## Broncos Win Season Opener

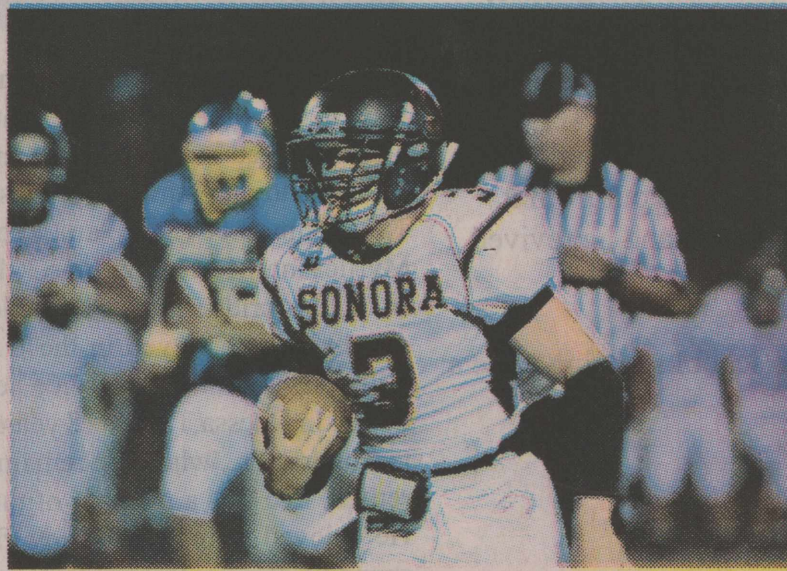

The 2013 Sonora Bronco football season opened with a road trip to Comfort to take on the Class 2A Division 1 Bobcats. Just as in the JV game on Thursday, the varsity would not take a lead until the third quarter. Also the outcome of each game was not determined until the last minute of the fourth quarter and both winning touchdowns came on fourth down.

Comfort won the toss and elected to defer to the second half. It turned out to be a good decision. On the Broncos' third play from scrimmage, an overthrown pass was intercepted. The Bobcats capitalized on the

short field to score the first touchdown and kick the PAT to give the Bobcats a 7 to 0 lead with 9:48 left in the first quarter. Late in the second quarter, the Bobcats punted to the Broncos, and the football rolled out of bounds at the 20-yard line. Quarterback Michael Rollert ran the keeper to his left and was tackled 37 yards later. Elijah Cross scored the first Bronco touchdown of the 2013 season on a tackle-breaking run. His run covered 43 yards. Cross missed his first varsity extra point kick. The scoreboard read 7 to 6 in favor of Comfort with 1:58 left in the half.

The Bobcats, who run the same offense as East Bernard, completed a long pass as the first half was coming to a close. After the catch and run, the Bobcats scored on a sweep to the left with 36 seconds left in the half. At half time, the score was 14 to 6 in favor of the Bobcats.

The Bobcats started the second half with a three and out. On the Broncos' sixth play of the second half, Sid Anderson spotted an opening on the left side of the Bronco line and raced 40 yards for a touchdown. Rollert got the two point conversion on a keeper to the right. With 7:18 left in the third, the game was tied at 14.

Once again the Bobcats went three and out. The big defensive play of this series was a sack by Lionel DeLeon, Dub Latham, Jonathan Gutierrez, and Cross. Anderson and Cross punished the Bobcats on seven consecutive runs, before Rollert threw deep to Ricky Martinez for the 29 yard touchdown. Cross kicked it low and the Broncos had their first lead of the game at 20 to 14 with 1:18 left in the third.

For the third time, the Bronco defense forced a three and out. Louis Castro muffed the punt giving the ball back to the Bobcats. On their first run, they fumbled the ball back to Broncos and Martinez recovered for Sonora.

Three plays later, Anderson ran into the line. Three Bobcat defenders had him, but they let him go before the whistle blew. Anderson kept running for a 50 yard touchdown. The Broncos tried for two, but Rollert was picked off. The Bobcat returned it 102 yards for two points. With 11:12 left in the game, the Broncos led 26 to 16.

Comfort responded with an 18 play drive to cut the Broncos' lead to three at 26 to 23 with 4:29 left in the game.

The Bobcats recovered a Bronco fumble and quickly scored again taking the lead at 30 to 26 with 2:30 left in the game.

