

William was a tall, well-built man with two Samuel Colt .45's on each side of him, and he had a terrible five o'clock shadow. He wore a beat up leather over a dirty Wranglers shirt, holey pants, black steeltoe boots, and a dented black cowboy hat. His two friends looked the same, except Black Jack was taller than Sam and he had a thick black beard. But, other than that, they wore the same white cowboy hat, black boots, torn up Wrangler jeans, and blue, dirty Wrangler shirts. On Black Jacks' left leg was a machete and on his left arm was a sawed-off double barrel shotgun. On Sam's right leg was a Samurai sword and on his left arm was a .357 revolver.







This technology eliminates the digging up of streets for replacement of pipe and requires less time at lower cost. Leonard also reports that additional costly and critical work is required at the waste water treatment plant. We are fortunate to have Leonard as our Public Works Chief as he is well qualified and certified by TCEQ in all aspects of Civil Works. Leonard asks that citizens be patient with outages as our infrastructure is upgraded.


