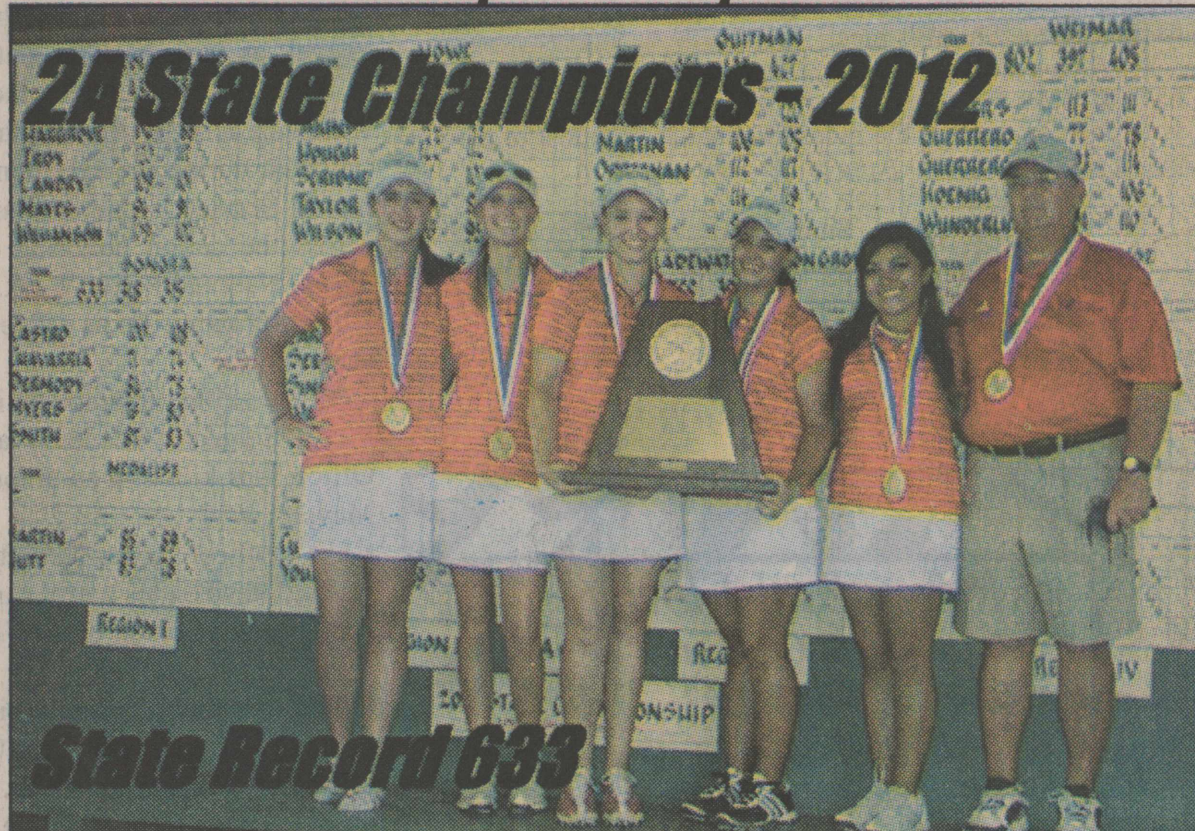

Lady Bronco Golf: 1st State Team Championship !!!!!

The Lady Broncos traveled to Austin on May 3-4 to play in the UIL State Golf Tournament. Heading into the tournament, the Lady Broncos looked to cap a super season. Everyone anticipated a possible state crown and the girls did not disappoint. With the stiffest competition of the year, the Lady Broncos stepped up and provided an all-around team effort. The Lady Broncos (318-315-633) defeated a very fine team from Melissa (341-314-655) to claim the first ever girls state golf championship. The team score of 633 was 105 strokes better than the winning score

from last year. After searching through all available records, it is believed that the team score of 633 is a class AA record for the state tournament. Leading the Lady Broncos was Elizabeth Chavarria (71-74-145), who was attempting to claim her 3rd straight state medalist championship. At the end of regulation play, Elizabeth found herself tied for the championship. After three playoff holes, Elizabeth finished with a silver medal for 2nd place. Most young ladies can only dream of playing in the state tournament, but in three years Liz has brought home 3 gold medals and 1 silver – not bad for a high school

