CITY COUNCIL DRIVES FOR THE GREEN: Votes to Invest in Golf Course

The regular meeting of the Sonora city council was called to order at 6:00 p.m. by Mayor Pro-Tem Sam David Hernandez. The first item on the agenda was a presentation of the Sonora Police Department where Chief Jarrett introduced the new fully staffed police department. Chief commented that this was the first time in 6 years since the City of Sonora had a full staff of police officers. That staff includes long term Sonora resident Bryn Humphreys, SISD graduate Matt Routh, Judy Guterrez, and the department's chaplain Father Chris Roque. The new additions to the department are 10 year veteran of the Lubbock Police Department Chris Fox, and first year law enforcement officer Gabriel Aredondo.

After a presentation by Tom Ratson (representative from Texas Energy), Council Member Neal made a motion

to move agenda item 6-D, Council Member Wamble seconded the motion. Item 6-D (requested by Two Pro Management Co.) included a "discussion and action on the request of Two Pro Management and the Board of Sonora Golf Club for the City Council to amend the 2010-2011 budget to include funds to cover irrigation pump electricity in the amount of \$15,000".

Kevin Collins (from Two Pros management) made his case before the council stating that, "we came to Sonora and looked at the profit and loss statements for the golf course, and at first tried to determine if Sonora could benefit from a management company. After [several meetings with community members] it was determined that a relationship between us and Sonora would benefit all parties involved. We [Two Pros Management]

Community and School Work Together To Inspire Students

Sonora High School and Sonora Middle School hosted their first Career Day on October 13th. Teachers stepped away from the front of their classrooms to make room for community members, as well as volunteers from the surrounding area and military branches, to teach the students about their professions.

The high school students were addressed by Bob Malone, the current President and CEO of The First National Bank of Sonora and who formerly served as an Executive Vice President of BP p.l.c. and was the Chairman and President of BP America Inc. from July 2006 until April 2009. Mr. Malone, who is a graduate of a small Texas high school like Sonora, encouraged the students to explore the many career opportunities available to them. The middle school

students had the opportunity to hear from Russell Dempsey, a 2000 graduate from Sonora High School Gowho has gone on to receive a degree in Wildlife Biology from Texas A&M University and is currently working with UTSA and the State of Texas doing consulting in rural areas in economic development.

In addition to these general assemblies, the students attended 4 break-out sessions of their choosing out of the 38 career topics offered. A very diverse array of professions were represented, including such areas as Business Management, Cave Studies, Health Care, different aspects of Law Enforcement, Photography, Professional Fishing, and Restaurant Management. THE THRILLA WITH THE 'DILLOS 7 AND 0 BRONCOS

During Coach's Corner last week on KHOS, Coach Sine said that the Broncos would be facing a San Saba team that played very much like the Sonora Broncos. The numbers show just how correct he was in his analysis of the Armadillos. The Broncos threw the ball 18 times, as did the Dillos. Sonora rushed the ball 40 times while San Saba carried the pigskin 38 times. We punted twice for a 26-yard average and they punted twice for a 31-yard average. The Broncos had five scoring drives while the Armadillos had four scoring drives one of which was a 37-yard field goal.

San Saba won the toss and elected to defer to the second half much to the delight of the Broncos and their fans. San Saba's Diego Gonzalez blasted the opening kickoff out of the back of the end zone for the touchback. Ethan Morriss opened the game with a 21-yard completion to Cadesman Pope. Two Morriss runs moved the Broncos into Dillos territory at their 48-yard line. Zach Badeaux on a run and Braxton Snyder with a reception moved the chains again. Morriss ran twice more through holes opened by the Bronco line to make it first down at their 14-yard line. On third down, the Dillos chased Morriss out of the pocket. On the run, he threw to Word Hudson who was thrown out of bounds at the three yard line setting up a first and goal. After a sweep by Badeaux to the half-foot line, Morriss scored on a quarterback sneak through the hole opened by Coyer Dermody and Lino Villaneuva. Dallas

Payne took the PAT snap and tossed it to Imoni Cross who ran to his left. Just as it appeared that he would score, Gary Gant, who came from the right side of the line, made a shoestring tackle preventing the PAT. The score was 6 to 0 with 6:25 left in the quarter. The Broncos used 10 running plays and two passing plays to cover the 80 yards. The drive certainly appeared to be easy. But the 'Dillos proved to be a formidable opponent.

Clayton Perry returned Jorge Gaytan's kickoff to the 25-yard line where he was solo tackled by Eric Santana. Zach Davis broke through the Bronco line on the counter play for a 14-yard gain to their 39-yard line. Quarterback Ryan Pannell completed his first pass to Perry, and running back Gant had a big gain to the Bronco 26-yard line. After a sweep to the right and a sweep to left, Jack Whitten made it to the Bronco three-yard line on the third consecutive sweep play. Gant scored the touchdown on a sweep to the left. Gonzalez kicked the PAT, and the Dillos claimed the lead by one at 7 to 6 with 1:55 left in the first quarter. Their drive covered 81-yards in 9 rushing plays and one completion. The 'Dillos had made corrections after their early season losses.

