Broncos Pay Back Coahoma

Last year the Coahoma Bulldogs came to Sonora's Homecoming with a record of 1-5 and ruined the celebration. This year, the Broncos made the trek to the Big Country and paid Braxton Iden and the 1-5 Bulldogs back with a 35-13 victory. The Bulldogs had three turnovers in the first quarter. The Broncos turned these opportunities into 21 points. On the third play of the game, Iden attempted a pass into the howling wind from deep in Bulldog territory. Senior Ricky Martinez intercepted Iden's pass and returned it for the first Sonora touchdown. Ethan Patlan recovered a Bulldog fumble three plays later. Elijah Cross scored the second touchdown on a pass from Michael Rollert. The Bulldogs drove down the field to the four yard line. The Bulldog runner was hit hard and the football popped in the air. Chance Campbell recovered the loose ball with one and then covered it up (my photos show this). Rollert handed the ball off to Campbell who twisted his way

through the Bulldog line and took the ball 96 yards for the touchdown. This is the longest touchdown run in Bronco history. Last year, Darian Lopez took a ball 95 yards for a record setting touchdown in the playoff game against Post. Halfway through the second quarter and after another touchdown by Cross, the Bulldogs had turned the ball over five times. The Broncos scored 28 points and had only run four offensive plays. The first half ended with Gabe Rollert intercepting an Iden pass in the end zone preventing a Bulldog touchdown. The Broncos, who got the ball to start the second half, immediately took advantage of a short out of bounds kick off. Andres Acevedo took the option pitch about fifteen yards. Campbell took the ball for the score on the next play. The Coahoma radio announcers said, "the Bulldogs looked like boys playing against men. Campbell cut through our line like it was water." This fifth touchdown plus Martinez' five extra points completed the Bronco scoring for the game. This

victory gives the Broncos, a 6-1 record overall with a 2-0 record in district play. In this game, the Broncos had 28 yards of passing and 262 yards of rushing. Campbell led all rushers with 161 yards on four carries. Defensively, Sid Anderson was credited with one sack. Acevedo and Cody Barber each got credit for one-half sack. Barber also had the most Solo Tackles with eight. Scott Gonzalez led all Broncos with 18 Assists, followed by Anderson (15), Cross (14) and Patlan (13). Next Friday, the Broncos are at home against the Reagan County Owls. The Owls are tied for last place with Coahoma in district standings. They are 2-5, 0-2 and have defeated Junction and Miles. Reagan County lost to Crane 41-14 and to Alpine 47-14. The impressive 7th grade Colts will be at home on Thursday against their Owl counterparts at 5 PM. The 8th grade Colts follow and the JV is away. Come out and support the Sonora athletes.

Broncos Win Thriller in Alpine

The first district game of 2013 between the Alpine Bucks and the Sonora Broncos was billed as the matchup for first place in District 3-2A. Last year, the Broncos had come from behind to have the lead with less than two minutes left in the game. Alpine's Evan Moore then threw the winning touchdown pass of about 40 yards with no time left on the clock to win. This year, in the fourth quarter, Bronco fans were holding their breath as Moore drove the Bucks to a first and goal at the nine-yard line with 1:42 left in the game. Could the Bronco defense stop them and hold on to their

three-point lead? The Bucks had the ball first. They managed one first down on a pass completion before being forced to punt. Ethan Patlan and Dub Latham made run stopping tackles. Moore couldn't handle the snap and Lionel DeLeon and Elijah Cross tackled him for a big loss. The Broncos took over with great field position. Michael Rollert ran the option and pitched to Sid Anderson who gained 15 yards to the Bucks' 20-yard line. Three




their home on the family ranch, where she devoted her life being a homemaker and ranchers wife. A few years later their 3 children were born into the family. Wanda wasn't a country

Sudden Deaths In Calves May Be Preventable

Sometimes cattle raisers report that some of their calves "had rapid breathing, weakness, fever and suddenly died". There are many possible infectious causes of rapid breathing, weakness and fever, followed by sudden death of calves. One should always consult a veterinarian, but a common disease that causes sudden death is leptospirosis or "lepto".