career. Other Lady Broncos playing in the state tournament were Madison Myers (76-80-156), Sidney Dermody (84-78-162), Logan Smith (87-83-170), and Ali Castro (100-108-208). Madison (7th) and Sidney (10th) earned All-State honors along with Elizabeth for their top ten finishes. Sidney and Logan each had their personal best rounds of the year that helped seal the championship for the Lady Broncos. A year to be remembered – 8 first place rounds, two second, and a fifth to go along with a State Championship. Super job Lady Broncos on a Great Season that will provide

The Lady Broncos Track team wrapped up their season with great success. It took a little while for everything to fall into place but once it all did the results were awesome. After a great District meet here on our own track, 8 Lady Broncos headed to Odessa for Regionals. Kesley Favila earned 5th place in pole vault and competed in the 100m hurdles as well as the 800 relay. Melissa Freeman was on also on the 800 relay and ran in the open 100 m dash. Gracie Dozier was a finalist in the long jump and ran the 100 m dash. Macie Friess competed in the discus and was 1st leg on all 3 relays. Abby Nolen ran the sprint relay and 800

relay. Jomayra was 1 spot away from being a finalist in the quarter. She also competed in the mile relay and sprint relay. Zella Powers ran on the mile relay. Avery Nolen threw shot put, ran the 300 hurdles and the sprint and mile relays. The sprint relay (consisting of Macie Friess, Abby Nolen, Jomayra Gutierrez and Avery Nolen) qualified for the finals with the 2nd place time from prelims. The girls new they had a chance to be top 2, but our handoffs would have to be perfect to get our time down where it needed to be. This group of girls had only been running together as a whole group since district due to an injury. They were ready to go

and fired up but unfortunately ended up dropping the baton resulting in a disqualification. It was pretty heart breaking for all 4 of these girls. They are young though and the future still holds great possibilities for them! Avery Nolen qualified for the finals with the 2nd fastest time from prelims. This put her in lane 5, where she knew her toughest competitors were behind her. She was the first runner over the first hurdle and stretched her lead with every hurdle after. Avery won the race by a whole second. It was a very emotional victory for her.

Letter to the Editor

Having reviewed the sample ballots for both the Democratic and the Republican parties, it appears that only in the Democratic primary will local races be decided in Sutton County on the 29th day of May 2012. County Commissioner of Precinct #1 has the incumbent Miguel (Mike) Villanueva being challenged by Doris Fuentes. County Commissioner of Precinct #3 has challenger Carl Teaff seeking to replace incumbent Milton Cavaness. Both of these races will be final on May 29th as there is no Republican Challengers.

Also, the 112th District Attorney campaign will be concluded at the Democratic primary. Current District Attorney, Laurie English, faces Fort Stockton Attorney, James Jepsen, to be able to return to office. Again there is no Republican challenger. These three (3) races will be decided by the voters in the Democratic Primary only.

However, one (1) local race will not be decided until the General Election in November. Sheriff Joe Fincher has run for re-election as a Republican while challenger Earli Williams filed as a Democrat. Voters will have to wait until November to finalize the Sheriff's race.

When voters do vote in a particular primary, they do not have to make a choice on every race. The important thing is to vote once on each of the races that matter the most to the voters of Sutton County. Appreciate your attention.

Fallen Texas Peace Officers Remembered

AUSTIN – The Texas Department of Public Safety today honored eight Texas law enforcement officers who lost their lives in the line of duty during the past year. The lives of these officers, including DPS Highway Patrol Trooper Javier Arana Jr., who was killed in a two-car collision in El Paso March 24, were recognized at the DPS Peace Officer Memorial Service in Austin.

"The fallen peace officers we honor today, including DPS Trooper Javier Arana Jr., willingly took an oath to serve and protect their communities at all costs," said DPS Director Steve McCraw. "Their commitment to protecting the lives of others cost them their own, and there is no greater sacrifice than that. Our thoughts and prayers are with their families, and we will never forget the service, bravery and sacrifice of these heroes."

