

Dear Editor,

I would like to thank both Superintendent Gibson and School Board President Cahill for their response last week concerning the Bond measure. Please let me address several points. The connection between the field house and the bond is this: we wouldn't need a bond today if the rainy day savings were not spent entirely on one elective athletic project. We can blame the economy or expensive toilets but I feel that the previous school board along with the superintendent mismanaged the funds that should have been used on core educational expenses. How are the taxpayers of Sutton County to know that such mismanagement will not happen again? In addition, I feel that it is a conflict of interest that the Superintendent worked as a consultant for the company that built the field house while simultaneously representing Sonora ISD. His contract with the school district contains a consultant fee clause which raises my suspicion

As for the bond, I find it odd that there is little discussion on how we pay the money back. There is no such thing as free money. With businesses, families and individuals all cutting back expenses, it's time for our school district to do the same. I understand that it takes dollars to run the schools but I wish we could cut back this disproportionate spending on athletics . We need some accountability and it needs to start now.

I recall thinking it looked outdated in the 60's when we moved back to Sonora. Now, the field house is inviting and used by all coaches and student athletes including middle school students. I'd also like to point out that many were adamantly opposed to the construction of the "New" High School many years ago. It too needed to be done. The "old" High School, now our Intermediate Building, was ill-equipped to handle the influx of new students at that time. In retrospect, I believe that the board during that time was very forward thinking. As a result of their decision to build the "new" high school made on our behalf, our students had room and the district was able to incorporate the required technology that is driving our country today.

Back to the issue of what was spent on the "field house"... It isn't simply a place where boys keep their uniforms and suit up for football games. It is a facility that includes dressing rooms for boys and girls, a weight room, trainer's office for treatment, offices, technology, and storage. Quite frankly, I am extremely glad our kids have access to it. The facility is no

Training Young Trees

No, we're not talking about training them to do tricks or anything. We=re referring to using pruning techniques which will help shape and promote plant health and long life. However, it=s necessary to know when, where, and how much to

The first pruning after trees and shrubs are purchased consists of removing broken, crossing and pest-infested branches. The traditional recommendation of pruning up to one-third of top growth when transplanting to compensate for root loss is no longer valid, according to recent research. Excessive pruning at transplanting reduces leaf area, which decreases the amount of plant energy generated which are needed to create a healthy root system.


not be pruned unless the leader is not wanted, as is the case with some naturally low-branched trees or where multiplestemmed plants are desired. Trees with a central leader, such as Texas red oak, sweet gum or magnolia, may need little or no pruning except to eliminate branches competing with the

The height of the lowest branch can range from a few inches above the ground for screening or windbreaks, to more than 7 feet above the ground near a street or patio. Removal of lower limbs is usually done over a period of years beginning in the nursery and continuing for several years after transplanting reduce air emissions," he said. until the desired height is reached.

The concept in training a tree called "the trashy trunk" refers to this gradual raising of the lowest branches of a tree. Lower branches on the main trunk help create a thicker trunk more quickly. A common mistake in pruning young trees is to strip them of small branches leaving only a tuft of leaves at the top of the tree. This training is incorrect and forms a weak "buggy whip" trunk. Remove lower limbs when they reach 1 inch in diameter. This prevents permanent scarring of the trunk caused by removing larger limbs.

There are other things to consider. These include light vs. heavy cuts, scaffold branching, and radial branch distribution. Too much for one article, but certainly information we can provide you with. Proper pruning enhances the beauty of almost any landscape tree, while improper pruning can ruin or greatly reduce its landscape potential. Turning Leftovers Into Power

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
