Parents Can Teach Children School Bus Safety

As schools reopen, it is a good time to remember that it takes the cooperation of many people to get children there and

It is especially important for parents to teach young children-preschoolers, kindergartners, and primary studentshow to wait for the school bus. Teach children to stay back from the curb or on the driveway, away from traffic, while they wait. They should learn not to approach the street until the bus comes to a complete stop, its lights are flashing, and the door

Hold some practice sessions. Help them pick a spot on the sidewalk or driveway where they will be safely away from traffic but can still watch for the approaching school bus. This will help them avoid the temptation of leaning or stepping out into the street to see whether the bus is coming.

If children must cross the street or road, parents should remind them to look both ways, even when the bus is stopped and its lights are flashing. Stress to your children that it is just as important for them to stay in their seats on the school bus as it is in the car. Explain that the bus driver hasn't made up the "sit-down-and-be-quiet" rules to be mean, but that you and the school agreed upon these rules to help keep them safe.

School-bus safety is just as important at the end of the day. Teach children how to safely exit the bus. Children should know to step away from the bus as soon as they get off.

Tell them to walk away from the bus, then stop and turn around to look at the driver. If the child can see the driver, the driver can see that the child is safely away from the bus. If parents and bus drivers cooperate to teach these items until it becomes a habit for children, drivers will know to look for something wrong if they cannot see the child watching them. Children's clothing and school packs can also be a part of a school-bus accident prevention strategy. Tragedies can occur when a child's clothing is snagged on the bus and the child could be fatally dragged or crushed under the bus. Examine coats and jackets to make sure there are no strings, straps, buckles, etc. that can get caught on part of the bus. Also avoid long scarves and flapping mittens on sleeves in the winter. Carry backpacks or book bags so that the straps don't get caught.

With all the excitement about starting a new school year and seeing old friends, children need their parents to be persistent in reminding them of the rules that will get them safely to school and back home again.

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Notice of Public Hearing on Tax Increase

The City of Sonora will hold two public hearings on a proposal to increase total tax revenues from properties on the tax roll in the preceding tax year by 7.764471 percent (percentage by which proposed tax rate exceeds lower of rollback tax rate or effective tax calculated under Chapter 26, Tax Code). Your individual taxes may increase at a greater or lesser rate, or even decrease, depending on the change in the taxable value of your property in relation to the change in taxable value of all other property and the tax rate that is adopted.

The first public hearing will be held on September 1, 2011 at 6:00 PM at CITY HALL.

The second public hearing will be held on September 8, 2011 at 6:00 PM at CITY HALL.

The members of the governing body voted on the proposal to consider the tax increase as follows:

The average taxable value of a residence homestead in City of Sonora last year was \$70,061. Based on last year's tax rate of \$0.510000 per \$100 of taxable value, the amount of taxes imposed last year on the average home was \$357.31.

The average taxable value of a residence homestead in City of Sonora this year is \$74,044. If the governing body adopts the effective tax rate for this year of \$0.501000 per \$100 of taxable value, the amount of taxes imposed this year on the average home would be \$370.96.

If the governing body adopts the proposed tax rate of \$0.539900 per \$100 of taxable value, the amount of taxes imposed this year on the average home would be \$399.76.



Next Year's Ranch Planning Starts Now

The drought has meant selling off a lot of livestock. But It WILL rain again. Grass will grow, and livestock will be back. The tough part is making ends meet now, during this dry time. Feed and fuel prices are up, but then again, so are the livestock markets. So the question is how to plan for next year and what conditions may be. All this is the subject of a multi-county ranch management workshop slated for 8:30 a.m. September 13 at the Ozona Convention Center.

The program will be conducted by the Texas AgriLife Extension Service offices in Sutton and Crockett counties. The workshop topics are meant to help area producers manage their way through this drought. Topics will include: "Livestock Market Outlook: Current Trends and Expectations for Cattle, Sheep and Goats" by Dr. Rick Machen, AgriLife Extension livestock specialist, Uvalde. The second topic is "Disaster Assistance Program through the Farm Services Agency/The Economics of Managing Livestock During Drought" given by Bill Thompson, AgriLife Extension economist, San Angelo. Thompson will also discuss tax implications (and options) brought on by having to sell livestock due to drought.

BRAND REGISTRATION PERIOD BEGINS AUGUST 31, 2011

Registration of livestock brands begins on Wednesday, August 31, 2011 and continues until February 29, 2012. On March 1, 2012, all brands that have not been renewed will become "open brands" for the general public. Title 6, Chapter 144 of the Texas Agriculture Code requires a brand or mark to be registered every 10 years. The Title 6 code was put into effect in 1981, and this will be the fourth registration since then.

The cost to register a brand/mark in Sutton County is \$16 per location per animal. 