Texas Sen. Steve Ogden, the guest speaker at the ceremony, as well as various other state officials and family members of fallen officers attended the service. Mrs. Cindy Arana, the widow of Trooper Arana, placed a wreath at the DPS Memorial Wall during the ceremony. The DPS Peace Officer Memorial Service is one of many memorial services scheduled across the nation honoring fallen law enforcement officers during National Police Week.

The following Texas officers were honored at the memorial service:

- Officers killed feloniously in 2011:
 - Sergeant Kenneth Vann Sr., Bexar County Sheriff's Office, was killed in an ambush while stopped a red light on May 28, 2011.
 - Officer Bryan Hebert, Beaumont Police Department, was killed when his patrol car was intentionally struck by suspect during a pursuit on July 8, 2011.
- Office - Precinct 2, died while assisting residents devastated by a wildfire on September 10, 2011.
- Officers killed feloniously in 2012:
 - Senior Officer Jaime Padron, Austin Police Department, was shot and killed while attempting to apprehend a suspect on April 6, 2012.

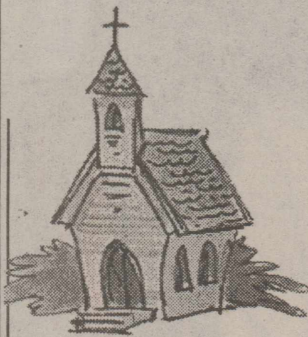

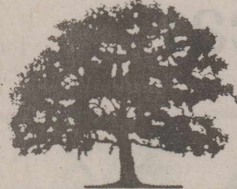

Horn Flies a Significant Pest of Livestock

The recent moisture was welcomed, but will mean more insect pests for livestock and wildlife. Of the many species of flies that feed on the blood of cattle, the horn fly, *Haematobia irritans*, is the most common. The horn fly's feeding activity causes reduced weight gain, anemia due to loss of blood, and a general weakening of the animals. These flies are so named because they often cluster in the hundreds around the base of the horns of cattle. Although they are found almost exclusively on cattle, they will feed on horses, sheep, goats, and wildlife.

Horn flies are 3/16-inch long and dark gray in color. They resemble house flies but are half as large and have blood-sucking mouthparts. An easy way to identify horn flies in the field is by their habit of clustering around the horn bases or on the shoulders and backs of cattle. The flies often move to the animal's belly on extremely hot days or during rain storms. They will fly up in a swarm when disturbed but immediately return to the animal.

Both male and female horn flies are blood feeders. The flies feed in a head-downward position, holding their wings at a 45-degree angle to their bodies. Each fly feeds intermittently, 10 to 40 times a day for 10 to 25 minutes at a time. Such continual feeding causes the cattle considerable pain and aggravation.

Adult horn flies spend their entire lives on cattle. Females leave only to lay their eggs in manure that is less than two minutes old. Their require-

ment of such fresh manure results in interesting egg-laying behavior. After mating and feeding, the female horn fly moves to the rear of the animal and awaits defecation. As defecation occurs, the fly heads toward the ground and is blanketed with fresh dung.

Each female fly lays up to 500 small, reddish brown eggs in clumps on grass and other vegetation under the manure. The eggs hatch in a few hours; maggots mature in 10 to 14 days. Horn fly maggots develop best in grass-type manure from cattle that are on pasture and poorly on the manure from cattle on concentrated feed.

Horn flies are relatively easy to control with whole-animal chemical sprays and with self-treating devices such as dust bags or back rubbers. Dust bags are most effective when cattle are required to pass under them daily to reach water or mineral supplements. Dust bags leave a deposit of insecticides along the back, the areas where horn flies spend most of their time. Back rubbers allow cattle to treat themselves as they scratch. Feed additives and insecticidal boluses are also options. Feed additives pass through the animal to kill larval stages that develop in fresh cow feces. All animals must eat a minimum dose of a feed additive regularly. An insecticide bolus is a large pill-like formulation that is given orally. The active ingredient, usually an insect growth regulator, is gradually released from the bolus and prevents development fly larvae in manure.

