Missing Colorado City Girl Identified

On March 16, 2013, local authorities were notified of human remains located near Lake J.B. Thomas in southwest Scurry County. The remains were sent to the University of North Texas, Center for Human Identification for DNA analysis. On April 26, 2013, the Scurry County District Attorney's office received written confirmation that the remains have been positively identified as those of Hailey Dunn.

On December 28, 2010, 13-year-old Hailey was reported missing by her mother, Billie Dunn. The report was taken by the Colorado City Police Department, and she has been listed as a missing person since that date.

This is a joint investigation of the Scurry County Sheriff's Office, the Mitchell County Sheriff's Office, the Colorado City Police Department, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Texas Rangers and other local and county officials. The investigation into the circumstances of Hailey's disappearance and death is ongoing, and official information regarding the investigation will come from the office of the Scurry County Sheriff or his designee.

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What are deer eating during drought?



By Pascual Hernandez, Sutton County Agricultural Extension Agent

Though we finally got good showers the last week in April, it has been so dry, that I've wondered what deer are surviving on. Those that don't have access to corn feeders have to look pretty hard for a meal.


Thank the Good Lord for "brush" during times like this. Deer are no doubt subsisting primarily on cedar, pricklypear and mesquite. Mesquite is flowering now and may produce a good bean crop. Pricklypear flower buds are now showing up and should have a good crop of flowers and then fruits. I think there is sufficient brush that deer will have enough to eat to keep them alive until better times come. Of course, if someone wants to help out the deer a bit, they can always get out the pear burner!

Amazingly, despite how bad things have been, there have still been quite a few deep rooted perennial forbs (listed below) and they have been actively grazed by goats and deer. Somehow, they have been able to find a little moisture deep these forbs are only 1 inch tall and need rain badly, but they

Here are some examples: Purple dalea, Dwarf dalea, Prostrate globe mallow, Spreading sida, Bladderpod sida, Orange zexmenia, Bush sunflower, Hairy tubetonge, Noseburn, Wild mercury, Primrose, Rock daisy, Showy menoora, Low menodora, Milkwort, Bundleflower, Passion flower, Knotweed leaf flower, Angel trumpet, Trailing ratany, Snoutbean, Carlowrightia, Navajo tea, Dutchman pipe, Fleabane, Wild buckwheat, Indian mallow, Mexican sagewort, Perennial spurge, Bluets, Verbena, Yellow spiny daisy, Dwarf aster, Grassland croton, Leatherweed croton, and False ragweed.


It seems that many range and wildlife folks do not have a good appreciation for these deep-rooted, drought-hardy perennial forbs. Too many of us ignore them when we assess deer habitat, and focus exclusively on browse. Thank goodness for these forbs and let's pray for more rain.







"This is our 11th year to seems to get better and more popular each time," said Pascual Hernandez, AgriLife Extension agent in Sutton County. "Veterinary science is one of those fields where interest mographics seem to be changing. About 70 percent of our participants are now girls, and that mirrors what is happening in veterinary school enrollment across the country."

Hernandez said the program is meant to introduce high school students to careers in veterinary science and related fields.

"We really want them to get a taste of the veterinary science field, but our goal is not to persuade anyone toward veterinary medicine, but rather to clarify career interests and their chosen field of study after attending our workshop. Related careers might include zoology, animal nutrition, biologics or one of the pharmaceutical professions."

Instructors will include veterinarians, university and Texas A&M AgriLife Research and AgriLife Extension faculty, and other professionals, according to Hernandez.

Course topics will include zoology, toxicology, parasitology, anatomy, nutrition, anatomy, first aid, livestock health management, large and small animal practice, and horse science. The workshop will include classroom study, lab work and field trips.


Hernandez said participants must be of high school age, have an interest in veterinary science and be willing to work in teams. He said adult project leaders also may apply, but must pass a background check before participating.

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
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
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
