



### Lee Roy Valliant



Lee Roy Valliant died Wednesday evening, December 29th in Shannon Hospital in San Angelo, Tom Green County, Texas. following heart surgery. He was born in San Angelo on December 5, 1933 to Lee Roy Valliant, Sr. and Lotia Cozby Valliant. Plans were being made to celebrate in January, the 50th wedding anniversary of Lee Roy and Beverly West Valliant, who were married January 14, 1961.

Sutton County, Texas was home for Lee Roy with the exception of a few years away for school and work. Ranching was his life. He loved every facet of it, even the challenges of drought and noxious weeds so often found in West Texas. Working constantly to make improvements on the land, he was dedicated to the future for the ranch and for his family. He also operated several businesses in Sonora and had interests in real estate. Within the last few years, when many of his friends were retiring, Lee Roy was expanding, buying and leasing more land

Sports were his greatest interest in Sonora High School until a car wreck made him a spectator instead of a participant. Then, he developed his talent for music, which became his lifetime avocation. He sang, played saxophone, guitar, banjo, mandolin, and his favorite instrument, the fiddle. It was hard to believe that his massive hands could play an instrument as small and delicate as his fiddle, but he could. His high school dance band, "The Bronco Stompers" in their brightly colored western shirts, with their embroidered yokes is still remembered by all who danced many hours to their music. In Austin, while in school, he played professionally with the Tennessee Royal Volunteers, often playing at the Continental Club and other iconic Austin venues. There were many other bands in his life through the years, but his current band was called "The Olde Time Band" or 'The Mejor que Nada Boys" (Better Than Nothing Boys). The group entertained at community functions, area nursing homes, and for their own pleasure. He also very patiently and with much success taught many children to play the guitar. His teaching was not limited to music. He shared his knowledge with others in several areas. Many driv-

ers in our area are safer because he took the time to teach them. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge of Ft. McKavett. And though he did not often participate in the Lodge activities, he believed in their principles. God was his close personal friend and they talked often. Anyone who needed help found a friend in Lee Roy. He was a man of exceptional kindness. His Irish heritage made him a grand storyteller, and he was always entertaining with his wit and humor. He was a poet, writing at first in Miss Palmer's high school English class and later writing about the ranch, his family, and his friends. History was another interest, and he read everything he could find on Texas, the South, and America. People were always surprised to discover how articulate this cowboy was. He cooked breakfast for anyone who came by his house early and hungry. His grandchildren will always remember their daily childhood breakfasts with "Po". Fluent in Spanish, his care for others was bilingual.

"Po", as he was known to his grandchildren, is survived by a family he loved dearly, a son and daughter-in-law, Tom E. and Brenda Bartz Valliant of Sonora; four grandchildren, Tavia Lee Valliant Conkling and her husband John Conkling of Austin; Victoria Roy Valliant, of Sonora; Pfc. Tom Edward (Trapper) Valliant II, a US Marine, serving in California, and Travis Cozby Valliant of Austin. His great grand children are Julia Valliant Conkling, age 3 and John Alexander Conkling, III, age 1, who will also miss their "Po". His sister, Martha Jean Valliant McLain, of Austin and her daughter, Rev. Melinda Valliant McLain of San Francisco. Beverly's brother & sister in law, Tom & Cheryl West & their children Cheri & Parish Braden of San Angelo, Wade & Samantha West of Ruidoso & Layne West of Lubbock and a multitude of cousins also survive him.

With his death, the world has lost a vital force of nature. He was a part of the land and had devoted his entire life to improving it and to making it productive. His wit, his fairness, his honesty, and loving care for any and all who needed him will always be remembered in the hearts of his family and friends.

Graveside memorial services were held at 11 am on Friday, December 31, 2010 in Sonora, Texas under the direction of Kerbow Funeral Home with Rev. Jim Stephen and Rev. Lewis Allen officiating, with Rev. Melinda McLain assisting. Pallbearers were musicians he played with; Milton Cavaness, JC Surber, Oscar Galindo, Bob Hartman, John Henry & Patti Strauch of Sonora and Coy Moses of San Angelo.

### Food Date Labels Can Be Confusing

Food date labels are worded in various ways, and interpreting them can be confusing.

The sell-by date tells the store how long to hold the food for (StatePoint) Year round, more families are taking to the great sale. You should buy the food before the sell-by-date expires. If outdoors for fun activities. Whether for economic reasons or the product has a sell-by date, the product may be stored in the refrigerator and then cooked or frozen within the recommended purchase period. Take perishable food home immediately after purchase and refrigerate or freeze it promptly.

> The best-if-used-by/before date indicates best flavor or quality. It is not a safety date and does not indicate when a food should be purchased.

If a food smells, tastes or looks bad, however, you should not use it for quality reasons. Spoilage bacteria can cause food to canyons to plains. > Closed or coded dates are packaging numbers that enable manufacturers to rotate their stock as well as to locate their products in the event of a recall. They don't mean consumers must use the product by these dates.

> Except for use-by dates, product dates don't always refer to home storage or use after purchase. Even if the date expires during home storage, perishable foods should be safe, wholesome and of good quality - if handled properly and kept refrigerated or frozen.
