



Billy Devearl Tittle, 90, passed away peacefully on Tuesday, October 9, 2013 in San Angelo, Texas. Billy D. was born in Trent, Texas on Jun 26, 1923 to Charley Rufus and Effie Jane (Cox) Tittle.

He graduated from Trent High School and joined the United States Marine Corps to serve in World War II. His active duty included being an aircraft machine gun crewman aboard the USS Yorktown and was assigned to the security detail during the surrender of the Japanese at Tokyo Bay. 

Milton Robert Cavaness, 84, of Sonora passed away on Tuesday, October 22, 2013.
Services were held 2 p.m. Thursday, October 24, 2013, at the Church of the Good Shepherd Presbyterian Church in

Sonora, Texas; followed by a Masonic gravesite burial at

Sonora Cemetery.

Milton was born on April 15, 1929 in Streeter, Texas to Glen and Bertha Cavaness. He attended school in Junction, graduating from Junction High School in 1946. Milton served in the Korean Conflict obtaining the rank of Master Sergeant. Milton loved his church and his community, serving as Sutton County Commissioner for 12 years, a member of the Sonora Downtown Lions Club, and the Dee Ora Masonic Lodge. He served as elder of the Church of the Good Shepherd Presbyterian Church of Sonora, where he was instrumental in building the original sanctuary and later, the Fellowship Hall. He retired from the Texas Highway Department of Transportation after 25 years of service. Milton was a member of the Masonic Lodge, being Past Master in Sonora, Eldorado, and Ft. McKavett. He also served as District Deputy Grand Master and received the Golden Trowel Award. Milton petitioned Dee Ora Lodge #715 on March 8, 1963 at the age of 34. He received his Master Mason's degree August 19, 1971; and since 1971 he has obtained an "A" certificate, and delivered Entered Apprentice, Fellowcraft, and Master Mason's Lectures. Milton was as important part of West Texas Masonry, and will sorely be missed by all members of the craft. In 1988, Milton received a new heart, and is one of the longest surviving heart transplant recipients in Texas (25 years.) He spent his next twenty-five years trying to be worthy of the gift he was given.

He is survived by his wife of 40 years, Shala; daughters Cindy Fields and husband Tryon of Sonora, Becky Bailey and husband Jim of Christoval; Linda Mullins of San Angelo, and son Wayne Hill of San Angelo; three grandchildren, Tanner Fields and wife Gentry of New Braunfels, Sean Fields of Surprise, Arizona, and Kayla Fields of Los Angeles, California; one sister, Marie Robinson of Junction, as well as several nieces and nephews. 
Deer Hunter Ethics

Deer season opens this weekend. Thousands of hunters will be out in pursuit of white-tailed deer. Some will take a son or daughter or other youth for their first outing. Many will bring home a trophy, or at least a tall tale from deer camp. Texas Parks & Wildlife Department teaches new hunters to practice the hunter ethics code to maintain a positive image of hunting. Most hunting organizations agree that responsible hunters should respect natural resources. That means to adhere to fair chase rules, as well as knowing our capabilities and limitations as a marksman to stay within our effective range. It also means we should strive for a quick, clean kill and ensure that meat and usable parts are not wasted. The second area is respect for other hunters. Follow safe firearm handling practices, and insist that companions do the same. One should refrain from interfering with another's hunt. It's also a good idea to avoid consuming alcohol, which can impair judgment. A third area in the code is to respect landowners. Hunters should follow their restrictions on when and where to hunt. Another good idea is to leave all gates the way they were found. Also, if something is wrong or out of place, notify the landowner. The final point is to respect non-hunters. One way is by transporting animals discreetly (for example, we should not strap a carcass to the hood of a vehicle). Another point is to maintain a presentable appearance while in public- no bloody or dirty clothing. Ethical behavior ensures that hunters are welcome and that hunting areas stay accessible. This and much more is taught at hunter education courses. The Sutton County Extension Office is offering a hunter education course on November 2nd and will be a one-day session. Participants will study the material on the Texas Parks & Wildlife website (http://www. tpwd.state.tx.us/). You should click on "Hunter Education". From that page, select "New Options to Get Certified", then "Enhanced Hunter Education Course". Study the online web pages. Follow the chapter topic links found under the "Table of Contents". Take the quizzes at the end of the first eight sections and print out the results. Attend the one-day field course. The field course will provide a review, live-fire practice, and testing. The course is intended for both adults and youth. Cost is \$15. Call the Extension Office at 387-3101 for more information.

