
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## Bronco Golf

T-ball & Baseball Age of player on April 30, 2013, MUST BE 4 years old by 04/30/2013

Tee Ball Baseball is for boys and girls 4-6 years old who want to learn the fundamentals of hitting and fielding. In Tee Ball, players hit a ball off a batting tee. Rules of the game may be varied to accommodate the need for teaching. ### **Lingering Aftereffects of Drought Could Impact Turkey Hunting**

AUSTIN — Turkey hunters can focus their attention on coaxing old boss toms during the upcoming spring season, with relatively few gullible two-year-old birds available, but will also have to contend with curious jakes, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife biologists.

Rio Grande spring turkey hunting season in the 54-county South Zone runs March 16-April 28. In the 101 counties comprising the North Zone, the season opens March 30 and runs through May 12. A special one-gobbler limit season opens April 1 and continues through April 30 in Bastrop, Caldwell, Colorado, Fayette, Jackson, Lavaca, Lee and Milam counties.

"We had phenomenal production in 2010, which means there should be good hunting opportunities this spring for big old gobblers,"saidJasonHardin,turkeyprogramcoordinatorforTPWD,

age to above average production so there will also be a large number of jakes on the landscape this spring." "The drought of 2011 wreaked havoc on wild turkey produc-


tion," Hardin continued. "There was almost zero nesting effort and the handful of hens attempting a nest were almost all unsuccessful. This will be obvious this spring with almost no two-year-old gobblers across Texas' Rio Grande turkey range."

Eastern spring turkey hunting in the 28 counties having an open season runs April 15-May 14. According to Hardin, the Eastern turkey population remains stable, but is not expanding to the degree that biologists have hoped.

"Easterns across most of Texas have not shown much growth outside of a few areas stocked in 2007-2008," he said. "Those stocked sites were part of a research project examining a new stocking strategy known as super stocking."

This method calls for flooding the best available habitat with 80 turkeys (60 females and 20 males). The old stocking method only placed 15-20 birds per site. Following the positive results of this "super stocking" research, TPWD is now looking for large, high quality sites to be evaluated as potential future releases sites. These sites can be single ownership or a cooperative on private or public lands. Hunters are reminded all harvested Eastern turkeys must be

taken to a check station within 24 hours. To find the check station nearest you, contact a TPWD field office or call (800) 792-1112.

Duck, Duck ... Cormorant

A Titus County game warden responded to a trespass call on a large ranch in northern Titus County. When the two hunters from the neighboring ranch were located, they admitted to trespassing and said that they were jumping ducks on the area ponds. One hunter said that they had only shot one duck while trespassing. When the warden asked for the duck, he was told that they did not get the duck because it fell over the high fence inside the deer breeder pens. The bird was recovered from the pens and discovered to be a cormorant. Citations were issued for hunting a protected waterfowl-cormorant, criminal trespass, shooting across property lines, and no hunter safety course.

A Rockwall County game warden checked two duck hunters on their way out of their blind. When asked to provide three shells to check the plug, one of the hunters produced two shells and a marijuana pipe from his pocket. The hunter quickly tried to take the pipe back, but the warden took possession of it. The hunter was cited for possession of drug paraphernalia, and the other hunter was cited for an unplugged shotgun.

Two Houston County game wardens received a call about a subject who had shot at a deer from a county road. The wardens drove to the subject's residence where they were greeted by a young man walking down the road who said to them, "I'm the person you are looking for."

Two Polk County game wardens were patrolling for night hunting violations when they heard a vehicle roll to a stop up the road. The wardens could hear the subjects kill the truck and then one subject walked by their location. Earlier in the evening, the wardens had received a call of spotlighting in a field near their set. Due to rattling and different noises coming from the subjects' location, wardens were concerned that the subjects had loaded a deer. After a while, the vehicle started up and the wardens stopped the vehicle up the road only to find the subject was not road hunting but stealing ground wires on utility poles. In addition, the subject had a bag of what appeared to be synthetic marijuana. One subject was apprehended, and wardens turned the subject over to the Polk County Sheriff's Office.

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