San Saba forced a three and out. After an unusual short punt by Clayton Parks, the Dillos had good field position. The Bronco defense led by Gaytan, Damon Evans, Sam Powers, and Payne pretty much stopped the Dillos' running plays. So, Pannell threw to Luke Cox get-

ting the ball near the Broncos 20-yard line. But the Bronco defense stiffened. Three plays later, Gonzalez kicked a 36-yard field goal to increase their lead to 10 to 6 with 9:57 left in the first half. The Dillos didn't find anything easy about this 32-yard scoring drive that lasted seven plays.

Santana returned the kickoff for 15 yards. After a short completion to Cross and a short run by Santana, Morriss completed a 20-yard pass to Pope for a first down at the 46-yard line. Morriss faked a short pass to Hudson, and then threw deep to Pope moving the ball to the San Saba seven-yard line. Cross got the touchdown on a run up the middle. Cross kicked the PAT and the Broncos had the lead at 13 to 10 with 6:00 minutes left in the second quarter. This drive covered 77 yards in eight plays.

The last Dillos drive of the first half reached the Bronco 20-yard line with most of the yardage coming on two pass completions. Running back Whitten attempted a half-back pass that Shane Patlan intercepted to end the scoring threat. The half ended at 13 to 10 in favor of the Broncos.

The Broncos kicked off to start the second half, and Santana made his third consecutive solo tackle on returner Whitten after plowing past several Dillo special team players. The Bronco defense stepped up and forced the Dillos to punt. Two runs by Badeaux moved the chains. Two plays later, facing third and two from the Dillos' 45-yard line, Morriss rolled to his

