Realignment News: Broncos Back in Region I

The wait is over. Last Thursday, the Texas UIL made it official: the Sonora Broncos are back in Region I in District 3-2A, Division II. Our football district opponents are Alpine, Coahoma, Crane, Reagan County (Big Lake), and Stanton.

We have been in the same district, or have regularly played, Alpine, Crane and Big Lake several times in the past ten years. However, the Broncos haven't been gridiron foes of the Stanton Buffaloes since 1963. We defeated the Buffaloes in '62 and '63 (24-21, 23-16). The Coahoma Bulldogs and the Broncos last met in 1987 when Sonora was a 3A school. We also played them six times between 1965 and 1973. The record in these years was 5 and 1 in the Broncos' favor.

During the past two years, our farthest district opponent, San Saba, was a 146 mile drive. The next two years we have Alpine (208 miles), Coahoma (171 miles), and Stanton (150

I looked at our new district opponents' football records for the past eight years.

Stanton stands at 46-43. The Buffaloes' best year, by far, was a 10-2 record in 2010. Of our new opponents, Stanton is the only one to have ever won a state championship. They won in 1997. They made to the quarterfinals in 2000 and were defeated by Celina the eventual State Champions.

Coahoma's Bulldogs have a 36-47 record since the 2004 football season. In 1965, the Bulldogs beat us in the Regional game. In 1968, the Broncos won the rematch by a score of 7 to 6 in the Ice/Mud Bowl in Angelo Stadium enroute to our second state championship.

Bronco fans have trekked to Alpine and Big Lake many times in the past. The Bucks have a 48-39 record since 2004. The best record during that time frame was in 2009 when they went 9 and 2. The Owls have spent the past two years in District 13-1A Division I. Last year they were 4-6, 1-3. Since 2004, their record is 31 -51.

The Crane Golden Cranes have great facilities and are usually in the playoffs. Since 2004, their record is 67-28. The farthest they have gone are the quarterfinals in 1999. The Broncos have played the Cranes 26 times and hold a two game winning edge 14-12.

The Broncos are back in Region 1. The teams in this Region know about the Broncos' tradition and history. The drives may be longer, but we're back where we belong.



Warden Jaramillo arrived on the ranch and obtained a written statement from the rancher. After the rancher decided to sign a non-consent affidavit, a warrant was issued and the warden arrested the oilfield worker for hunting without landowner's consent.

Warden Swofford responded and assisted the trooper with detaining and controlling the subject while a search of his vehicle was conducted. A large amount of marijuana was found in the vehicle, and the man was arrested.

Trespasser attacks game warden: January 21, Dallas County Game Warden David Bosecker was patrolling for night hunters in Hunt County when he spotted a subject trespassing at a barn and corral area. When Warden Bosecker approached the subject and told him he was under arrest, the man became belligerent and attacked him. Warden Bosecker arrested the subject and several cases are pending.

Thinking globally, violating the law locally: Trinity County Game Warden Randy Watts received a call from a landowner on Jan. 22 about hog hunters trespassing on his high fenced ranch. The landowner found a dog with a GPS collar and a few minutes later the hog hunters showed up to get the dog. The landowner asked the hunters how they got in the ranch. They stated the gate was open and they would leave it like they found it. After the hunters left, the landowner checked his gate. His lock was missing and a new lock was on the gate. The landowner knew the identity of one of the hunters. Game Warden Watts called the hunter and met with all the individuals on the neighboring property. Citations were issued to five hunters for trespassing.

Facebook helps tag illegal hunters: Newton County wardens Ellis Powell, Brian Srba, Landon Spacek, Bradley Smith and Jasper County warden Morgan Inman executed a search warrant on a Louisiana resident living in Newton County on Jan. 21. The warrant came after a four-month investigation, with warrants also being served on the subject's Facebook account for e-mails and photos. As the interview was taking place, Louisiana game wardens were interviewing other subjects implicated by the man's Facebook account. The subject admitted killing eight deer in the last few months and named several other subjects with numerous deer kills. None of the four main subjects have had a hunting license since 2004, with no deer taken in daylight hours during that time. Numerous charges filed with more interviews of other subjects pending.

Wardens make plenty of case in coastal operation: During coastal operations Jan. 23-27, Galveston and Chambers county wardens filed cases that included a crew boat that was in possession of five bags of fish fillets, a commercial crabbing boat that was caught in possession of oysters, illegal stone crabs and no commercial licenses and a commercial gulf shrimp boat caught in possession of head-and-tailed fish, exceeding the limit of flounder and shark fins.

Increased Reward Funding for Texas 10 Most Wanted Sex Offenders Program

Gov. Rick Perry today announced that the Governor's Criminal Justice Division (CJD) is providing additional funding for Texas Crime Stoppers and the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) to increase rewards for the Texas 10 Most Wanted Sex Offenders program to \$2,000, with some rewards reaching up to \$5,000.

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





Fruit Trees Soon To Bud

By Pascual Hernandez, Sutton County Agricultural Extension Agent



Though we're still in early February, it's not too early to be thinking about our fruit trees. Some of our fruit trees will soon be blooming. So, does cold weather have any effect on this process?

Well, most hardy fruit trees need a certain amount of cold winter weather to end their dormancy and to promote spring request was to update equipment for our local shooting sports growth. 
As the fruit buds grow and open, they become more susceptible to frost injury. It is interesting that trees actually form their buds late in the previous summer. Since trees are dormant during the winter, they don't have the energy to produce structures that are that small and complex. Buds aren't very apparent in the fall and winter, but become more apparent with warm weather.

The WT Friends of NRA Grant Committee held its' annual meeting in Big Springs, TX on Jan. 28, 2012. Of the 22 committees within the West Texas Region, 18 were represented to review the 54 grant applications submitted. Sutton County Friends of NRA was represented by grant committee member, Tonya Brown and three local committee members.

Sutton County 4H Shooting Sports Instructor, Paul Freeman, submitted a FNRA Grant Application, with the assistance of Eaton Hill Nature Center Director, Delyse Jaeger. The grant efforts, our youth will be receiving funds in the amount of \$ 4,343.00 for the purchase of 7 new rifles. 