To win the game, the Broncos needed to drive 79 yards. Coach Phillips didn't abandon the running game. After eight plays of runs by Cross, Anderson, and Rollert, plus a Bobcat pass interference penalty, the Broncos had a first and goal. After three runs, the

game came down to a fourth and goal with 26 seconds left on the clock. Rollert took the snap and rolled to his right. He lofted a pass to Martinez for the game winning touchdown. The final score was 32 to 30.

The Broncos rushed for 352 yards on 41 carries for an 8.59 yard per carry average. Anderson was the leading rusher with 149 yards on 17 carries. Cross ran for 117 yards on ten car-

ries and Rollert contributed 60 yards on nine carries.

Rollert completed six of twelve passes for 61 yards. Martinez caught four passes for 42 yards and two touchdowns.

Cody Barber led all tacklers with 11. Martinez, Cross, and Andres Acevedo logged ten tackles.

The Broncos play their home opener this week as the Brady Bulldogs come to Bronco Stadium.

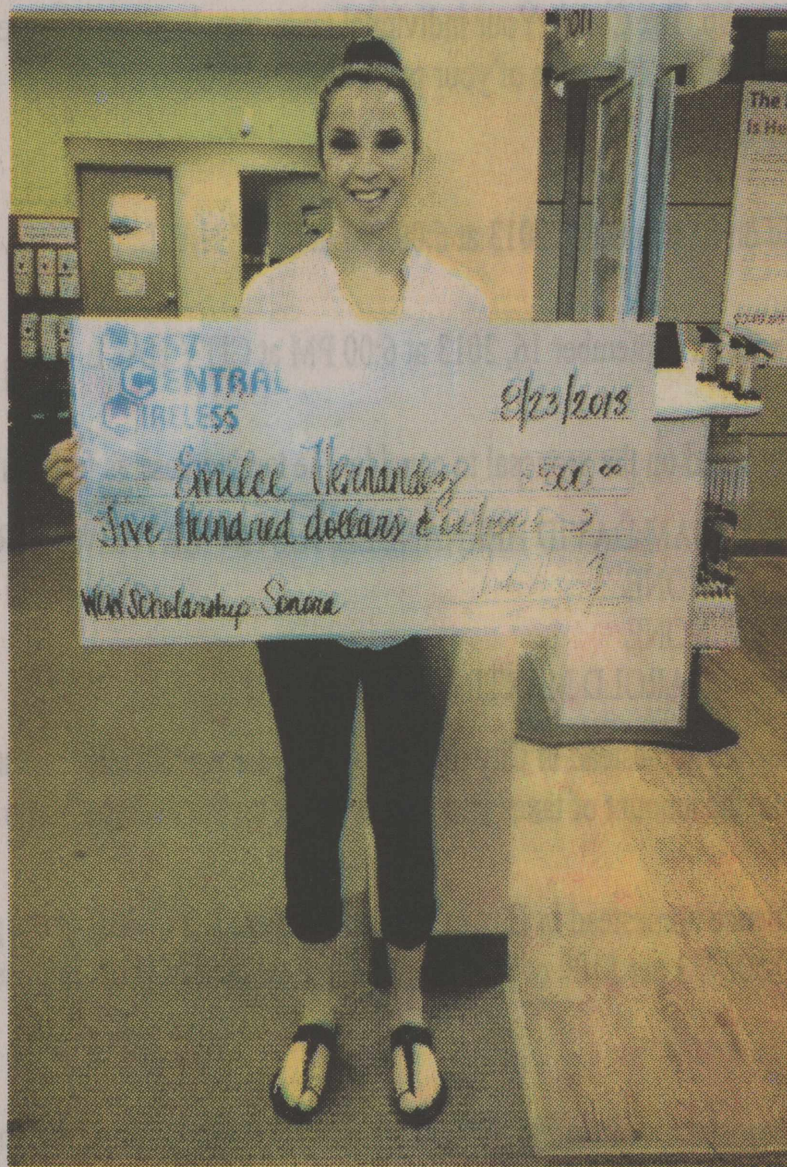

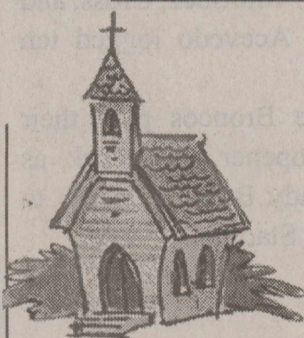

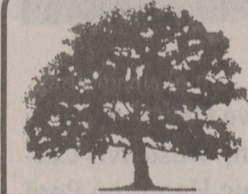
The parade will begin at 2 p.m. Parade participants are to line-up at 1 p.m. at the Sonora Elementary School building.