DPS Announces New Residency Requirements For Driver Licenses, Identification Cards

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Public Safety today announced the implementation of new proof of residency requirements to obtain Texas driver licenses or identification cards effective May 7, 2012. The requirements, which only apply to first-time driver license and identification card applicants, are the result of legislation approved by the Texas Legislature.

In addition to the standard requirements necessary to obtain a license or identification card (<http://www.txdps.state.tx.us/DriverLicense/identificationrequirements.htm>), all new applicants will also be required to present two acceptable documents containing the applicant's name and address to establish proof of residency in the state of Texas.

To meet the residency requirement for an original identification card or driver license, an applicant must: Reside in Texas for at least 30 days prior to application Present two acceptable documents establishing proof of residency, one of which must demonstrate the applicant has lived in Texas at least 30 days

The 30-day requirement is waived for applicants who surrender a valid, unexpired out-of-state driver license, but two documents establishing proof of residency are still required. Thistles

I'm not skilled enough to explain all the differences between thistles that have appeared this spring so that you can name them. But I can describe a few of them.

Nodding, (or Musk) thistle and Scot's thistle are the largest, and they came on the earliest from rosettes big enough to cover a bushel basket. Large red-purple flower heads, quite attractive, grew to 5 feet tall and with many branches except on a poor site where they grew only 1 foot tall. Nodding thistle is bright green and Scot's is grayish, and both have spiny ribbons of leaves up and down the stems.

Another with large red-purple flower heads, and much less common is Milk (or Blessed)

thistle. The big rosette leaves have white splotches on them as if milk were spilled on them, hence the name. The "Blessed" name comes from the notion that it was milk from the Virgin Mary, which also gave it some medicinal value. The spines on the flower head are often 2 inches long.

Two thistles with flower heads no larger than a penny, one clustered, the other dispersed, the first pinkish and named Clustered-head thistle, the second yellow and named Star thistle. Clustered-head thistle seems restricted to shady thickets. Star thistle seems to be the smallest and most widespread of all, in pastures, fields, bedding grounds,

and roadsides.

Distaff thistle is the worst, growing from 1 - 3 feet tall with spines so sharp it will cause a horse to balk, and easily penetrate the barrier of stiff new blue jeans. It is spindly looking with grey green narrow leaves and more spine than leaf tissue with seldom seen yellow flowers.

All of the above came to us from Europe, the Mediterranean, and Africa. Our own thistle, the Texas thistle, is the last to bloom in roadsides, fields, and pastures where more water than average has accumulated. Its flower heads are dark pink the size of a quarter and quite attractive on slender stems, sometimes with bits of cotton fuzz on the stems and leaves.

Seeds of all the thistles are valuable to seed-eating birds, and often a Goldfinch can be perched on a Texas thistle searching for seeds or pulling out fuzz for nest construction. A rancher near Doss swears that he has raised good crops of goats on thistles when they learn how to eat them, but I'm not sure I believe all his story. Most thistles are ungrazed.

There are other thistles, but these are the main ones in our area. They come and go with the weather, on the increase with rain and soil disturbance, on the decrease with drought and competition from grasses and other weeds. They are hard to control and impossible to eliminate. Spraying with herbicides is very effective in the rosette stages, but when sprayed in full flower, many seeds are produced anyway by the dying plant that will grow thistle the next wet season. Spray early or the spray is wasted, or it damages the competition. With Texas thistle, why spray at all!

Texas Comptroller's Office Is Helping Property Taxpayers Know Their Rights

The Property Taxpayer Remedies Publication Is Now Available at the Sutton County Appraisal District

Property taxpayers looking for answers to their questions can refer to the Texas Comptroller's 2012 publication *Property Taxpayer Remedies*. The reference guide addresses property tax basics, providing a step by step guide on preparing for a protest hearing and what they can do if they are dissatisfied with an appraisal review board's decision.

"As a taxpayer, you should know your rights and understand the options available to you under the law," said Texas Comptroller Susan Combs. "The *Property Taxpayer Remedies* publication is a resource of information for a sometimes complicated process."

