



According to the most recent audit of the city (conducted by Coleman Horton and Company, LLP) has around \$9 million overall in net assets (money left over after debt is paid). Specifically in the proprietary fund (the fund where we pay fees for water, sewer, sanitation and airport) currently has \$13 million in revenue and \$7 million in expenseswhich means that it has a total of \$6 million dollars after debt is serviced. The General Fund receives its money from property taxes and pays for most of the services the residents of Sonora receive (like police department, code enforcement, senior center, Trax Van, fire department, animal control, parks and street maintenance). Last year's audit showed that the general fund had a total of \$1.7 million dollars in revenue, and \$1.9 million in expendi- on Monday, January 2nd. tures-which means that the Trevino is 5 foot 11 inches General Fund's balance was around -\$200,000. Trevino Escapes from County Jail: The Search Continues

A 20 year old man by the name of Jose Luis Trevino escaped from the Sutton County Jail at approximately 9:30 in the morning and 210 pounds, and was last seen wearing a white jail uniform. At the time of press he was still at large, but Sutton County Sheriff Joe Fincher commented that, "we believe he has left the county all together. He has known ties to people in Del Rio and Ft. Stockton, so we are concentrating our search in those areas he is most likely to look for refuge".

When asked specifically about the escape, Fincher stated that, "he went out through a door that was inadvertently left unlocked. I contacted the Texas Jail Commission immediately and reported the escape, and am in the process of submitting a report to them

as well. Rest assured that we are making corrections to ensure this does not happen again." Fincher was also quick to dispel any rumors on the specific on the escape, "Trevino did not assault anyone in the course of his escape, and he was not a trustee."

The search for Trevino began immediately after his escape, "I contacted all of the area agencies right away to inform them of the situation. I also spoke personally with Kimble County Sheriff Cantu who offered the support of his office." The search also included horse and dog teams from the Colorado City and Ft. Stockton Prisons, a DPS helicopter, Sutton County Sheriff's department, Sonora Police Department, Texas Ranger support, The Border Patrol and support from the U.S. Marshall's Service.

Jack's services were held at Sunset Memorial Gardens and Funeral Home in Odessa, Texas on December 27th at 2 P.M.

Pattie Edwards Merrill passed away on Sunday, December 30, 2012. She was born in Washington DC on March 21st, 1924 to John Rawlings Edwards and Camilla McMullan Edwards. She lost her precious mother to tuberculosis iwhen she was only 5 months old. She then led a happy and carefree life in Hertford, NC being raised by her grandparents Pattie Valentine Edwards and W.F. Clifton Edwards (Mama and Papa) She graduated from Perquimans County High School in 1941 then entered East Carolina Teachers College.

While in college, on a school break, she went to a dance via a bus that went through town picking up the local girls. By the time the bus got to her house, it was full of all the girls plus the military men from bases in the area. Pat had to take a seat that was already occupied by two people. She spotted one by a cute navy boy and the rest was history! She married that man, Lieutenant Leo B. Merrill on January 6th, 1944. After a very short honeymoon, he went back in service and she finished college. After she graduated, they headed to California where he would be released from active military status and begin looking for a job. As they were driving through the panhandle of Texas in the late summer in extreme heat, she stated "you couldn't make me come back to this state if you gave it to me". Little did she know that they would be back there in less than six months and she would later say about her beloved Texas, "I wasn't born here but I got here as fast as I could!" Leo found his job at the Texas A&M Experiment Station in Sonora and Pat immediately fell in love with the country life: the beautiful hills and oaks, all the wonderful little animals and the people that would become life long friends. Pat began her teaching career at Rocksprings High School teaching Home Economics. After her first child Clift came along and started school, she took a 7th grade science class in Sonora. When her second child, Pattie, started school she found her true calling: teaching Kindergarten.

She started that phase of her career by going to L.W. Elementary in Sonora with a class of 20 children that spoke little or no English. She spoke no Spanish but with her mentor and savior Jewel Sykes by her side, they all learned from each other and by the end of the year the children were fluent in English. For five years, she taught kindergarten classes of all Spanish-only-speaking children and as a result, there are around a hundred 46-51 year-old former students of Mrs. Merrill's living in Texas and the U.S. who now speak English with an east North Carolinian accent.

When that school closed, she moved to Sonora Central Elementary where she finished her career with 33 years of teaching to her credit. Also, in 1977 she received her masters degree in elementary education from Texas A & M university. She was extremely proud to be both an ECTC pirate and a Fightin' Texas Aggie!

Her retirement years were spent traveling, with her favorite places to visit being Tasmania, part of a trip to Australia, and Nags Head NC, where she went every summer of her life until the last two years. She loved playing bridge with those lifelong friends, and her favorite part of retirement was to spend time with her kids and grand kids. She would drop everything if a game of gofish was requested and would always fill an order of pot roast, twice baked potatoes, lime sherbet and of course oatmeal!

Both her kids and all five grand daughters got to see her and spend precious moments with her the day before she left her earthly body and they will always cherish those moments.

Pat was preceded in death by her mother Camilla Edwards, her grandmother Pattie Edwards, grandfather Clifton Edwards, special aunt and second mother Mildred "Mic" Whitley, father Jack Edwards, step-mother Mary Shepard "Emmy" Edwards and husband of 60 years Leo Merrill.

Pat is survived by her children, son Clifton Edwards Merrill, his wife Pat and much loved grand dogs Shadow



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



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