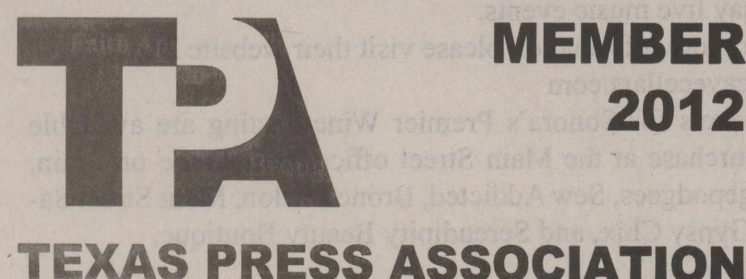

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## Notice of Public Hearing on Tax Increase

The City of Sonora will hold two public hearings on a proposal to increase total tax revenues from properties on the tax roll in the preceding tax year by 12.043056 percent (percentage by which proposed tax rate exceeds lower of rollback tax rate or effective tax calculated under Chapter 26, Tax Code). Your individual taxes may increase at a greater or lesser rate, or even decrease, depending on the change in the taxable value of your property in relation to the change in taxable value of all other property and the tax rate that is adopted.

The first public hearing will be held on September 9, 2013 at 6:00 PM at CITY HALL.

The second public hearing will be held on September 16, 2013 at 6:00 PM at CITY HALL.

The members of the governing body voted on the proposal to consider the tax increase as follows:

The average taxable value of a residence homestead in City of Sonora last year was \$75,761. Based on last year's tax rate of \$0.541535 per \$100 of taxable value, the amount of taxes imposed last year on the average home was \$410.27.

The average taxable value of a residence homestead in City of Sonora this year is \$75,404. If the governing body adopts the effective tax rate for this year of \$0.508733 per \$100 of taxable value, the amount of taxes imposed this year on the average home would be \$383.61.

If the governing body adopts the proposed tax rate of \$0.570000 per \$100 of taxable value, the amount of taxes imposed this year on the average home would be \$429.80.

Members of the public are encouraged to attend the hearings and express their views.

\*\* "New property" is defined by Section 26.012(17), Tax Code.

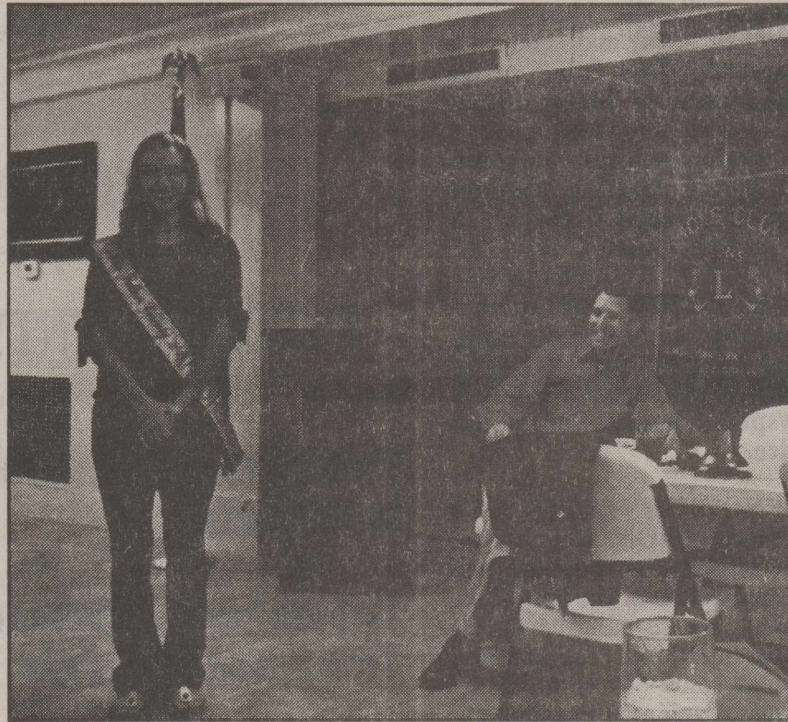

## Rolling Plains Quail Research Ranch field day set Sept. 27

ROBY - The Rolling Plains Quail Research Ranch will conduct its 6th annual field day from 9 a.m. - 3 p.m. Sept. 27 at the Rolling Plains Quail Research Ranch near Roby.

"Best Management Practices for Quail" is the theme.

