Local Students Qualify To Compete At Worlds Largest Rodeo



Denver- Macie Friess and Sam Powers, both students at Sonora High School have earned a position on the Texas state/provincial National High School rodeo team and will be traveling with fellow teammates to Rock Springs, Wyo., July 14-20 to compete at the 65th annual National High School Finals Rodeo (NHSFR). Macie will compete in the breakaway roping and Sam will compete in the steer wrestling. Macie is the 2013 Texas State High School Rodeo Association State Champion Breakaway

Roper. Sam is the reserve state champion steer wrestler.

Featuring more than 1,500 contestants from 41 states, five Canadian Provinces and Australia, the NHSFR is the world's largest rodeo. In addition to competing for more than \$200,000 in prizes, NHSFR contestants will also be competing for more than \$350,000 in college scholarships and the chance to be named an NHSFR National Champion. To earn this title, contestants must finish in the top 20 - based on their combined times/scores

in the first two rounds - to advance to Saturday evening's final round. National champions will then be determined based on their three-round combined times/scores. Again, this year, the Saturday championship performance will be televised nationally as a part of the Cinch Town Tour telecast series on RFO-TV. live broadcasts of each NHSFR performance will also aired online at NHSRATV.com, powered by iHigh.com.

Along with great rodeo competition and the chance to meet new friends from around the world, NHSFR contestants have the opportunity to enjoy shooting sports, volleyball, contestant dances, family-oriented activities, church services sponsored by the Fellowship of Christian Cowboys, and shopping at the NHSFR trades how.

Bronco 7 on7 "Band Of Brothers" Surprise Foes In Round Rock

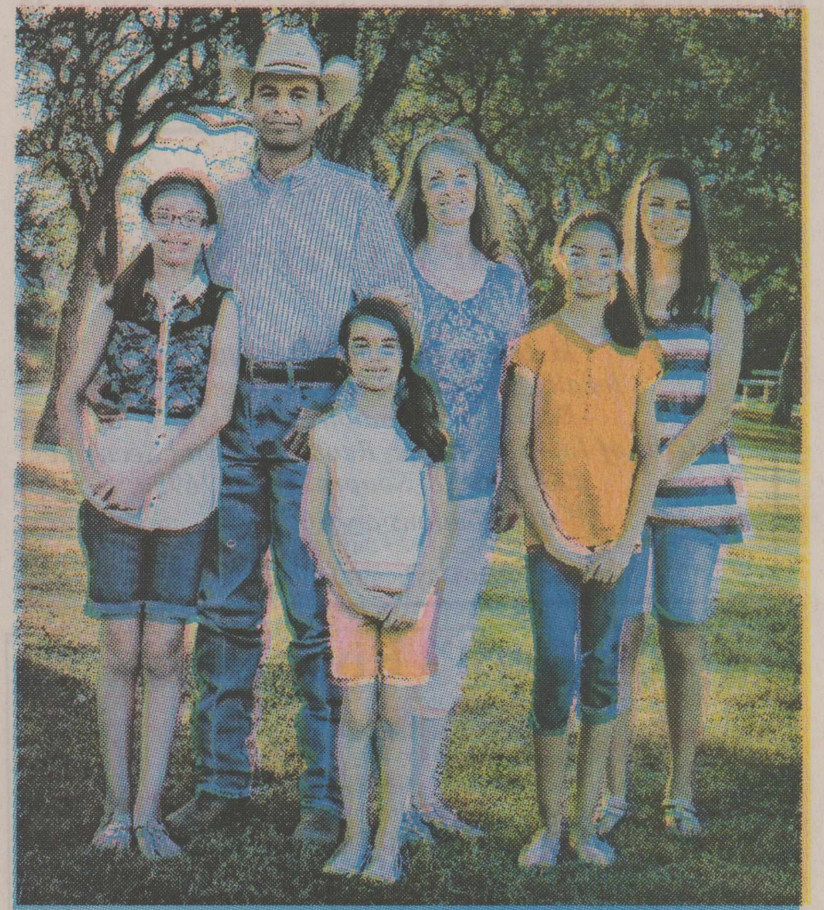

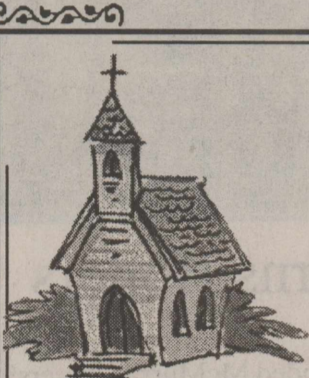

Beware of Scammers

The calls can grab your attention as a grim recorded voice warns of increasing rates of death and injury from falls or other home-alone medical emergencies. But the real incentive to proceed and "press 1" may be the promise of a free medical alert device that will quickly bring help when you need it the most. Here's what is likely to happen if you press 1: A live tele marketer comes on the line, and what was touted as a no-charge offer becomes a full press to get your credit card or bank account information for supposed monitoring fees or other expenses associated with the device. Give out that information and the possible result is identity theft. Officials warn that scammers are behind many of these robo calls, sometimes stealing the names of reputable manufacturers or inventing corporate names that often include the word "senior."

