



## Many Scorpions Sighted This Spring

We have received several questions about scorpions in the last couple of weeks. While the reason for the activity is probably influenced by moisture conditions, most folks are just interested in pest control. Before we get to that, I thought we'd discuss a little about the biology of scorpions.

Scorpions hide during the day and become active at night. They hide under rocks, bark, wood or other objects on the ground. Scorpions emerge to prey on small insects, spiders, centipedes, earthworms and other scorpions. During periods of hot weather, scorpions may move into living areas to escape the high temperatures in attics. Longevity of the typical scorpion is between 3 and 8 years.

Adult scorpions may have several broods of young. The fe- complex is a group of tion efforts. These and other male undergoes a gestation period that ranges from 5 to 12 months. The young are born alive in semitransparent sacs. When the young scorpions free themselves from these thin wrappers, they climb onto their mother's back. They leave the mother after several days and begin to fend for themselves. Scorpions reach maturity in a year or more, depending on the availability of food.

Of 1,500 species of scorpions worldwide, only about 20 to 25 are regarded as dangerous. Fortunately, none of the species in Texas are considered deadly. The striped bark scorpion is by far the most common scorpion in Texas and the most likely to be encountered by humans. It has two broad, black stripes run- including complete dewa- species that call these areas ning the length of its back.

The sting of this species is about as painful as a bee or wasp sting. For most, an ice pack applied to the affected area will relieve some pain. However, a person who is stung by a scorpion should be watched closely as allergic reactions are possible. If swelling and/or pain persists or if breathing difficulties occur, immediate medical attention is necessary.

Scorpions are difficult to control with insecticides alone. Therefore, the first control strategy is to modify the area surrounding a house. Remove all trash, logs, boards, stones, partners to conserve, re- tion's aquatic habitats. With bricks and other objects from around the home. Tree branches can provide a path to the roof for scorpions. You can also caulk around roof eaves, pipes and any other cracks into the home. It's a good idea to keep window screens in good repair, and to make sure they fit tightly in the window frame.

To control scorpions with chemicals, use insecticide products that contain any of the following: permethrin (Prelude®, Dragnet®); cyfluthrin (Tempo®); cypermethrin (Demon®). Apply pesticides around the foundation of the house and up to 1 foot above ground level on the exterior walls. Also apply pesticides around doors, window eaves and other potential points of entry.
