


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

In 1918 on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, an "armistice" between the Nations that had fought in the "war to end all wars" was signed and carried out. Armistice Day, as it was originally called, was to be a day of "remembrance "for those that gave the ultimate sacrifice for their countries. It started out as only honoring those that fought in World War I; however in 1954 President Eisenhower signed the bill that would honor all Veteran's and it didn't matter if they had fought in a war or served during peace time. It also became a Federal Government holiday and workers got the day off with pay for its observance. In fact at one point the holiday was moved to the fourth Monday in October so workers could have a four day weekend. 

Statement by Gov. Rick Perry on Supreme Court Hearing on Obamacare

AUSTIN – Gov. Rick Perry today issued the following statement regarding the Supreme Court's decision to hear a case relating to Obamacare:

"The Supreme Court's decision to hear this case quickly is encouraging news for Texas, which faces massive cost explosions under Obamacare, and for Americans everywhere who don't want the federal government forcing them to buy specific goods and services. I'm hopeful the Supreme Court will confirm what other federal courts have already recognized: that Obamacare is an unprecedented overreach and an unconstitutional infringement upon individual liberties."

Texas and 25 other states have challenged the constitutionality of Congress' authority to force individuals to buy health insurance. This administration continues to spend excessively and impose unfunded mandates upon the states, including this federal health care reform bill that will cost Texas taxpayers more than \$27 billion over 10 years for the Medicaid expansion starting in 2014.

English is a 1997 graduate of Angelo State University and she graduated from Texas Tech School of Law in December 1999. English has been a resident of the 112th Judicial District for most of her life and has lived in Ozona since 1989. She served as Assistant District Attorney for four years prior to being elected.

Since beginning her second term in 2009, English achieved Board Certification in Criminal Law. Only 10% of the attorneys in Texas are Board Certified in the various fields of law. English serves on the Board of Directors for the Texas District and County Attorney's Association and the Texas Association of Counties. She is also on the Executive Board of the Special Prosecution Unit and is a member of the Boarder Prosecution Unit, which is committed to giving priority to border crimes. "Service on these Boards allows me to bring fresh ideas to the District and to be more aware of events occurring in other parts of the State," said English. In 2011, English completed the Leadership Class with the Texas Association of Counties.

"I will continue to work closely with our local law enforcement to assist with their investigations and provide training courses for them. My staff and I are always available 24/7 for law enforcement. Our goal is to aid the deputies, officers, and troopers so that we have the best evidence to prove the cases they work so hard to investigate."

"Seeking justice for the citizens and victims within the District is a great honor and I am committed to this pursuit. I ask for the continuing support of the voters to allow me to pursue justice on their behalf," English stated.



Keep the **Tow Truck** Away

(SPM Wire) It's time to test your vehicle's battery and replace it if necessary, to avoid being stranded this season.

To get the most life out of a battery:

Be sure the electrical system is charging at the correct rate; overcharging can damage a battery as quickly as undercharging.

If your battery is the type that needs to be topped off, check it regularly. Add water when necessary.

Keep the battery top clean. Dirt becomes a conductor, draining power. Corrosion becomes an insulator, inhibiting current flow.

Ingredients

-Bosc pear (head) -Melon (body)

-Cheese (beak and tail feathers)

-Red pepper (snood, feet and side feathers)

-Raisins (eyes) -Grapes (tail feathers)

-Bamboo skewers

-Toothpicks

Instructions

1. Stabilize the melon body by cutting a shallow slice off the rind to form a flat base. Using a section of bamboo skewer, attach a Bosc pear head to the melon, as shown.

2. Cut a cheese triangle beak and red pepper snood. Attach both, along with raisin eyes, to the head with sections of toothpick.

3.Cut red pepper feet and set them in place. For tail feathers, skewer cheese cubes and red grapes, then insert the skewers as shown. Pin pepper side feathers in place with toothpicks.



As we head into the dormant season, insects will be looking for a place to spend the winter. Some, like the ladybug, survive by hibernating. Others, such as fleas and lice, survive by living close to people or animals. And sometimes they seek shelter in our homes. Most of them do not present a great danger to the insects WILL be a nuisance. winter. Here are a few tips to help rea winter home for insects or other pests.

Secondly, remember to store firewood away from the house to help eliminate hiding places for pests. Take only the amount of firewood needed for immediate use into the house. Firewood stacked beside the house may be handy but as the wood warms, spiders, scorpions and other pests may leave the wood and escape to other areas of the

You can also help yourself by mowing any tall grassy or weedy areas to provide less cover over the cool season. And though leaves provide insulation for lawns and serve as mulch, they also furnish shelter for insects, so keep

Finally, fix water drips (leaks) that supply moisture to insects. You should also take out the trash regularly and not leave pet food accessible as pages these are sources of food for pests. 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

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
