

# Regulations for Political Signs

The campaign season for the 2012 elections has begun. Candidates who are running for office are eagerly reaching out to their constituents to win their votes. There are many forms of "advertising" that candidates utilize to make their candidacy known.

Yard signs tend to be one of the most common method candidates use to get their name out to the voting community; however, there are rules and regulations that must be followed in order to use these signs.

The State of Texas has set the following rules regarding the use of political yard signs:

Signs may NOT be placed on or within the right of way (including trees, telephone poles, traffic signs and any other object on the right of way)

Signs may be placed on private property with the owner's permission

Signs must be made of lightweight material and can be NO larger than 50 square feet

Signs may be posted as early as 90 days before an election (NO EARLIER) and must be removed within 10 days after the election

It is also important to check with city officials for applicable ordinances before placing a sign inside of incorporated city limits.

Any placed signs that are a traffic hazard or in the right of way will be immediately removed at the sign owners cost, with no prior notice.

# Stomach Worms May Be Problem This Spring

Last year's drought did help in one manner- "stomach worms" were not a problem for livestock. However, with the recent rains and spring not far away, they soon may be. In warm, moist climates, the internal parasite that causes the most problems to sheep and goats is usually Haemonchus Contortus, better known as the "barber pole" worm. It is a bloodsucking parasite that causes blood plasma and protein loss. It is also the largest and most deadly stomach worm.

The symptom most commonly associated with barber pole worm infection is anemia, characterized by pale mucous membranes, especially in the lower eye lid; and "bottle jaw," swelling of fluid under the jaw. The barber pole worm is difficult to control because it has a short, direct life cycle and is a prolific

A female barber pole worm can produce thousands of eggs per day. The barber pole worm is also capable of going into an arrested state when environmental conditions are not favorable to its development and resuming its life cycle once environmental conditions improve. These larvae do not feed or lay eggs and do no damage to their hosts while in this state. However, in spring they resume development and large numbers of eggs are shed into the pastures. When the weather warms up, larvae will be waiting to be ingested. They are less of a problem in arid regions, because parasites require moisture for their development

Sheep are more susceptible to internal parasites than most other types of livestock.. Their small fecal pellets disintegrate very easily thus releasing the worm larvae onto pastures. They graze close to the soil surface and to their feces. They are slow to acquire immunity. Sheep also suffer a loss of immunity at the time of lambing, which does not restore itself until approximately one month after lambing.

In the past, producers relied heavily on anti-parasitic drugs, called "anthelmintics" to control internal parasites. But the long-time use and in some cases misuse of these drugs has resulted in parasites that have become increasingly resistant to anthelmintics. That makes it important to use fecal counts to determine if treatment is necessary. You should also treat before parturition to destroy dormant larvae. (Read the label as using some dewormers during pregnancy may cause abortions). And remember to dose correctly and rotate dewormers. The dosage selected for all animals should be appropriate for the heaviest animal in that group (grouped by weight).

In the U.S., few anthelmintics are FDA-approved for use in sheep and lambs, and no new drugs are likely to be developed. As a result, producers must develop more integrated programs for controlling parasites, which do not rely exclusively on drug therapy.



## Mother Nature Gets The Best Of Austin Golfers






