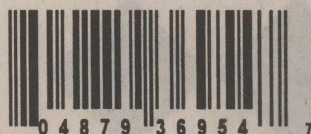

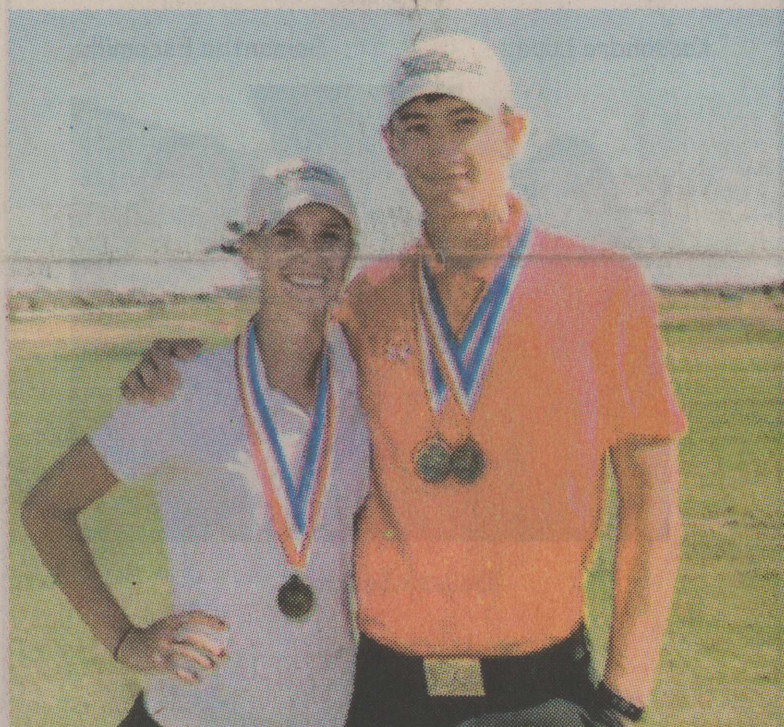
Sonora Sweeps District Golf

Living with Drought

In Elmer Kelton's book, *The Time it Never Rained*, he wrote "Each new generation tends to forget – until it confronts the sobering reality – that dryness has always been the normal condition in the western half of the state. Wet years have been the exceptions." Elmer had a method of writing that cut directly to the chase. We would all do well to read and appreciate this piece of writing, especially with our current on-going drought.

Drought is an inevitable part of normal climate fluctuation and should be considered a recurring, unpredictable environmental feature which must be included in planning. Muddled views and lagged responses toward drought pose a threat to sustainable management of our ranch-lands as well as our municipal water sources.

Much of the confusion about drought results from various perspectives of how to define it. Also, the beginning and end of a drought are hard to recognize because drought is a gradual phenomenon. The effects of drought often accumulate slowly as a dry period begins and may linger after expected rainfall patterns have resumed.

Okay, so we understand that drought is a normal part of our environment and we should learn how to live and plan for it. However, what if drought is becoming more frequent and severe? What if the summers are getting hotter and lasting longer while the winters are getting warmer and shorter? Some scientists predict that we live in a region that is a climate-change "hot spot" in North America and that in the coming decades, our area will become increasingly susceptible to hotter and drier weather. If this is actually happening we need to be proactive rather than reactive.

Being informed is one part of the proactive approach. Because of these concerns the Texas A&M AgriLife Research Station and the Sutton County Underground Water Conservation District are conducting a "Water is Life" program on April 18, 2013 (see below).

