



The major portion of the assessment would only be for the benefit of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, and that Cor-poration does not want both our insurance premium and double assessment.

In its banking reform, the Congress of the United States, at the suggestion of Hon J. F. T. O'Connor, Comptroller of the Curren-cy, Washington, D. C., per-mitted removal of double liability from national banks as of July 1, 1937. The sitte banks should be placed on the same basis as the national banks.






