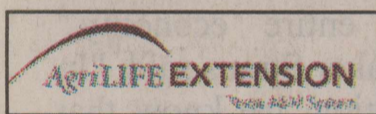

The Sonora Academy of Arts held its annual dance recital on Sunday June 2nd. The Highschool Auditorium was turned into a visage of the old west, while the dance students transformed from girls into everything western from banditos to butterflies.

Sonora Academy of Arts director Lizzie Chavez commented that, "I am just so proud of all of my students this year. They did a great job on that stage."

Production for the recital starts from the very beginning, "we start working on the recital as early as September.

Usually I know what I want to do (what theme we want to use) around December and we start looking at different music I want to use for the recital. Last year's recital was the Amazon Critter Carnival, so this year we decided to bring it a little closer to home with the Wild West Review".

The music she selected for this years recital ranged from old western classics like the Westphalia Waltz, and the Lovers Waltz to contemporary country by Jessica Simpson and The Dixie Chicks.

There was also a wide assortment of dances performed.

"We offer lessons in Tap, Jazz, Ballet, and creative Dance. This year we even had a student that dance and sang. Lexi Martin sang the old Texas Standard "Deep in the Heart of Texas" and by

the end of her number she had the entire audience clapping along".

p.m. All kids between the age of 3 and 13 are welcome. If they haven't taken dance before it's a great way to introduce them to the art, and if they have taken dance (either from me or someone else) it's a great way to stay up to speed with technique." EARLY SONORA REVISITED

I perked up this morning when I opened my email because there was a message from Patricia Johnson. I knew she didn't owe me one so that probably meant I was going to get some new (to me) information about Sonora. It always amazes me how much Patricia and Jo-Ann Palmer, relative new-comers to these parts like me, know about our town and its people.

Long story short, Patricia and Alvis's oldest daughter, Beverly Smith, has a friend, Ruth Cattles Cottrell, who is the great grand daughter of one John McNeil Roberts. 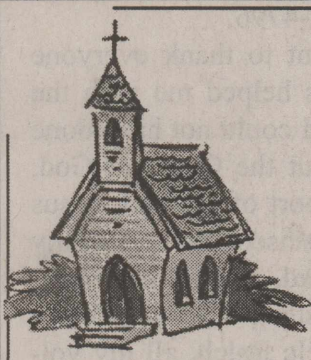

Landmark Water Legislation

Gov. Rick Perry ceremonially signed House Bill 4, which lays the foundation for meeting Texas' water future needs. HB 4 provides for active, full-time governance at the Texas Water Development Board; creates a new funding mechanism to support water-supply project implementation over the next 50 years; and directs local, regional and state officials to prioritize projects to ensure efficient use of available resources. The governor was joined by Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and Speaker Joe Straus, as well as bill authors Reps. Allan Ritter, Four Price, Eric Johnson, Doug Miller and Eddie Lucio III, and sponsor Sen. Troy Fraser at the signing ceremony.

"Water is an essential part of everyone's life, and ensuring adequate supplies means continued job creation, stronger communities and healthier families for decades to come," Gov. Perry said. "HB 4 will help secure our water supplies for generations, even through rapid population and economic growth, by creating new funds that will support local and regional projects and lower the cost of issuing bonds for much-needed water projects."

HB 4 will ensure Texas has a reliable water supply for the next 50 years by promoting conservation and innovative re-use. With voter approval of SJR 1 this fall, this \$2 billion investment will fund up to \$30 billion in projects over the next 50 years. These measures will help address the increased demand population growth will have on our water needs now and into the future.

"Our state's economic engine continues to outpace the rest of the nation, so we're taking aggressive steps to ensure our infrastructure can support the accompanying growth," Lt. Gov. Dewhurst said. "This bill is part of an overall solution that combines great fiscal stewardship with citizen involvement and sound strategic planning to meet our state's water needs for the next fifty years." "The Texas House made HB 4 a top priority because we have all seen the devastating effects that severe drought can have on our farms, our communities and our entire economy," Speaker Straus said. "In addition, we know that a reliable supply of water will help us remain the leading state in the country for job creation."

"It has been an honor to work with leadership on securing our future water supply," Rep. Ritter said. "The Governor and the Legislature worked together to help ensure that we will have our most essential element to public health and economic growth for decades to come."

"The drought not only has an impact on the health and safety of our communities but it also affects our State's economy and the ability to attract new businesses," Sen. Fraser said. "I am glad that we finally passed HB 4 to implement the State Water Plan, so we can ensure Texas will have sufficient water supplies during times of drought."

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Angler Sets New Fly Rod State Record for Channel Catfish

ATHENS—When Bryan Smith of Athens isn't helping visitors to the Texas Freshwater Fisheries Center (TFFC) catch fish, he does some fishing on his own.

On Friday, May 24, the TFFC volunteer took advantage of some free time to do a little fly-fishing.

"Fly-fishing is my passion, and nothing could have been greater than what happened that day," Smith said. What

happened was a new state record for heaviest channel catfish caught on a fly rod. The fish weighed 20.8 pounds and was 35.5 inches long.

After being photographed, the fish was released back into the TFFC casting pond, qualifying it for both state and TFFC catch-and-release records. The fish is also the new TFFC casting pond water body record. Plus it was Smith's fourth Big Fish Award

of the five needed to earn him Elite Angler status.

