

St. Francis was dedicated to serving Jesus Christ by outreach to the poor and preaching the Good News of Salvation of Jesus Christ. St. Francis carried Christ to all people and all of God's creation. The trad ition of St. Francis being the patron saint of animals comes from an incident that occurred in Gubbio, Italy. that occurred in Gubbio, Italy. A "terrifying and ferocious" wolf had been terrorizing the town by eating townspeople and animals. St. Francis ventured out to subdue the wolf.

When he encountered the wolf he prayed, made the sign of the Cross and commanded the wolf to harm no one. The wolf relented and came to the feet of St. Francis. The tradition of the Church holds that St. Francis then said, "Brother Wolf, you do much harm in these parts and you have done great evil. All these people accuse you and curse you . But brother wolf, I would like to make peace between you and the people." Then Francis led the wolf into the town. The startled citizens were amazed and made a pact between them and the wolf.
