

> The Texas Department of Public Safety will offer lower payments to individuals who have been suspended and are in default on their surcharges. The goal of the amnesty period is to bring drivers into compliance with the surcharge law, and allow them to become licensed and insured drivers. The amnesty reduction does not apply to any other fees that you may owe the Department.

> Those eligible for the Amnesty Program are anyone who had a surcharge assessed between Sept. 30, 2004, and Dec. 31, 2008, and were delinquent on those payments. The surcharges meeting the above criteria must be in default before the amnesty period.

> Those who qualify for the Amnesty Program will pay 10 percent of the original amount owed for all surcharges combined, for a maximum amount of \$250. Service fees will still apply. Any payments already made will be applied to the reduced amount, and if prior payments are more than the reduced amount due, no payment will be required. Prior payments more than the reduced amount due will not be refunded. To apply for the Amnesty Program beginning January 17, 2011, see our surcharge website at www.txsurchargeonline. com or call 1-877-207-3170. No requests will be accepted by

Once the online or telephone application is approved, the surcharge suspensions will be cleared on the applicant's driving record within three business days. Applicants will be provided the reduced amount to pay, and they can begin making

Applicants for the Amnesty Program can pay in full or make payments, but the full amount must be paid by April 17, 2011. If payment in full is not received by April 17, 2011, the reduction is voided and the suspensions are put back on the driving

The Department does not have plans to offer another am-

An Indigency program will be offered after the amnesty period ends in April. The Indigency program will apply to individuals at or below 125 percent of poverty level, using a sworn affidavit; will reduce the amount to 10 percent of total surcharges owed, not to exceed \$250; and will rescind suspension for those who receive indigency while payments are being made. Anyone assessed a surcharge since September 30,

The Driver Responsibility Program, which assesses fees for a variety of driving-related offenses, was passed by the Legislature in 2003 and directed the Department to administer the program. Traffic offenses that carry an automatic surcharge for three years, include DWI-related offenses, no insurance, driving while license suspended, driving without a license and point accumulation. (For example, the fee for a first-time DWI offender is \$1,000 per year for three years.) The revenue generated by DRP goes to trauma centers, emergency medical

# **DPS** Repeats Warning to Avoid Travel to Mexico

The Texas Department of Public Safety is again warning Texans to avoid traveling to Mexico in light of recent violent events in and around Tamaulipas State.

"We know that many of our Winter Texans enjoy traveling to Mexico, but they should understand that we cannot guarantee their safety after they cross the border," said Steven C. Mc-Craw, DPS director. "If violence does occur, we cannot guarantee that anyone will be brought to justice for those acts."

A Texas missionary was killed earlier this week as she and her husband attempted to escape from a number of men trying to stop them. The men opened fire on the couple, striking the woman in the head. Other recent violent events along the border include the shooting of an American on the Mexican side of Falcon Lake in late September, the killing of a University of Texas-Brownsville student in October and the suspected abduction of four men from San Marcos and a 14-year-old from Chicago who were visiting Nuevo Laredo in late November.

DPS has issued warnings against travel in Mexico four times in the past year, as violence in many parts of Mexico has increased.

"We recognize people travel and vacation in Mexico on a daily basis, but the increase in violence is a reality. Recent events show that drug-related violence does not spare innocent bystanders and that criminals will attack tourists," McCraw said.

In an early January statement, the U.S. Consulate in Matamoros advised U.S. citizens traveling in Tamaulipas to be aware of numerous reported crimes against American citizens in the area. Many carjackings have been reported along Carreterra Federal 101, which runs from Ciudad Victoria to San Fernando.

The statement encourages U.S. citizens living or traveling in Mexico to register with the nearest U.S. Embassy or Consulate through their website at https://travelregistration.state. gov/ibrs/ui/.

# Weeds and Disease: **Farmers and Doctors Find Both Becoming More Resistant**

COLLEGE STATION - It's an alarming pattern affecting both agriculture and human medicine, say two experts.

On one hand, farmers are left scratching their heads wondering why certain weeds have become resistant to common herbicides, while medical physicians across the U.S. are seeing patients becoming resistant to common, prescription antibiotic drugs.

In both farming and human medicine, traditional tools used to solve routine problems may no longer be as effective as they used to be. "In both agriculture and medicine, we may have been using too much of a good thing and it's catching up with us," said Dr. Paul Baumann, a Texas AgriLife Extension Service state weed specialist.