Property Taxpayer Remedies also provides key dates so property owners know what they must do and when they are required to act to exercise their right to protest.

The publication is also available from the Comptroller's Property Tax Assistance Division at 1-800-252-9121 and press "2" to access the menu and then press "1" to contact Information Services Team or visit the Comptroller's website at www.window.state.tx.us/taxinfo/proptax/.

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the market or appraised value of your property
- the unequal appraisal of your property
- the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
- any exemptions that may apply to you
- the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal
- the taxable status of your property
- the local governments which should be taxing your property
- the ownership of property
- the change of use of land receiving special appraisal
- any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board that applies to and adversely affects you.

Informal Review

Review by the Appraisal Review Board
If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening or on a Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD plans to introduce at the hearing to establish any matter at issue. The law provides that before a hearing on a protest or immediately after the hearing begins, you or your agent and the CAD shall each provide the other with a copy of any written material intended to be offered or submitted to the ARB at the hearing. To the greatest extent practicable, the hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. In most cases, the CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the ARB approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

* The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

In certain protests where the owner has submitted an independent appraisal before the hearing, the chief appraiser has the burden of proving the property's value by clear and convincing evidence. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court or an Arbitrator or SOAH

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 60 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. In certain cases, as an alternative to filing an appeal in district court, you may file, not later than the 45th day after you receive notice of the ARB order, a request for binding arbitration with the county appraisal district. In certain cases originating in certain counties, as an alternative to filing an appeal in district court, you may appeal to the State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH). An appeal to SOAH is initiated by, not later than the 30th day after you receive notice of the ARB's order, filing with the chief appraiser of the county appraisal district a notice of appeal. Appeals to District Court, Binding Arbitration, or SOAH all require payment of certain fees or deposits.

Tax Payment

You must pay either the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1) or no later than the 125th day after the date you claim you received a tax bill from one or more of the taxing units that tax your property. The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

Property Owner Protest Hearings Are Set for July 11, 2012

Property owners who disagree with the Sutton County Appraisal District's appraisal of their property for local taxes or for any other action that adversely affects them may protest their property value to the appraisal district's Appraisal Review Board (ARB). The ARB will begin hearing taxpayer protests on July 11, 2012.

After the ARB completes its hearings and approves final property tax appraisals, local governments will use these appraisals to set 2012 property tax rates.

The ARB is a group of citizens who live in the appraisal district and are appointed by the appraisal district's board of directors. Property owners may protest any of the following issues to the ARB:

- the appraised or market value of the property;
- unequal appraisal of the taxpayer's property compared to similar property in the district;
- inclusion of the property on the appraisal records;
- denial of a partial exemption, such as a homestead exemption;
- denial of special appraisals, such as agricultural or timber productivity appraisal;
- determination that agricultural or timber land has had a change of use and is subject to a rollback tax;
- identification of the taxing unit or units in which the property is located;
- determination that the taxpayer is the owner of the property; or
- any other action of the appraisal office that adversely affects the owner.

A property owner must file a written notice of protest before June 1, 2012 or within 30 days after the appraisal district mails the taxpayer a notice of appraised value, whichever is later. The ARB schedules a hearing and sends the protesting property owner written notice of the date, time and place of the hearing. The law contains specific timelines and procedures for both the owner and the ARB throughout the appraisal protest process. These are detailed in the state Comptroller's publication, *Property Taxpayer Remedies*. Copies are available from the Sutton County Appraisal District at 300 E. Oak St., Ste. 2, Sonora, Texas. The publication is also available on the Comptroller's website at www.window.state.tx.us/taxinfo/proptax/ or by calling 1-800-252-9121 and press "2" to access the menu and then press "1" to contact the Information Services Team.

Appraisal Notices for Tax Year 2012 Are On Their Way to Property Owners

If your property value increased in the last year, you will soon receive an appraisal notice from the Sutton County Appraisal District. The appraisal district mailed about 800 appraisal notices on May 15, 2012. Your city, county, school district and other local taxing units will use the appraisal district's value to set your 2012 property taxes.