Some of the callers falsely claim that your doctor ordered the device for you. Others — such as Instant Response Systems of New York, which was recently shut down following a Federal Trade Commission investigation — allegedly up the ante with legal threats. "They called seniors claiming they had already ordered a medical alert device and threatening them with a lawsuit if they didn't pay," says FTC attorney Arturo DeCastro. Jason (aka Yaakov) Abraham, who runs Instant Response Systems, did not respond to telephoned requests for comment.

If you or a loved one needs a medical alert device, get recommendations from your health care provider or a social service agency. When you call companies, ask for documentation about fees before providing payment accounts. Some hospitals and aging services agencies have subsidized programs. But if you don't qualify, you may need to pay a one-time installation fee of around \$100 plus \$1 to \$2 per day for device rental and monitoring. Other companies require you to purchase the device.

You can foil scammers with these five tips:

1. Hang up on unsolicited offers: Don't even ask for sales information from cold callers: You could be targeted for "pay us or else" intimidation later on, says DeCastro.
2. Flee from claims that the device is free: A scammer might assert that that a product won't cost you because you have insurance. Know that Medicare, Medicaid and most insurance companies typically don't pay for this equipment. In rare cases when they do, a doctor's recommendation is required — and you'll know about it in advance.

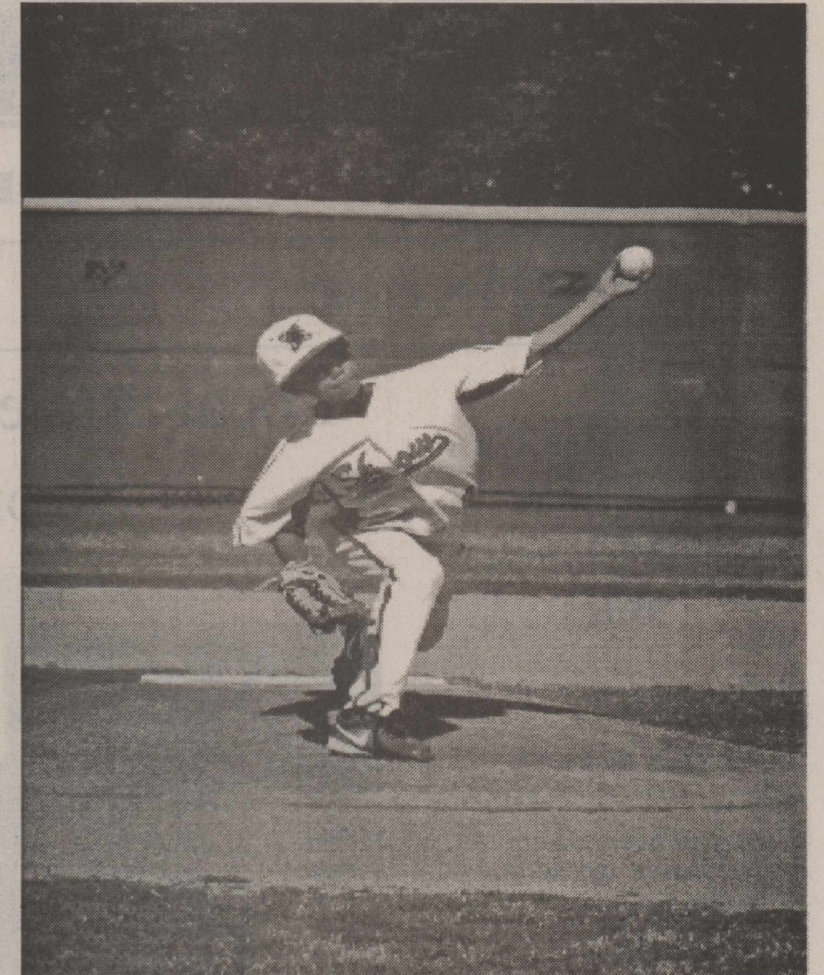
3. Reject robocalls: They're illegal unless you have contacted the company. So assume that any unsolicited pre-recorded sales call is the work of scammers.

