The fact that it exists of the river, the bacteria is not uncommon, but the drought (and consequently lower water levels) have resulted in an increase in the amount of bacteria found in the water. When the water levels decrease the flow also decreases leaving a perfect environment for the bacteria to flourish. Once the river rises the bacteria levels drop, simply because of the people that might the water flow cleans the river.

The third issue that arose was excessive watering at E. coli is a bacteria that the Cemetery, particularly on Sundays. Over watering is causing water waste and run off. The Cemetery water system is based on well water, which is running low. Judge Garner added that, "That well has failed us beerywhere. 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






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
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
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
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Are Kindness, Honor, and Respect **Endangered Species?**