Lepto is caused by one of five strains of bacteria. The bacteria are shed with urine from infected animals, such as cattle, raccoons, skunks, opossums, rodents, deer, swine and dogs. The bacteria may be shed for many months.

For calves, the likely exposures are from the urine from carrier cows that were stressed at calving and from afflicted calves. Cows may have the disease but show no signs of it. Calves are infected with the bacteria when they ingest contaminated urine on teats, hair, grass and hay and in water. Newborn calves are the most susceptible to the acute disease.

The acute form of the disease causes high fever, rapid and difficult breathing, depression, bloody urine, incoordination and death. Lepto calves are often mistakenly diagnosed and treated for pneumonia. Because the bacteria can kill unborn calves as well as nursing calves, it is suggested that cattle owners evaluate the cow herd's pregnancy rate and look for aborted fetuses.

So how should one manage for the disease? For a closed herd, the most effective approach for control is annual vaccination of all cattle; for an open herd, vaccinate twice yearly. If you time the vaccination in the cow herd during the last trimester of pregnancy, it will provide immunity to the newborn calves through the colostrum. Use polyvalent killed vaccines (contain several strains of the bacteria). Different vaccines vary in effectiveness, and vaccine failures may occur.

Along related lines, the Texas AgriLife Extension Service will offer an Animal Health Workshop on October 29th. Individual registration is \$20 by October 21 and \$25 thereafter. The cost includes lunch, refreshments, and program materials. Two Texas Department of Agriculture continuing education units (CEUs) will be offered.

Topics and speakers will include: Use of vaccines and antibiotics, Livestock parasite management, Ranch biosecurity, Meeting deer nutritional needs, Disease concerns for the hunter, and a Hunting season outlook. plays later, Anderson scored through a huge hole opened by the right side of the Bronco line. The Bucks jumped off sides before Ricky Martinez could kick the PAT. After the penalty moved the ball to the one and half-yard line, Rollert kept the ball and scored easily. The Broncos had the early lead at 8 to 0. Alpine answered with a nice drive of ten plays where Moore ran and passed the ball. Moore leaped over both lines for the touchdown. The Bucks kicked the PAT and the score stood at 8 to 7 with 3:21 left in the first quarter.

The Broncos went three and out and punted. Moore returned the punt about 20 yards giving the Bucks a short field. They couldn't capitalize and turned the ball over on downs.

After three runs, Rollert threw a quick, short pass to Martinez who raced 49 yards for a touchdown. A penalty forced a long PAT kick that was low and left. The Broncos led 14 to 7 with 10:38 left in the second quarter.

The next Buck score came with Moore rolling to his left. He reversed his field to escape the Bronco rush and threw deep to Matthew Chavez for a Buck touchdown. Their kick was good and the score was tied at 14 with 10:14 left in the second quarter.

Brian Garcia returned the kickoff for 29 yards. The Broncos returned to their basic offensive scheme

of smash mouth football. Twice during the drive, Rollert moved the chains on tough runs. Cross had the longest run of the drive. Rollert got the touchdown on a two yard run. Martinez kicked the PAT and the Broncos led 21 to 14 with 4:17 left in the first half.

Once again, just as it appeared that Moore was going to be sacked, he did a 180 degree spin, ran to his right, and threw another long touchdown pass. The PAT kick was wide left and the Broncos held a 21 to 20 lead at the end of the first half.

The Broncos opened the second half with a long drive that lasted more than six minutes. Rollert and Cross handled the running for most of the drive. Andres Acevedo caught Rollert's pass and moved the chains. Chance Campbell entered the game. He took the handoff and ran for an apparent touchdown. A holding call moved the Broncos back ten yards and the drive stalled.

Moore led the Bucks on their longest drive of the night. He accounted for almost all of the yardage, including a 49 yard run. He got the touchdown on a seven yard scramble. Alpine missed the PAT, but they led for the first time, 26-21 with less than two minutes left in the third quarter.