4. Don't respond to offers to "opt out" of future calls: That alerts callers to a working number.

5. Don't pay for anything you didn't order: "Even if legal action is threatened," says DeCastro.

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Use Coffee Can To Check For Chinch Bugs

Chinch bugs frequently appear in our St. Augustine lawns during hot, dry weather. Damage usually starts in sunny locations, and appears as irregular dead patches in the lawn surrounded by yellowing or dying grass. Chinch bug damage can be mistaken for other lawn problems like white grubs or fungal diseases, so verify before treating.

So how do you tell if you have chinch bugs? Try looking for the insects. One way is to cut out both ends of a coffee can, push it into the ground using a twisting motion and then fill the can with water. Keep refilling and wait for any bugs to float to the top. Another way would be to get down on your hands and knees and part the grass to look for the insects. For both methods, samples should be taken in the damaged, yellowed grass, not dead areas.

Chinch bugs are small (about 1/5 of an inch). Adults are black with white wings that have triangular black marks on them. Nymphs, or immatures, are yellowish to pinkish with a light colored band across their body. Nymphs do not have fully developed wings and gradually turn darker (grey to black) as they get closer to being adults. Some populations of chinch bugs have adults with shortened wings.

You can help prevent chinch bugs by avoiding thatch accumulation in the lawn. Thatch is the layer of dead plant material found between the green tops of the grass plant and the soil below. It provides a protective home for chinch bugs and chemically binds with many insecticides, making such controls less effective. By keeping thatch to a minimum, you reduce chinch bug numbers and make other control methods more effective.

Speaking of treatment, that is usually carbaryl or pyrethroid insecticides and may be a liquid or granular formulation. Liquid formulations are often bottles that you can attach to the end of the garden hose or concentrates that you mix into a tank sprayer. Granular formulations are put out with push spreaders and need to be watered in after treatment.

The entire yard does not have to be treated. Treatment should be applied in the area where damage is occurring and several feet out from the damaged site. As always, read and follow label instructions.

New Agrilife Extension Assistant To Focus On Feral Hogs

GATESVILLE – Dan Gaskins has been named a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service assistant and will be headquartered at Gatesville, said Dr. Jim Cathey, AgriLife Extension wildlife specialist. "Dan will provide educational programs and landowner assistance across the 13-county Cross Timbers region as part of the Lone Star Healthy Streams Program," said Cathey, who is also the wildlife and fisheries sciences associate department head at College Station. "More specifically, he'll be dealing with the program's feral hog component. He'll be conducting watershed-based educational programs focused on feral hogs and providing technical assistance to landowners to help them determine a feral hog population reduction strategy that is specific to their needs and their property."

Gaskins worked as an intern for the Texas A&M Forest Service and recently graduated with a bachelor's of science degree in forestry from Texas A&M University.

Gaskins will cover the Lake Granbury Watershed in Hood, Parker, Palo Pinto, Ranger, Erath and Jack counties; the Lampasas River Watershed in Bell, Burnet, Coryell, Hamilton, Lampasas, Mills and Williamson counties; and the Leon River Watershed below Proctor Lake and above Belton Lake in Comanche, Hamilton, Erath, Coryell, Mills and Bell counties.

Gaskins is a member of the National eXtension Feral Hog Community of Practice, the Society of American Foresters and the Texas Forestry Association.

"Dan grew up hunting, fishing and camping in the rangelands of Texas and the mountains of New Mexico," Cathey said. "His passion for the outdoors led him to his career in the wise use and management of natural resources. His distinct educational and personal background will provide him a unique perspective for tackling wildlife challenges, which should serve him well in his new position."

Gaskin's position is funded through a Clean Water Act non-point source grant from the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board and the U.S Environmental Protection Agency.

Game Warden Field Notes

The following items are compiled from recent Texas Parks and Wildlife Department law enforcement reports.

•High Speed Internship
 A Mitchell County game warden and a Texas Parks and Wildlife summer intern were on patrol late one evening when they heard radio traffic about a subject in the neighboring county firing shots from his vehicle. Nolan County authorities attempted to pull the subject over, which resulted in a multi-agency pursuit. The subject drove into Mitchell County where the Department of Public Safety set up a spike strip; the game warden and intern were set up about 200 yards away from the spikes. The subject was then taken into custody. After the pursuit, authorities began a search for a pistol that was tossed out of the window by the subject; and found it two days later. Speeds during the pursuit ranged from 45 mph to 110 mph. The incident was a result of a family disturbance.

