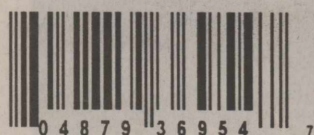

On Monday through Thursday (April 15-18), the Sonora Lady Broncos and Broncos invaded the Ratliff Ranch Golf Links for the Regional golf Tournament. The Lady Broncos were first up on Monday and Tuesday....On a very windy Monday, the Lady Broncos (362-345-707) found themselves trailing the team from Jim Ned. Tuesday turned out to be hot and beautiful, just like the golf the Lady Broncos produced. The Lady Broncos stormed back and took the lead in the tournament, winning the Regional Championship. Leading the Lady Bronco team was Sidney Dermody (79-70-149) to take the top medalist stop.

Darby Ramsdell (80-81-161) placed 3rd in the medalist race along with Logan Smith (86-82-168) placing 5th overall. Other members of the team included Katie Hartman (117-112-229) and Kali Mendez (130-122-252). A super job by the Lady Bronco team!! They will next compete in the state golf tournament on May 2 and 3 at Roy Kiser golf course in Austin. Good Luck Lady Broncos !!!!

The boys got their turn at the regional course on Wednesday and Thursday. The boys started off very well and turned in good scores the first day of competition...On the second day, the boys cooled off just like the weather did when a

cold front pushed through with very cool winds from the north. The Broncos (332-342-674) came up 1 stroke short of a return trip to Austin. Leading the Broncos and getting to go play in the state golf tournament on May 2 and 3 were: Hunter Hughes (75-76-151) 3rd medalist and Jansen McBride (75-77-152) placing 4th in the medalist race. Other members of the team were Gabe Rollert (93-87-180), Sid Anderson (89-102-191), and Kade Wimberley (102-111-213). Even though the boys team didn't make the return trip to Austin, they had a very good season. Good Luck Hunter and Jansen at the state tournament.

Bronco Track Stars To Run In Austin

The most athletes in recent history will be making the trip to Austin on May 10&11 for the UIL Track and Field State Championship Meet. The Sonora Broncos' Boys' Track Team won the Region 1-2A Meet on Saturday in Odessa's Ratliff Stadium with 96 points-blowing away the competition. Senior Hagen Kennedy set a Regional Meet record in the Friday Preliminary Heats

with a 14.02 in the 110m Hurdles. The Lady Broncos (who tied for second as a five member team) set a school record in the 4X200m relay by running a 1:45.2. Jacinda Sanchez will cap her track career by winning the Gold medal in the Region Long Jump and setting a Personal Record of 18 feet 3.5 inches. She will also be running in the two relays the Lady Broncos' qualified in - the 4X100m and the 4X200m. Se-

nior Avery Nolen and junior Anastacio Munoz both qualified in the 300m Hurdles. Senior Darien Lopez will be running in three events at the State Meet. He won the 200m after running a 21.7 in the Preliminary Heats on Friday, and will anchor both the 4X200m and the 4X400m Relays. It was a GREAT day to be a Sonora Bronco and a Lady Bronco.

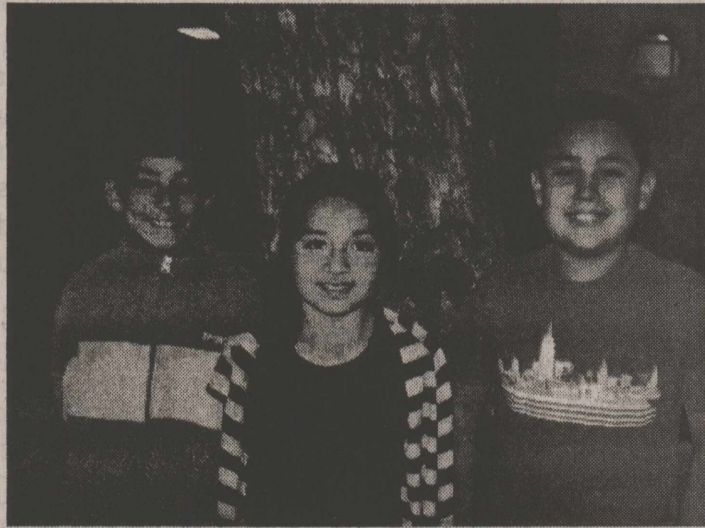

Missing Colorado City Girl Identified

On March 16, 2013, local authorities were notified of human remains located near Lake J.B. Thomas in southwest Scurry County. The remains were sent to the University of North Texas, Center for Human Identification for DNA analysis. On April 26, 2013, the Scurry County District Attorney's office received written confirmation that the remains have been positively identified as those of Hailey Dunn.

On December 28, 2010, 13-year-old Hailey was reported missing by her mother, Billie Dunn. The report was taken by the Colorado City Police Department, and she has been listed as a missing person since that date.

This is a joint investigation of the Scurry County Sheriff's Office, the Mitchell County Sheriff's Office, the Colorado City Police Department, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Texas Rangers and other local and county officials. The investigation into the circumstances of Hailey's disappearance and death is ongoing, and official information regarding the investigation will come from the office of the Scurry County Sheriff or his designee.

