## Notice of Public Hearing on Tax Increase

The City of Sonora will hold two public hearings on a proposal to increase total tax revenues from properties on the tax roll in the preceding tax year by 12.043056 percent (percentage by which proposed tax rate exceeds lower of rollback tax rate or effective tax calculated under Chapter 26, Tax Code). Your individual taxes may increase at a greater or lesser rate, or even decrease, depending on the change in the taxable value of your property in relation to the change in taxable value of all other property and the tax rate that is adopted.

The first public hearing will be held on September 9,2013 at $6: 00$ PM at CITY HALL.
The second public hearing will be held on September 16,2013 at 6:00 PM at CITY HALL.

The average taxable value of a residence homestead in City of Sonora last year was $\$ 75,761$. Based on last year's tax rate of $\$ 0.541535$ per $\$ 100$ of taxable value, the amount of taxes imposed last year on the average home was $\$ 410.27$.

The average taxable value of a residence homestead in City of Sonora this year is $\$ 75,404$. If the governing body adopts the effective tax rate for this year of $\$ 0.508733$ per $\$ 100$ of taxable value, the amount of taxes imposed this year on the average home would be 5383.6 L .

If the governing body adopts the proposed tax rate of 50.570000 per $\$ 100$ of taxable value, the amount of taxes imposed this year on the average home would be $\$ 42,80$.