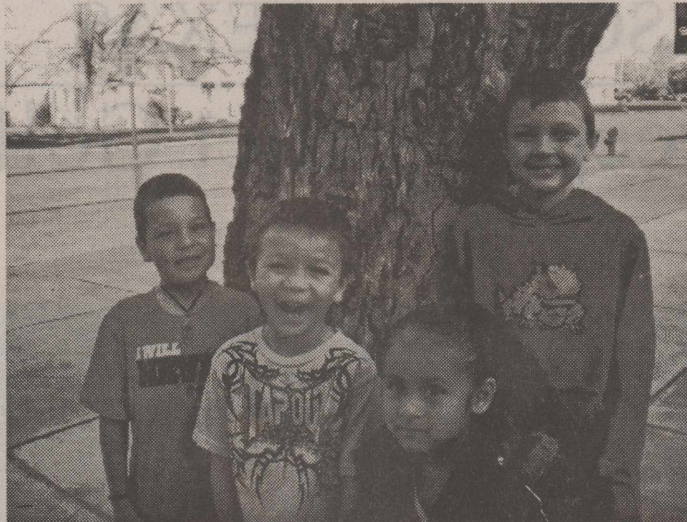

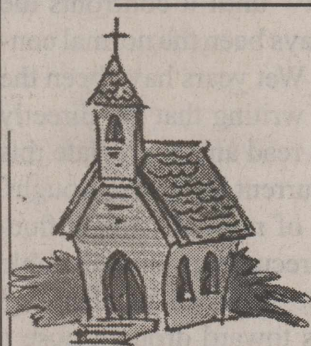

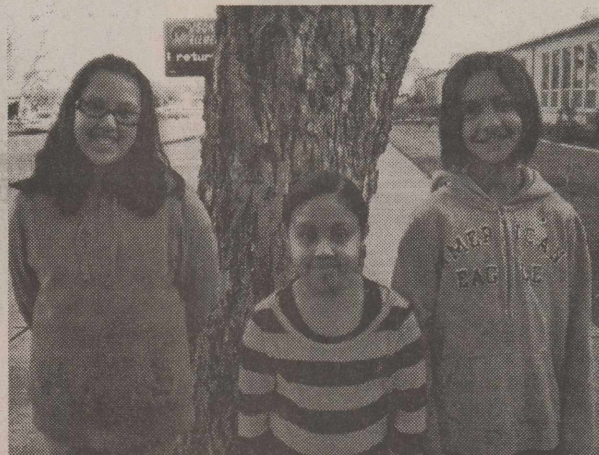

Sonora Elementary Pre-Kindergarten Registration Dates Pre-registration for the 2013-2014 school year will be held on Monday, April 15th and Tuesday, April 16th from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. at the Sonora Elementary School office. Students enrolling in Pre-Kindergarten must be three or four years old on or before September 1, 2013.

Students who are three or four years of age on or before September 1, 2013 must meet one of the following qualification requirements: 1) be unable to speak and comprehend the English language; or 2) be educationally disadvantaged (eligible to participate in the National School Lunch Program [NSLP]); or 3) be homeless; or 4) be the child of an active duty member of the armed forces of the United States, including the state military forces or a reserved component of the armed forces, who is ordered to active duty by proper authority; or 5) be the child of a member of the armed forces of the United States, including the state military forces or a reserved component of the armed forces, who was injured or killed while serving on active duty; or 6) have ever been in the conservatorship of the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services (foster care) following an adversary hearing.

Students four years of age on or before September 1, 2013 who do not qualify for Pre-Kindergarten may pay tuition. Tuition will be \$300.00 per month due on the first of each month beginning in August and the last payment will be in April. Class size, however, will be limited and classes will be filled on a first come first serve basis.

You must provide a copy of your child's birth certificate,

social security card, and current immunization record. Your child will not be placed in a class until immunizations are current and proof is provided.

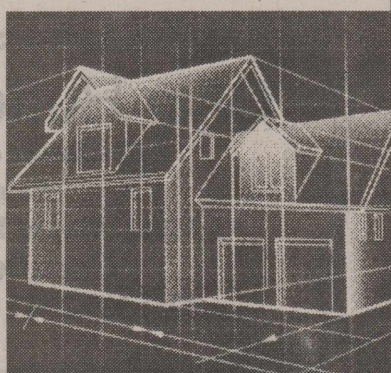

Buffalograss Good Fit For Native Lawns

Because of our need for conservation, many look to native grass lawns due to the lower maintenance requirements. The ideal that comes to mind for those wanting a "native" landscape is buffalograss.

Buffalograss, *Buchloe dactyloides*, is a perennial grass native to the Great Plains from Montana to Mexico. It is a warm season perennial grass whose height is only 8 to 10 inches. This is one of the grasses that supported the great herds of buffalo that roamed the Great Plains. Its tolerance to prolonged droughts and to extreme temperatures enables buffalograss to survive extreme environmental conditions. However, overgrazing and, in the case of turf, over use or excessive traffic are the pressures that lead to the deterioration of a stand of buffalograss.

Buffalograss is best adapted to low rainfall areas (15 to 30 inches annually) or areas that receive thorough, but infrequent irrigation. When it is planted in high rainfall areas or when it is irrigated and fertilized, bermudagrass and other weedy grasses invade. Buffalograss is also not adapted to shaded sites or to sites that receive heavy traffic.

Buffalograss can be established from seed (burs) or sod. There are male and female plants, but only rarely are both male and female flowers produced on the same plant. When planting buffalograss vegetatively, female plants are generally selected since they do not produce the taller

seedstalks.