If you have information to provide about the disappearance of Hailey Dunn, please call the Scurry County Sheriff's Office 325-573-3551, the FBI Dallas Division 972-559-5000, Crime Stoppers 1-800-252-8477 or submit a tip online at tips.fbi.gov. Callers may remain anonymous.

What are deer eating during drought?

Though we finally got good showers the last week in April, it has been so dry, that I've wondered what deer are surviving on. Those that don't have access to corn feeders have to look pretty hard for a meal.

Thank the Good Lord for "brush" during times like this. Deer are no doubt subsisting primarily on cedar, pricklypear and mesquite. Mesquite is flowering now and may produce a good bean crop. Pricklypear flower buds are now showing up and should have a good crop of flowers and then fruits. I think there is sufficient brush that deer will have enough to eat to keep them alive until better times come. Of course, if someone wants to help out the deer a bit, they can always get out the pear burner!

Amazingly, despite how bad things have been, there have still been quite a few deep rooted perennial forbs (listed below) and they have been actively grazed by goats and deer. Somehow, they have been able to find a little moisture deep in the rocky hills to produce a tiny bit of green leaf. Most of these forbs are only 1 inch tall and need rain badly, but they are present.

Here are some examples: Purple dalea, Dwarf dalea, Prostrate globe mallow, Spreading sida, Bladderpod sida, Orange zexmenia, Bush sunflower, Hairy tubetonge, Noseburn, Wild mercury, Primrose, Rock daisy, Showy menoora, Low menoora, Milkwort, Bumbleflower, Passion flower, Knotweed leaf flower, Angel trumpet, Trailing ratany, Snoutbean, Carlowrightia, Navajo tea, Dutchman pipe, Fleabane, Wild buckwheat, Indian mallow, Mexican sagewort, Perennial spurge, Bluets, Verbena, Yellow spiny daisy, Dwarf aster, Grassland croton, Leatherweed croton, and False ragweed.

It seems that many range and wildlife folks do not have a good appreciation for these deep-rooted, drought-hardy perennial forbs. Too many of us ignore them when we assess deer habitat, and focus exclusively on browse. Thank goodness for these forbs and let's pray for more rain.

Keep SONORA Beautiful

The weather was perfect; the students got to learn a lot; and our Community benefited from this Arbor Day! The students will look back through the years and remember their tree that they helped plant; be it the "Charlie Brown" out at the baseball field, the "Ms. Fields" out at the Cemetery, or maybe it was the "Bob" they planted at Liberty Park. Texas Game Wardens Seize Illegally Hunted Wildlife Mounts and Drugs in Williamson County

TEMPLE — Texas Game Wardens and Williamson County sheriff's deputies serving a search warrant at a Williamson County residence over the weekend seized a collection of illegally taken wildlife mounts, a quantity of marijuana and \$4,000 in cash.

The search began about 11:30 a.m. Saturday. A 55-year-old man was taken into custody.

During the search, game wardens recovered 52 mounts of wildlife believed to have been illegally taken in several states, more than 2 pounds of marijuana, and the cash. The taxidermy items are believed to have been hunted illegally in multiple states and Canada. Species include fish, white-tailed deer, Aoudad, assorted sheep, bear, boar, fox, bobcat, and many other exotics.

The search and subsequent arrest was the culmination of a six-month investigation that began after a hunting outfitter in Iowa became suspicious of a man driving a truck with Texas license plates. The investigation revealed identity theft and numerous documents forged under a false name.

The investigation continues and more charges are expected to be filed at a later date.

Sign-up starts for AgriLife Extension's West Texas Youth Veterinary Science Workshop

SAN ANGELO — Applications are now being accepted for the West Texas Youth Veterinary Science Workshop, slated for June 2-6 at the Tom Green County 4-H Center in San Angelo.

The camp-style workshop is open to all Texas youth, but because enrollment is limited to 30 students, early registration is advised, said organizers. The workshop is conducted by the

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service offices in Sutton, Tom Green, Coke, Navarro and Potter counties.

"This is our 11th year to conduct this camp and it just seems to get better and more popular each time," said Pascual Hernandez, AgriLife Extension agent in Sutton County. "Veterinary science is one of those fields where interest remains strong, though the demographics seem to be changing. About 70 percent of our participants are now girls, and that mirrors what is happening in veterinary school enrollment across the country."

Hernandez said the program is meant to introduce high school students to careers in veterinary science and related fields.

"We really want them to get a taste of the veterinary science field, but our goal is not to persuade anyone toward veterinary medicine, but rather to clarify career interests and their chosen field of study after attending our workshop. Related careers might include zoology, animal nutrition, biologicals or one of the pharmaceutical professions."

Instructors will include veterinarians, university and Texas A&M AgriLife Research and AgriLife Extension faculty, and other professionals, according to Hernandez.

Course topics will include zoology, toxicology, parasitology, anatomy, nutrition, anatomy, first aid, livestock health management, large and small animal practice, and horse science. The workshop will include classroom study, lab work and field trips.

Hernandez said participants must be of high school age, have an interest in veterinary science and be willing to work in teams. He said adult project leaders also may apply, but must pass a background check before participating.