Your Part in the Big Picture

What if I told you that you have an opportunity to be part of an elaborate plan? What if, in the blue prints of the plan, your opinions would be valued and had the potential to modify the plan's overall design? Surprised? Don't be. On October 14th, as part of the regular board meeting, the Sutton County Hospital District/Hudspeth Memorial Board of Directors approved plans to conduct an elaborate and engaging strategic and marketing campaign with the sole purpose of determining the organization's future course.

For those of you that are unfamiliar with the intent of organizational strategy (I had to break open some old books myself), the purpose of a strategic plan is to establish target objectives with the intent of identifying the hospital's long-term goals and then identifying the best approach to achieving those goals. In other words, a strategic plan gives the Sutton County Hospital District a path to follow, so if we deviate from the path--it is easy to find again.

Goals of a strategic planning process usually include:

- 1. Identifying the organization's current position in the market and anticipating how the market will change in the future.
- 2. Bridging the gap between the mission of the organization and execution of that mission.
- 3. Ensuring that the organization's financial future is secure.
- 4. Ensuring the needs and wants of the customers/patients are

As part of the last Board of Director's meeting, both a marking agency and strategic planning consultant were chosen. These professional organizations, along with the medical and organization staff, will work together to outline the objectives of the strategic plan and subsequent marketing campaign. The initial step of the strategic plan is to understand current perceptions of the organization and the services it offers. This is where you, the citizens of Sutton County, come in. To get an idea of current perceptions, we will help our strategic planning consultant organize and facilitate a series of focus groups that will include, to the best of our ability, a representative sample of our community. Focus groups are facilitated as a first step of a comprehensive research process. Part of my job is to ensure that the focus group samples are as balanced as possible. So, if you find me on your doorstep...I am not trying to sell you anything!

The main objective of the focus groups will be to gather current opinions, beliefs, and attitudes about the Sutton County Hospital District. As part of a focus group, you will be in a room with 5-6 other people who have been chosen because you all share something in common. Commonalities may include: age range, areas of employment, or community involvement. Certain people will also be included based upon their leadership position in our community and overall understanding of community interests and perspectives. The person facilitating the conversation is a professional in their field; whose job it is to make this process as meaningful and comfortable as possible. Everything said in the focus group is confidential. Tentative dates are targeted for November 17 – 19.

The success of the Sutton County Hospital District is essential to the health of the community (physically and economically) and it thrives because of the caring and concerned involvement of its citizens. Second Defendant in State Game Warden Hostage Case Pleads Guilty

AUSTIN – The son of a former Upshur County commissioner arrested in October 2012 for holding a state game warden at gunpoint has pled guilty to one count of unlawful restraint, a Class A misdemeanor.

In 115th Dist. Court, Judge Lauren Parish sentenced 28-yearold Todd A. Crabtree to a one-year jail sentence, probated for two years. In addition, Crabtree was ordered to publicly apologize to the game warden and other law enforcement officers who responded to the scene last year.

Crabtree also will have to pay a \$250 fine, take an anger management class, pay court costs and other fees as well as perform 100 hours of community service. While on probation he will have to submit to monthly drug tests and will be barred from drinking alcohol. He also will be prohibited from possessing any firearms or ammunition during his probation.

The charges to which Crabtree pled guilty stem from an Oct. 6, 2012 incident in which the game warden was disarmed and detained by two armed men while the officer was making a routine check for hunting law violations on private property in Upshur County.

The game warden used his cell phone to call for help, and soon numerous local and state officers came to his assistance and ended the situation with no shots fired.

"The Texas Parks and Wildlife Law Enforcement Division fully supports this plea agreement as well as the previous plea agreement regarding Lloyd Crabtree," said TPWD Law Enforcement Division Director Col. Craig Hunter.