•Size Matters
 Game wardens from Freestone and Anderson County were patrolling Cedar Creek Lake in Henderson County for water safety and fishing violations when they saw four people fishing from a boat. When the wardens got closer to the boat, they saw a stringer of catfish in the water, and a couple of them seemed to be undersized. The fisherman said they normally fish on Lake Palestine, which has no minimum length on channel or blue catfish. The wardens informed them that the standard length is 12-inch minimum for channel and blue catfish on Cedar Creek. One citation was issued.

•BWI on Lake Austin
 Four Travis County game wardens were patrolling Lake Austin when they stopped a vessel for a water safety inspection. During the inspection, one of the wardens noticed that the operator showed signs of being intoxicated, so they instructed him to board the patrol boat. After leading the subject through a series of float tests, the wardens saw that the boat contained several empty beer cans. The operator was transported to the shore for a field sobriety test and then taken to the Travis County jail for boating while intoxicated.

•Alcohol and Water Don't Really Mix
 A Sabine County game warden was on patrol on Sam Rayburn Reservoir when he saw a boat moving through a restricted area. The warden made contact with the vessel and conducted a water safety inspection. During the inspection, a strong odor of alcohol was coming from the operator. The operator refused on-the-water tests, but he did agree to go to the bank for a field sobriety test, which he failed. The subject was arrested for boating while intoxicated.

•Too Many Catfish
 Freestone and Anderson County game wardens were patrolling Cedar Creek Lake in Henderson County when they saw two people fishing on a boat. The wardens approached the vessel and asked how the fish were biting. One of the fishermen said, "Not too good, just a few chicken heads." One of the wardens began to count and measure the catfish that were in the two coolers onboard and found that one of the coolers held 10 undersized catfish and that they were two fish over the 25-fish bag limit. The other cooler contained three undersize catfish and was 14 over the bag limit. Each individual was issued a citation for undersize catfish and for exceeding the bag limit. One subject also received a citation for no fishing license. The illegal fish were confiscated and donated.

New University in South Texas

Gov. Rick Perry today was joined by The University of Texas System Chairman Gene Powell, Chancellor Francisco Cigarroa, The University of Texas-Pan American (UTPA) President Robert Nelson, The University of Texas at Brownsville (UTB) President Juliet Garcia and South Texas lawmakers at signing ceremonies for Senate Bill 24.

"The Rio Grande Valley is growing rapidly, both in terms of population and economic power," Gov. Perry said. "This new university will be a beacon of opportunity, innovation and potential in the Valley, telling the story of the ongoing promise of the 21st Century and the growing role South Texas will play in our future."

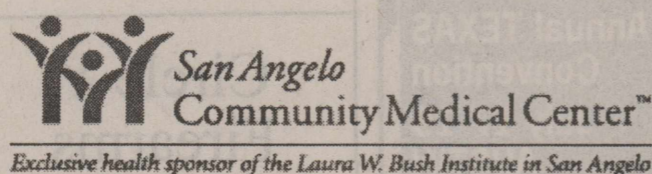
SB 24 creates a new university and medical school in South Texas by merging UTPA and UTB. The bill authorizes this new university to use money from the Permanent University Fund to construct and equip facilities, which will expand access to world-class education in the Valley.

SB 24 also maintains the Texas Academy of Mathematics and Science, a coeducational program for academically gifted Texas high school students. Geared primarily toward juniors and seniors, the academy allows them to complete high school graduation requirements while receiving credit at an institution of higher education. The bill also maintains the Center for Border Economic and Enterprise Development at the new university to study the economic needs of the region and ensure they are included in the state economic development plan.

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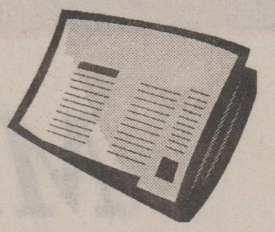

1. Proposed community development project to provide assistance to Eaton Hill Nature Center for a portion of their

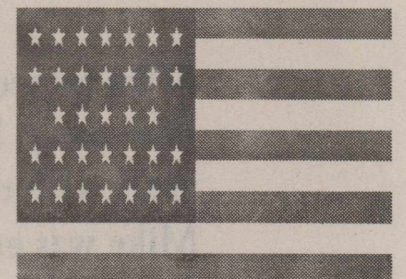