Individual preregistration is \$10 until Sept. 20 and \$20 thereafter. Student preregistration is \$5. The fees include lunch, refreshments and field day abstracts. "The quail situation looks better this year than any year since 2007," Rollins said. "With the adoption of good management practices, hopefully we can capture this momentum and get back to huntable levels across west Texas."

Rollins said the program, which will be moved to Roby in case of rain, will include talks on Bermuda grass renovation for bobwhites, enhancing useable space for bobwhites on post-Conservation Reserve Program contract lands, establishing "brood patches" and "quail oases," use of "camera trapping" in

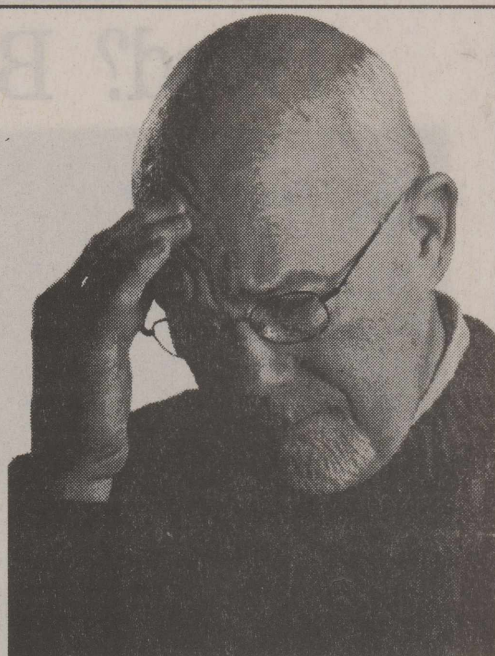
quail management, sculpting prickly pear habitats for bobwhites and shrub mortality response to prickly pear herbicides.

Other subjects to be addressed include translocation of scaled or "blue" quail into former ranges, key plants for quail, "shale and quail"-considerations in a pending oil boom, and updates on "Operation Idiopathic Decline" and "Operation Transfusion" research efforts.

COMBINED NOTICE OF RECEIPT OF APPLICATION AND INTENT TO OBTAIN A WATER QUALITY PERMIT AND NOTICE OF APPLICATION AND PRELIMINARY DECISION FOR A WATER QUALITY TPDES PERMIT FOR INDUSTRIAL WASTEWATER

TPDES Permit No. WQ0005001000

APPLICATION AND PRELIMINARY DECISION.

Multi-Chem Group, LLC, P.O. Box 718, Maurice, Louisiana, 70555, which operates the Multi-Chem Group Sonora Texas Facility, a chemical blending, storage, and distribution facility, has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for a new permit, Texas Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (TPDES) Permit No. WQ0005001000, to authorize the discharge of stormwater on an intermittent and flow variable basis via Outfalls 001 and 002 and reverse osmosis reject water at a daily average flow not to exceed 15,000 gallons per day via Outfall 003. This application was submitted to the TCEQ on September 26, 2012.

The Applicant is publishing this combined notice because it has updated its contact information and requested an increase in the discharge of reverse osmosis reject water from a daily average flow not to exceed 3,000 gallons per day to a daily average flow not to exceed 15,000 gallons per day via Outfall 003.

The facility is located at 349 Private Road 4473, approximately 2.5 miles southwest of the City of Sonora and about 0.35 mile northwest of the intersection of Private Road 4473 and U.S. Highway 277 in Sutton County, Texas 76950. The effluent is discharged to an unnamed tributary; thence to the Dry Devils River; thence to the Devils River in Segment No. 2309 of the Rio Grande Basin. The unclassified receiving water bodies have the following use: unnamed tributary and Dry Devils River—minimal aquatic life use. The designated uses for Segment No. 2309 are primary contact recreation, public water supply, and exceptional aquatic life use.

In accordance with 30 Texas Administrative Code (TAC) §307.5 and the TCEQ implementation procedures (January 2003) for the Texas Surface Water Quality Standards, an antidegradation review of the receiving waters was performed. A Tier 1 antidegradation review has preliminarily determined that existing water quality uses will not be impaired by this permit action. Numerical and narrative criteria to protect existing uses will be maintained. This review has preliminarily determined that no water bodies with intermediate, high, or exceptional aquatic life uses are present within the stream reach assessed; therefore, no Tier 2 degradation determination is required. No significant degradation of water quality is expected in water bodies with intermediate, high, or exceptional aquatic life uses downstream, and existing uses will be maintained and protected. The preliminary determination can be reexamined and may be modified if new information is received.

The Commission will only grant a contested case hearing on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application.