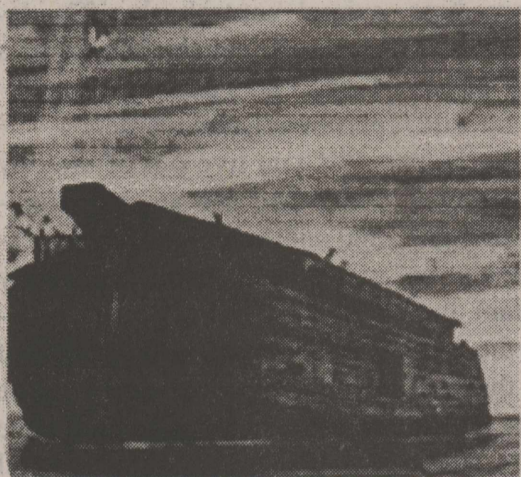
"I was very excited to have caught this fish. I'm an avid fly-fisherman and am trying to achieve my Elite Angler Award using only my fly rods," Smith said. "This fish marked a stepping stone in reaching my goal. I hope this experience can show other anglers that fly-fishing can be used to take fish that most

people wouldn't believe you could ever catch on a fly rod."

Smith was using an 8-weight G. Loomis Experience rod with an Okuma SLV 7/8 reel spooled with Scientific Angler GPX 8-weight, weight-forward Mastery Series line with a furred leader and 10-pound-test tippet. He was using a fly he tied himself, a size 8 gold bead head white/purple Woolly Bugger.

"While learning to fly-fish I have developed a special way to detect and catch catfish on a fly-rod which is very unusual," Smith said. "I use a method known to some fly-fishers as a dead drift. It involves a strike indicator or a shorter leader/tippet using the fly line as the indicator, which I was doing the day I caught the record fish. The way I catch my catfish on the fly is, I allow the fly to sink to the strike zone. Catfish feed a lot on falling prey, particularly minnows and shad from schooling fish such as white bass and largemouth bass. Sometimes these schooling fish will eat so much they will begin to regurgitate their prey, and it falls. As it falls catfish and other fish will pick it up, and that is what I re-create."

Smith caught his record fish shortly after 9:00 a.m. on his first or second cast. "I saw the fly line jump and immediately set the hook with a fast strip," he recalled. "The fly probably hadn't sunk 12 inches when the catfish picked it up. Once I set the hook the catfish swirled and began digging down. I adjusted my drag knowing I had just hooked into a great catfish!

Public Help Sought In Stemming Potential Fox Rabies Outbreak

BRADY – Officials with several state agencies are asking for the public's help in monitoring a suspected outbreak of a strain of fox rabies not found in West Central Texas since 2009, state officials said.

Agencies directly involved with the "Enhanced Rabies Surveillance Testing for Select Areas of West Central Texas" are the Texas Department of State Health Services and the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service's Texas Wildlife Services Program. AgriLife Extension is coordinating county-by-county educational efforts to inform the public.

Vance Christie, AgriLife Extension agent in McCulloch County, said efforts started May 28 and are currently being focused in McCulloch, Concho, Menard and Mason counties, but that Brown, Coleman, Gillespie, Kimble, Llano, Mills, Runnels, San Saba, Schleicher, Sutton and Tom Green will ultimately be part of the overall surveillance effort to keep the deadly virus from spreading.

"On May 6, we had a confirmed case of Texas fox rabies southwest of Melvin on the McCulloch/Concho county line," Christie said.

"This strain is different from the typical skunk variant and was thought to be eradicated from the area for the past six years. So far, this has been the one isolated case and was found in a cow.

"The main focus is not to cause a panic in the immediate area but rather to let landowners and homeowners understand the situation," he said. "We need the public's help to report any encounters they have with wildlife or strange-acting domestic animals or livestock. It's important that the public knows that the state will pick up any of the cost associated with testing of the animals. But I want to stress that this is not the time for the 'Old Three Ss,' of shoot, shovel and shut-up to avoid any future problems. Doing so could actually prolong the problem."

Christie said Wildlife Services is currently dropping oral rabies vaccine via helicopter in the four main counties. Animals eat the bait and are inoculated against rabies. As the number of vaccinated animals increases, the disease decreases and lessens the risk of human or animal exposure to rabies.

"Remember, an animal is considered suspect if it is a target species that is aggressive, unafraid or acting un-

usual," Christie said. "Target species include fox, bobcats, raccoons, coyotes and free ranging cats and dogs."

If a suspect animal is found in the target counties, Christie advises contacting the appropriate personnel such as animal control, sheriff's department, county trapper or a Texas Parks and Wildlife Department game warden.

"If you live out of the city limits and see a suspect animal and cannot contact appropriate personnel, humanely destroy it, but not with a headshot as the animal's brain must be intact for testing. Keep the carcass cool, but do not freeze it, until appropriate personnel can be contacted.

"Above all, safety first! Remember to always wear latex or leather gloves when handling dead animals."

If a human or domestic animal has been bitten, scratched or otherwise exposed to rabies by a wild or domestic mammal, or if there is any question about what constitutes exposure, contact the Texas Department of State Health Services.