April and May are the best months to plant seeds as temperatures are favorable and moisture is generally adequate. With irrigation the planting date can be extended into July and August. Treated seed germinate in 7 to 10 days if moisture is adequate.

Seeding rates may range from less than 0.5 pounds of seed per 1,000 sq. ft. to 4 to 6 pounds, depending on the method of planting and the time available to obtain a cover. With no irrigation, broadcast seedling rates of 1 to 2 lbs. per 1,000 sq. ft. may require several seasons to develop a complete cover. In contrast, broadcast seeding rates of 4 to 6 lbs. per 1,000 sq. ft. will cover in several months with adequate moisture.

Mowing height and frequency depend on the use of the site. In lawns, it can be mowed at heights of 2 to 3 inches. Buffalograss does not need fertilization, but will respond to light applications of nitrogen. Nitrogen fertilization should not exceed 2 lbs. of nitrogen per 1,000 sq. ft. per year. As with irrigation, excessive nitrogen promotes bermudagrass invasion.

Buffalograss will survive extended drought but will lose color as it enters dormancy. Therefore, irrigate only enough to maintain growth and prevent dormancy. For complete details, visit <http://sutton.agrilife.org> or contact the Sutton County Extension Office.

Scheicher County Gets New Extension Agent

ELDORADO – Cody Bridges has been named the new Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service agriculture and natural resources agent for Schleicher County, according to an announcement made by Schleicher County judge Charlie Bradley and Scott Durham, AgriLife Extension administrator at San Angelo. Bridges will complete AgriLife Extension's First Step orientation training in Runnels County beginning April 15, prior to starting his permanent assignment in Schleicher County on May 15. "We are very pleased to have Cody join us here in the West Central District," Durham said. "He was raised in this area, so he knows the country. He was also very active in the 4-H and FFA youth programs while growing up and so has a good background in the workings of AgriLife Extension's 4-H youth component. He's a very personable young man, and I predict he will make a fine fit not only in Schleicher County, but within the 23-county district as well."

Bridges earned a bachelor's degree in animal science with a minor in range and wildlife management from Angelo State University in 2012. He also obtained an associates degree in golf course and landscape technology in 2007 from Western Texas College.

Along with a background in agriculture, Bridges past work experience includes golf course management, feed store sales and warehouse maintenance and retail western wear sales. He has also performed community volunteer work with multiple livestock shows including the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo and the stock shows in Coke and Crane counties.

State Game Wardens Seize Nearly \$4 Million Worth of Marijuana on Lower Border

AUSTIN – Texas Parks and Wildlife Department game wardens have seized more than two tons of marijuana worth nearly \$4 million.

"This is one of if not the largest drug seizure by Texas game wardens in the history of our agency," said TPWD Law Enforcement Director Craig Hunter. "Obviously, we are very proud of the wardens involved in this case. Beyond that, we are tremendously pleased to have played a part in preventing such a large cache of marijuana from reaching our streets."

The drug seizure occurred about 7 p.m. on Wednesday in Starr County near the U.S.-Mexican border in South Texas. Retail value of the marijuana was estimated at \$3,775,440.

"A game warden received information that marijuana was being stashed at a residence in the Salineno area. Game wardens then requested assistance from the U.S. Border Patrol," said TPWD Maj. Alan Teague.

When the warden and Border Patrol agents approached the residence, the federal officers saw three men running from the rear of the structure. The officers shouted for the men to stop, but they kept running. After a foot pursuit, two of the three men were apprehended.

While escorting the two individuals back to the resi-

dence, the officers observed a large pile of bundles which appeared to be packaged marijuana. A closer inspection along with a Border Patrol canine confirmed the bundles were in fact marijuana. Officers also discovered an underground bunker located near the pile of marijuana bundles which contained more marijuana.

A total of 409 bundles of marijuana weighing 4,719 pounds were recovered from the back yard area. It took six trucks to carry the marijuana to a federal storage facility.

"Texas game wardens routinely come across illegal drug smuggling operations, especially in rural areas and along the border region," said Chief of Special Operations Grahame Jones, "but this seizure was particularly significant."

The two suspects were released to the Border Patrol, along with the seized marijuana.

"We certainly appreciate the assistance of the Border Patrol in this case," said Lt. Col. Danny Shaw. "TPWD has a close working relationship with the Border Patrol and other law enforcement agencies along the border, and this is a perfect example of how that pays off for the citizens of Texas."