For example, Baumann said glyphosate (Roundup and other products) is highly effective, "because it binds a specific enzyme that's needed to produce plant proteins."

"It is a highly effective herbicide that controls a large number of weeds and can be used safely in crops that have glyphosate-resistant genes," Baumann said. "These positive features have led to continued, widespread use, and in many cases as the only herbicide in the program. This has been the foundation for what we are seeing as weed resistance in some parts of Texas, but predominantly in the Southeastern U.S."

Meanwhile, Dr. Tom Wagner, clinic director of Scott and White Arrington Road Clinic in College Station, said in the 1960s, treatment of various skin infections would involve "a garden variety of penicillin."

"But then in the late 1960s, patients developed penicillin resistance and synthetic penicillins followed which that worked for a while," he said. "Subsequently, the issue of antibiotic over-utilization emerged onto the scene. This resulted from a combination of several factors. Medical providers would inappropriately prescribe an antibiotic for the common cold. At times, patients would pressure a provider in the exam room for antibiotic therapy when any nasal congestion, sore throat or cough was present."

Chalk another one up to experience. A fifty degree temperaaltered in resistant species, cal and non-pharmacological ture change in less than 24 hours is difficult to prepare for. It taught some of us lessons and reminded others of things we've learned through experience. Though it's late, here are some thoughts on livestock management during long cold spells, like the one we just underwent. Sutton Gounty is not accustomed to single-digit wind chills and neither are our livestock.

Protecting Livestock In Cold Weather

During weather extremes, primary consideration should be given to the livestock at greatest risk-the old, newborns and those in thin condition. With their winter haircoat and shelter from the north wind, most livestock can fare well. However, a wet haircoat provides little insulation against the cold. Livestock need access to brushy areas, windbreaks, or anything that will supply shelter from the wind and precipitation if possible. An increased wind speed reduces the hair coat insulation and increases maintenance requirements when the animal is cold-If the patient's symptoms stressed.

Animals in thin flesh and newborns have minimal fat under their skin to provide insulation and are especially vulnerable. Thicker skinned animals have more insulation, reducing the amount of additional energy that the animal requires. Thin animals require more energy for maintenance than fat ones. The more subcutaneous fat an animal has, the greater the ability to withstand colder temperatures.

Adequate water intake is essential for survival during extended cold periods. We should break and remove ice from troughs, allowing refilling with relatively warm water. If warranted, call livestock to fresh water with feed or hay.

If forage is in short supply, provide enough hay for cattle, sheep and goats to eat their fill at least once a day. Forage digestion will generate heat, so if possible, feed livestock in the late afternoon to take advantage of this 'internal heat' during the colder nighttime temperatures.


The energy from feed that is available to keep an animal's body warm is known as the heat increment of feeding. Incremental heat production is at its maximum 4 to 6 hours after the feed is consumed. Therefore, feeding late in the afternoon, provides higher amounts of heat from fermentation overnight when temperatures are lowest, making the most efficient use of your feed supplies and meeting livestock's energy requirements.

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such as Palmer amaranth began to pop up in Georgia cotton fields in 2004 and have since continued to escalate due to the repetitive use of glyphosate herbicide and nothing else.

"If it is only killing weeds one specific way, eventually there's going to be a genetic anomaly that will show up that is not sensitive to the herbicide," Baumann said. Once this happens and nothing is done to control it, seed production will spread it all over the field, he said.

"The key to all of this is the development of new chemistries that have different sites of action or simply the use of other products that have a different site of activity in the plant," Baumann said. "In years past, we have used three

antibiotic resistant staph aureus (bacterium) called MRSA.

"I see this in my clinic nearly every day," Wagner said. "It's very difficult to treat. When you eliminate penicillin, erythromycin and cephalosporin classes, you are limited in your antibiotic options. For those not allergic, we've resorted to using an older sulfa antibiotic to treat MRSA because of these limitations."

Just like glyphosate, Wagner says the synthetic penicillin worked for a while, but over time "it couldn't easily reach the site of activity."

"The staph's penicillinbinding protein lowered its affinity; thereby creating a layer of protection," Wagner said. "Thus, the penicillin

### 7th Grade Boys **Basketball**