It didn't take long for Sonora to score. On the third play of the drive, Rollert faked a handoff to Cross and then handed it to Campbell as the second

Sutton County Harvests 1,479 Feral Hogs

Sutton County feral hog control programs that took place Oct 2012 - Sept 2013 resulted in 1,479 feral hogs being harvested. The programs included the Hog Tail Contest sponsored by the Sutton County Predator Management Association which awarded guns to the top two individuals who submitted the most feral hog tails. Rocky Jones won the top prize with 161 tails and David Murdock was second with 56 tails. Hog tail submissions to this contest totaled 442.

Wildlife Services personnel tallied a total hog removal of 514 feral hogs for the year and assisted the Sutton County Hog Out Grant program with aerial hunting which removed an additional 523 feral hogs from the county.

The Hog Out Grant from Texas Department of Agriculture will fund more aerial hunting January through March 2014. Sutton County applied for the Hog Out Grant with assistance from the Sutton County Preda-

tor Management Association (SCPMA). The grant was awarded to the county with the most points earned by number of feral hogs harvested and the number of people educated on hog abatement issues October through December 2013. Sutton County tallied sufficient points to earn the top grant of \$10,000. Points were awarded for hog tails submitted in the SCPMA contest and education points for each person who viewed the educational display compiled by Sutton County Agent Pasqual Hernandez. This display was at the Game Dinner, Wool House Feeds, Parker Lumber, and Sonora Independent School District classrooms in High School and Junior High.

Starting October 2013 until September 30, 2014, the SCPMA is again sponsoring a hog tail contest. In addition to guns for first and second place for number of feral hog tails, each hog tail submitted will earn a raffle ticket for the third gun; however, the first and second place winners will not be eligible for the raffle drawing.

Moore threw to a receiver at the goal line, but Will Dutton knocked the ball out of the

receiver's hand. On fourth down, Moore hit an open receiver at the goal line, but he dropped it.

Since Alpine still had two timeouts, the Broncos needed a first down to run out the clock. On third and four from the 13 yard line, Campbell put the game away with an 87 yard touchdown run. Martinez made the PAT and the final score was 43 to 33.

Rollert completed two of eight passes for 60 yards and one touchdown. Acevedo completed his only pass for 12 yards. Chance Campbell led all rushers with nine carries for 204 yards and 3 touchdowns. He had touchdown runs of 20, 77, and 87 yards. This was Campbell's first game since he broke his collar bone in the final preseason scrimmage.

Rollert ran for 72 yards on 16 carries and he scored one touchdown. Anderson carried 11 times for 57 yards and one touchdown.

Ethan Patlan led all tacklers with 13 and 3 were for a loss. Scott Gonzales had ten tackles with two for a loss. Cross had nine tackles but four of them were for a loss.

Next week the Broncos travel to Coahoma to play the Bulldogs. Coahoma is having a down year so far. They are 1 and 5 overall and 0 - 1 in district. Make plans to come see the Broncos continue their quest for a district championship and another deep playoff run.

Defendant in State Game Warden Hostage Case Pleads Guilty

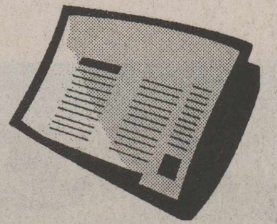
AUSTIN - A former Upshur County commissioner arrested in October 2012 for holding a state game warden at gunpoint has pled guilty to the third-degree felony offense of taking a firearm from a peace officer and further admitted in his plea that he could be found guilty of aggravated assault on a public servant.

In 115th Dist. Court, visiting judge William Porter sentenced Lloyd Allen Crabtree to 10 years in prison, but placed him on probation for five years. In addition, Crabtree was ordered to publicly apologize to the game warden and other law enforcement officers who responded to the scene last year.

Crabtree also will have to pay a \$1,000 fine, take an anger management class, pay court costs and other fees as well as perform 240 hours of community service. While on probation he will have to submit to monthly drug tests and will be barred from drinking alcohol. As a convicted felon, he will be prohibited from possessing any firearms or ammunition.