Under state law, county appraisal districts are required to notify property owners about changes in their property's value. The notice contains important information about the property's location, its ownership and property tax exemptions that have been applied to the property. It must also include an estimate of 2012 taxes by local taxing units.

Property owners who disagree with the appraised value of their property, the exemptions or any other action by the appraisal district have the right to appeal to the Sutton County Appraisal Review Board (ARB). The ARB is an independent panel of citizens responsible for hearing and settling property owner protests. The notice of appraised value includes instructions on how and when to file a protest, a protest form and the Comptroller's *Property Taxpayer Remedies*. The deadline for filing a protest with the ARB is May 31, 2012, or 30 days after the appraisal district mailed you a notice of appraised value, whichever is later.

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs' publication, *Property Taxpayer Remedies*, explains in detail how to protest your property appraisal, what issues the ARB can consider and what to expect during a protest hearing. The publication also discusses the option of taking your case to court or entering into binding arbitration if you are dissatisfied with the outcome of your ARB hearing.

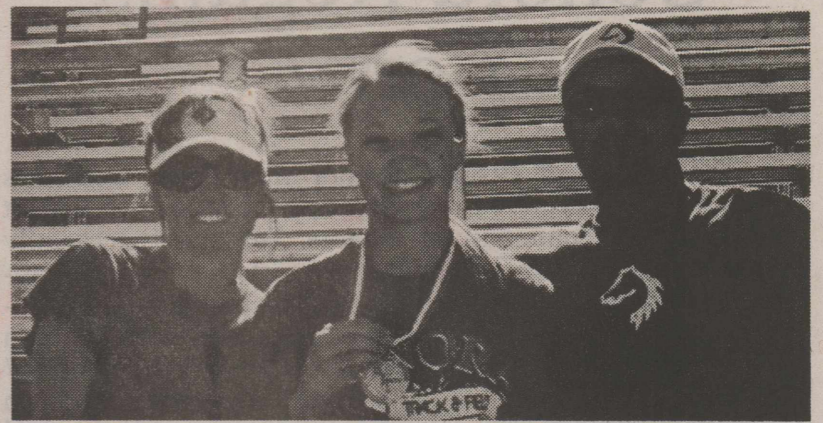

The Nation's Best Bass Fishing Can Be Found in Texas

ATHENS—Fabled Falcon has been ranked the number one bass lake in the country by the editors of Bassmaster magazine, but the good news doesn't stop there.

Another Texas-Mexico border reservoir, Amistad, is number six on the list, and six other Texas reservoirs made the top 100.

The Texas lakes on the list with their rankings are:

- No. 1—Falcon
- No. 6—Amistad
- No. 15—Toledo Bend (shared with Louisiana)
- No. 19—Sam Rayburn
- No. 26—Fork
- No. 39—Choke Canyon
- No. 64—Conroe
- No. 88—O.H. Ivie

"The list was compiled in a months-long process that included research from state fisheries agencies, nominations from B.A.S.S. Federation Nation tournament organizers and a panel of widely traveled professional anglers, fishing writers and others," stated a press release issued by B.A.S.S.

Falcon is legendary among professional bass anglers for its winning four-day bag of 132.5 pounds during the 2008 Bassmaster Elite Series tournament. Tournament-winning catches regularly average eight pounds per fish.

The eight reservoirs in Texas making the top 100 list are the most for any state. Florida has seven.

Of the states bordering Texas, three Arkansas lakes made the list, along with three each from Louisiana and Oklahoma and two from New Mexico.

"This supports the opinion we've long had that Texas has the best largemouth bass fishing in the nation," said Dave Terre, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Inland Fisheries Division chief of research and management. "The aggressive Florida largemouth bass stocking program in Texas coupled with the outstanding efforts of our fisheries biologists who direct our management efforts are responsible for making fishing great in Texas."

Bassmaster editor James Hall said the rankings are based on a variety of factors, not just opinions. "The method was as scientific as we could make it," he said. The 100 Best Bass Lakes list used state fisheries agencies electrofishing and creel survey data, tournament catch data and accessibility and fish stocking practices. The final list was developed by a panel that considered the current fishability of each lake, its history, big fish catches, overall quantity potential and the aesthetics of the surrounding area.
