

higher, which may occur all winter for us. During the winter months, the root systems of the fall-planted specimens develop and become established. When spring arrives, this expanded root system can support and take advantage of the full surge of spring growth.

Fall is the optimum time to plant balled and burlapped trees and shrubs. Balled and burlapped plants have ample time to recover from transplanting and proliferate roots before spring growth begins. Remember, however, all bare root plants, including roses and pecan and fruit trees, should be planted in late winter when they are completely dormant.

**Be On The Lookout:**  
October is a good time to reduce the insect and disease potential in next year's garden. Cleanup the garden, pulling up all annuals that have completed their life cycle. Remove the tops of all herbaceous perennials that have finished flowering or as soon as frost has killed the leaves.

Fungal Blackspot is often a problem with roses in the fall. Weekly application of fungicides can help keep the foliage healthy and provide an outstanding fall bloom season.

**Miscellaneous Chores:**  
Start collecting leaves for the compost pile. Be sure to have extra soil. Always wet the layer of leaves thoroughly before adding the soil. Add about one pound of complete lawn or garden fertilizer to each layer of leaves to provide the necessary nitrogen for decomposition.

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To determine if there are pipelines in the area where excavation is planned, look for pipeline markers at nearby roads, railroads and fences. Don't try to guess the route or location of the pipeline. Call the pipeline company toll free at the number shown on the marker at least 48 hours before you dig. They will send a representative to mark the exact location, route and depth of the pipeline at no charge.

**You may also dial 811 anywhere in the state and you will be connected to a one call agency.**

### WHAT TO DO IF YOU ARE DIGGING AND DISTURB A PIPELINE

Even if you cause what seems to be only minor damage to the pipeline, notify the pipeline company immediately. A gouge, scrape, dent or crease to the pipe or coating may cause a future break or leak. It is imperative that the pipeline owner inspect and repair any damage to the line.

### HOW TO RECOGNIZE A PIPELINE LEAK

**LOOK** - A pool of liquid on the ground, a white cloud or fog, persistent bubbling in standing water, or discolored vegetation are signs of a possible leak. Fire or explosion occurring near a pipeline facility should be reported.

**LISTEN** - Listen for any unusual noise like a hissing or roaring sound.

**SMELL** - Notice any unusual odor.

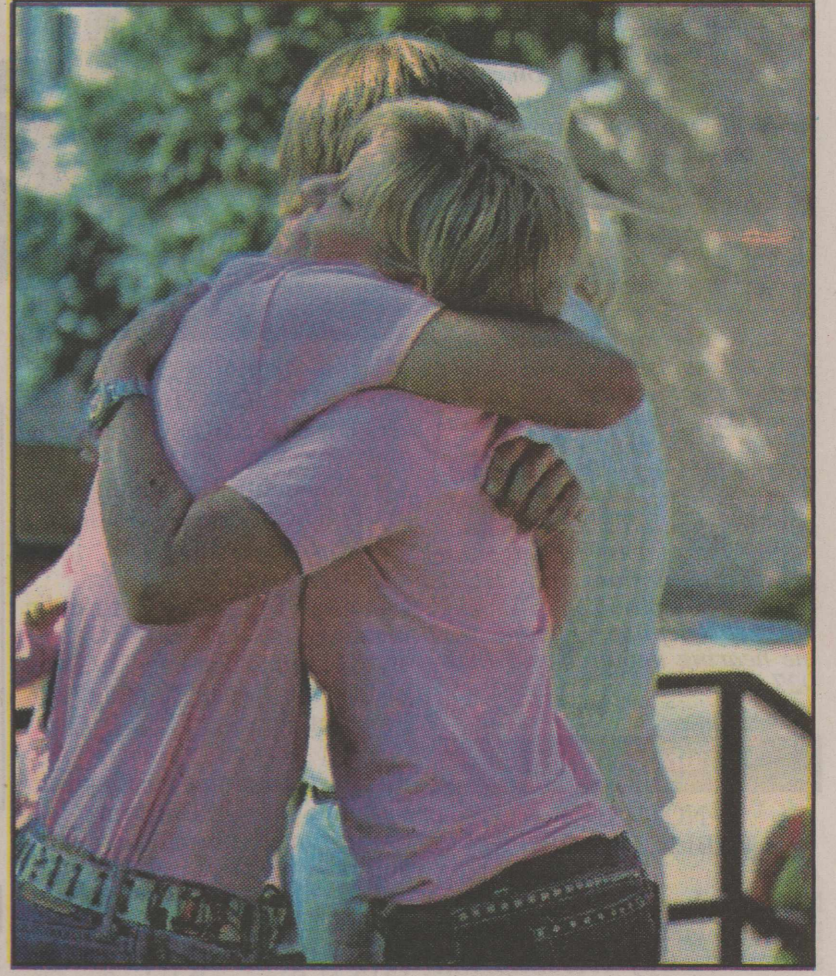