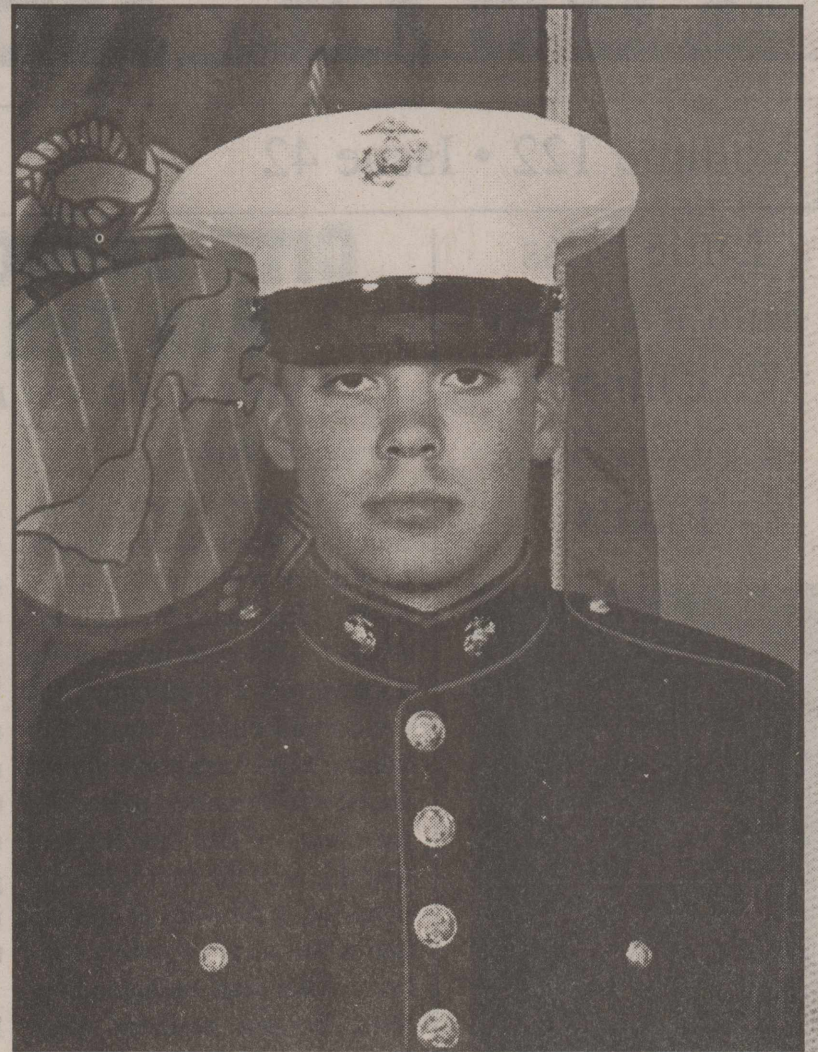

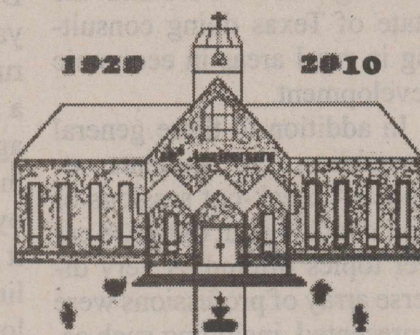

Workshop Offered for Livestock, Rangeland, and Wildlife Managers

Being in the ranching business requires a producer to stay informed. Not just of management needs, but also on regulations. For example, the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) adopted revisions to Texas' cattle Trichomoniasis (Trich) program during the quar-

terly Commission Meeting on October 5. There is also new chemistry being tested on mesquite control. Predation is an on-going concern for both livestock and wildlife managers. All of those topics and more will be discussed at an October 26th Livestock, Range, and Wildlife Work-

Food Allergies

We've all heard about them: food allergies. Everyone is familiar with allergies, but how are food allergies different than other allergies? Apart from the obvious understanding that they are caused by food, food allergies can range from being moderately uncomfortable (like seasonal allergies) to suddenly life threatening (like a bee sting allergy). Food allergies are becoming more and more prevalent in our society; as such it's important to make sure we understand what they are.

Food allergies are a result of a reaction that the immune system has with certain foods. These foods stimulate immunoglobulin E, which then causes: hives, difficulty breathing, diarrhea, vomiting, and/or fainting. Serious reactions can cause shock and irregular heart beat, and can lead to death. Many individuals use the words intolerance and allergy interchangeably, but this is incorrect. Food intolerances are typically caused by a lack of proper enzymes in your body to use specific parts of food; whereas food allergies affect the immune system, and can be much more severe.

Now, not all foods are created equal. Some foods are more likely to cause an allergic reaction than others. A list of the top six foods that cause allergies are: milk, eggs, peanuts, wheat, soy, and tree nuts. It should also be known that specific food allergies are not contagious, nor are they inheritable.

However, if a parent has a food allergy, then their child has a higher risk of develop-

ing a food allergy in general (not mom or dad's specific allergy).

Unfortunately, food allergies are not curable, and the best strategy is complete avoidance. The FDA has mandated that products that contain allergenic ingredients be labeled as such, and many companies will label products that are even processed in the same building as allergenic materials. Explain to children that have allergies to not accept food from friends, explain allergies to teachers and other adults, and be prepared for accidental exposures by wearing medical alert bracelets/necklaces and carrying an epinephrine injector.

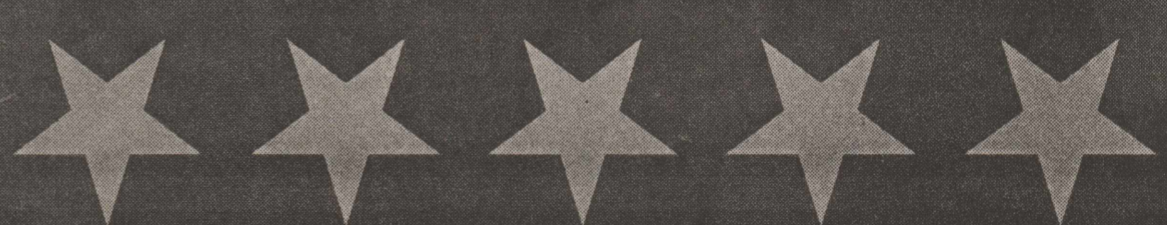

Texas Economy A Model for Other States

National Review Editor Rich Lowry credited Texas' economic policies with helping employers in the Lone Star State create more than half of the net jobs created in America over a recent 12 month period.

"Texas already looms large in its own imagination. Its elevated self-image didn't need this: More than half of the net new jobs in the U.S. during the past 12 months were created in the Lone Star State," Lowry wrote. "What does Austin know that Washington doesn't? At its simplest: Don't overtax and -spend, keep regulations to a minimum, avoid letting unions and trial lawyers run riot, and display an enormous neon sign saying, 'Open for Business.'"

Lowry said Texas' conservative, common sense fiscal principles were making the difference.

"Texas is a model of governmental restraint. In 2008, state and local expenditures were 25.5 percent of GDP in California, 22.8 in the U.S., and 17.3 in Texas. Back in 1987, levels of spending were roughly similar in these places. The recessions of 1991 and 2001 spiked spending everywhere, but each time Texas fought to bring it down to pre-recession levels."

