


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Amanda Word Graduates from Angelo State

Knowing When To Use Picloram

With less livestock on rangeland, some land managers may have brush control efforts in mind. However, it is important to have knowledge about the herbicides being applied. Let's consider Picloram as it is frequently used in the control of prickly pear and many other brush species (most grasses are

So what's there to know? Timing, for one thing. It requires precipitation for root uptake. Picloram is readily absorbed by plant roots, less so by the foliage, and is readily translocated throughout plants. It remains stable and intact in plants.

The compound is relatively persistent in soil. In heavy clay soil, picloram has a half life of slightly over two months. However, when more organic material is present, the half life of the compound nearly doubles. Breakdown by soil microorganisms occurs slowly. Some literature states that 20-30% is still present in soil one year after application, and 10% two years afterward. As a general rule, degradation is slower during drought. It is for this reason that applicators must be careful to avoid treating directly under oaks when they are spraying prickly pear.

Also, the movement of picloram in runoff after heavy rainfall may occur. Because Picloram is mobile, it can leach to groundwater in coarser soils. In water, the action of sunlight is an important mechanism leading to the breakdown of the product. The take-home message is that it requires precipitation for plant uptake, but can also move with runnoff.

Picloram is a systemic herbicide which is formulated either as an acid or as a potassium salt. Most uses of the pesticide are restricted by the EPA. Restricted Use Pesticides (RUP) may be purchased and used only by certified applicators. It may be used in formulations with other herbicides such as bromoxynil, atropine, diuron, 2,4-D, MCPA, triclorpyr, and atrazine among others. Picloram is a slightly toxic herbicide and therefore requires the signal word CAUTION on its label. It is of moderate toxicity to the eyes and only mildly toxic on the skin. As with all products, follow label directions. For additional information, contact the County Extension Office.



Reduced water levels and higher water temperatures in streams and reservoirs also lead to lower levels of dissolved oxygen in water, which can also be fatal to fish. TP-WD's Kills and Spills Team monitors fish kill events and can be notified of fish kills at their 24-hour hotline, (512) 389-4848.

Rainfall in Texas historically follows a boom-and-bust cycle. That's why the nearly 200 major reservoirs exist in the state, to catch and hold water to sustain us in the dry times between wet times. But since we never know when the next drought will come, how severe it will be and how long it will last, prudence demands making the most of every drop of precious water

those reservoirs hold. Remember that every time you start to turn on a faucet.



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
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
