



Clayton L. Taylor



Sonora Elementary Pre-Kindergarten Registration Dates

Pre-registration for the 2012-2013 school year will be held on Monday, April 30th and Tuesday, May 1st from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. at the Sonora Elementary School office. Students enrolling in Pre-Kindergarten must be three or four years old on or before September 1, 2012.

Students who are three or four years of age on or before September 1, 2012 must meet one of the following qualification requirements: 1) economically disadvantaged, 2) limited English proficient, 3) qualify for special education services, or 4) have a parent who is an active duty member of the armed forces of the United States including the state military forces or a reserve component of the armed forces or a parent who was injured or killed while serving on active duty.

Students four years of age on or before September 1, 2012 who do not quality for Pre-Kindergarten may pay tuition. Tuition will be \$300.00 per month due on the first of each month beginning in August and the last payment will be in April. Class size, however, will be limited and classes will be filled on a first come first serve basis.

You must provide a copy of your child's birth certificate, social security card, and current immunization record. Your child will not be placed in a class until immunizations are current and proof is provided.

Please make every effort to register on these dates as this will help us plan for the 2012-2013 school year. Call 387-6951 if you have any questions.

Kindergarten Registration Dates

Kindergarten registration will be Monday, April 30th and Tuesday, May 1st from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. at the Sonora Elementary School office. Students enrolling in Kindergarten must be 5 years old on or before September 1, 2012. You must provide a copy of your child's birth certificate, social security card, and current immunization record. Your child will not be placed in a class until immunizations are current and proof is provided. Please make every effort to register on these dates as this will help us plan for the 2012-2013 school year. Call 387-6951 if you have any questions.



Landscape Irrigation: Installing Without a License

A new state law allows municipal and justice of the peace courts to penalize unlicensed irrigators who install irrigation systems with a Class C misdemeanor and fine up to \$500, plus related costs. Unlicensed irrigators installing irrigation systems risk contaminating the public water supply. Licensed irrigators receive proper training to prevent contamination of the public water supply by ensuring that nonpotable water from lawn-irrigation pipes does not flow into the water-supply.

The new bill (HB 2507), established to protect public health, went into effect September 1, 2011. You can file complaints against an unlicensed irrigator with the local municipality or water district, citing a violation of Texas Occupation Code, Sec. 1903.256. If the complaint is not resolved, or for more information, you can call the TCEP Landscape Irrigation Program at 512-239-LAWN (5296), or visit < www.tceq.texas. gov/licensing/irrigation/landscape.html>.

process of taking all counter measures in my life.

I ask the question in this election and in life, "Why do we have some people that claim they love America, clearly hate Americans?" Do you know the answer? If you do, I would like to know!

I have been asked by family and friends, "Earlie, is this election worth losing your life over?", and I respond, "Sutton County is worth fighting for!"

Dave Jennings Inducted into Cowboy Hall of Fame







During the 80's, 90's and early 2000's Dave Jennings photographed every major rodeo across Texas, the US, Canada, and even a tour of Brazil.

His career included 8 NFR selections, 15 NFSR's, 8 CNFR's, and 15 Texas Circuit finals. He was selected to photograph many special events including the first Dallas Cup Finale, the George Paul Memorial Bull riding, the Phil Lyne and Jim Bob Altizer invitational ropings. He is the youngest photographer ever selected to photograph the NFR, being selected for the first time in 1986 at the age of 25. Five years ago he became a PRCA Gold Card member.

It all started with a chance meeting with Mack Altizer back in 1980 at a roping. Mack was just starting Bad Company rodeo and Dave fell right in. He honed his skills at the college rodeos Bad Company was doing and the Charlie Thompson rodeo series in the Panhandle. He got his PRCA card in 1986 and toured with Bad Company, helping change the face of rodeo.

Dave lives outside Roosevelt Texas with his wife Beth and son Will Reed on his grandparents original 2900 acre ranch. He does not go to many Pro Rodeos anymore except for Bad Company rodeos. Currently most of Dave's photography is geared to youth events such as the National High School and Jr High finals, the Texas High school and JR High finals, and the YBR bull riding finals. Dave has also recently been selected as the official photographer of the Ultimate Calf Roping series, and the World Series of Team Roping Finals in Las Vegas.