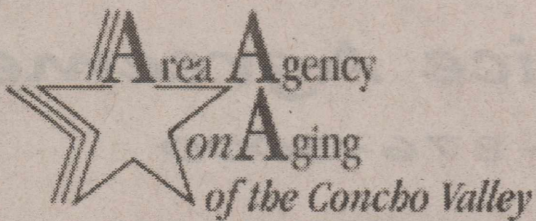

right and threw back to Pope. Pope caught the ball near the line of scrimmage and ran to the San Saba 30-yard line. The next pass completion went to Cross who caught the ball near the eleven-yard line. Morriss extended the Bronco lead to ten points on a run to his left after starting a misdirection play to the right. Cross kicked the PAT making the score 20 to 10. This drive lasted 5:14 of clock time, covering 55-yards on eleven plays.

On the ensuing kickoff, Whitten got outside of the Bronco containment and ran to the Bronco 33-yard line. Davis scored on the counter play, and Gonzalez kicked the PAT to narrow the lead once again to three points at 20 to 17 with 5:07 left in the third quarter.

Badeaux returned the kickoff to the 25-yard line. On the second play of the drive, Morriss broke through the line, started running up the field until he was approaching the sideline. He then cut back left into the middle of the field before being forced to zig back to right. He was finally tackled at the San Saba six-yard line for a gain of 66 yards. Morriss and Cross moved the ball to the one-yard

line where Morriss scored on a quarterback sneak. Cross kicked the PAT and the lead was back to ten points at 27 to 17 with 2:29 left in the third. This drive covered 77 yards in only five plays.

On the Bronco kickoff, Santana logged his fourth solo tackle on a kickoff. Just like the Broncos don't give up, San Saba responded with a 73-yard scoring drive that lasted 13 plays. Whitten got the touchdown on a three-yard run. Once again, Gonzalez boomed the PAT reducing the Broncos lead back to three at 27 to 24 with 9:36 left in the game.

Edward Garza set up the Broncos near mid-field with a nice kickoff return. San Saba stopped the Broncos and forced another Parks' punt. San Saba took over with 8:20 left in the game where another long touchdown drive could win the game for them. Powers and company stuffed their first two running plays and Pannell threw incomplete on third down. Cross returned the punt to the San Saba 43-yard line. Morriss gained 24-yards to their 21-yard line. Cross ran wide for a seven-yard gain followed by Morriss rushing to the five-yard line for a first and goal. Two

plays later, Morriss threw to Cross in the end zone, but the pass was incomplete. Facing fourth and goal, Morriss rolled to his right and threw a touchdown pass to leaping Pope. After Cross kicked the PAT, the Broncos had once again regained their two score lead at 34 to 24 with 3:09 left in the game. The final Bronco scoring drive covered 43 yards in nine plays.

Still San Saba didn't give up. However, their last chance to score ended when Hudson intercepted. The Broncos won another exciting game 34 to 24 to remain undefeated.

Morriss lead the Broncos with 326 yards of total offense scoring three touchdowns. Pope led the receivers with 95 yards on five catches and one touchdown. On defense, Payne, Santana, Hudson, and Gaytan all had four solo tackles. Gaytan lead all tacklers with 12, followed by Powers with 11, and Evans and Payne each with 10.

This week, the Broncos travel to Ozona to play the surprising Ozona Lions who have a record of 5 and 2 overall and are 2 and 0 in district play after defeating Coleman and Junction.

discovered the tax liability that had accumulated, an oversight that nobody is to be blamed for, over a couple of decades of sales tax on membership dues and golf cart shed rentals. We then negotiated a settlement with the state to pay the back taxes." Subsequent research has indicated that the golf course owed the State Comptrollers Office over \$100,000 in taxes. The agreement negotiated by Two Pros reduced that tax debt to approximately 30,000. Mr. Collins added that, "This issue was one of timing. We knew this was on the horizon-which is why we first brought it up with the City Manager in June, but we have reached the point where we are on the edge of the cliff."

The issue Mr. Collins was discussing involved the cities previous practice of paying for the electricity on the golf course's irrigation pump. "When we first looked at the profit and loss statements for the golf course that included the city paying for the electricity. After that first year, we [Two Pros] infused \$5,000 into the course to cover payroll and other expenses. We did that because we believe in this course's potential, but we need a resolution on this

matter as we go into this next year. We have been working in good faith with this course for 6 to 7 months after our contract expired. We are asking for the potential; if there is somehow the city can get us past these next two or three months where we can re-negotiate a contract that is beneficial to everyone. We are sensitive to your cities current economy, but compare it to the investment other cities have made into the golf courses we manage for them (Del Rio-\$106,000, and Winkler County Kermit -\$200,000).

After a few questions and a brief discussion Council Member Neal moved to immediately pay Two Pros Management \$15,000 out of fund balance or savings. Member Wamble seconded the motion which passed unanimously.




