




Wellness Ministry

He is to the City Council Meeting I was a little disappointed, but after re-reading it, I feel the reporter wrote a fair account of the issues discussed.

I would like voice my opinion on a few things that were discussed at the meeting and also to try to inform those who were not in attendance.

Robyn Street discussed the airport, golf course and the swimming pool. She did a very good job and seemed better prepared than anyone else at the meeting. It is clear that none of those entities make money for the city and that the city actually loses money each year on all of them. I believe the City of Sonora needs the airport, golf course and the swimming pool and we should look into ways to either privatize them or figure out how they can make money instead of costing the city each

The issues that I feel everyone should be informed on are listed below. Please remember this is my opinion.

1. At the meeting the citizens listened, for 20 minutes, to Charlie Graves pat himself on the back. How can Graves claim he has done so much with the water and sewer infrastructure when it was state mandated? It wasn't his idea, he just happened to be the one in office when it finally came to a head. I question whether he would have done any of these improvements without the mandate? I can't say, and we will never know.

2. A quote from the Standard Times article said: "Graves said there have been rumors that the city is planning to remove the Police Department, but he assured residents that is not the case." Graves and the Mayor were totally unprepared with data pertaining to the annual budget for each of the entities that were supposed to be discussed, but Graves was well prepared with plenty of data on all the surrounding cities who "got by just fine without a Police Department". Charlie Graves had discussed getting rid of the Police Department long before he fired Matt Routh. All of the officers were worrying about their jobs before this all came to a head. That is a fact! It seems that not only the citizens were more concerned about the police department as stated in the article, but also that Graves was better prepared to discuss his opinion that Sonora could get along just fine without a Police Department.

3. Another quote from the ST article: "The city's general fund and economic development corporation had to subsidize these departments, Neal said, because none of them bring in enough revenue to be self sufficient." BUT when there were complaints about all the traffic tickets given out after the police department had responded to complaints of traffic violations, the Police Chief was reprimanded by Charlie Graves because there was such an increase in tickets given. How dare the police officers DO THEIR JOB? I may be way off base with this, but don't those tickets bring in revenue? And isn't it grounds for firing, or possible charges brought against the City Manager to have suggested a ticket quota?

Quote from the article: "We're really talking past each She was born in Sonora on February 3, 1934 to Herbert other," Graves said in the meeting. "We're not being orderly and respectful to each other...We don't need demands; we just need input." They have made it clear they don't want the citizens input. The City Manager, the Mayor and some of the City Council have not respected or listened to the Citizens of Sonora. They won't let those who wish to speak do so. They limit the number of people who can voice their opinion, and how much time they can speak. They won't allow issues to be put on the agenda and when those issues are brought up the citizens are told, "we are not here to discuss that".

> 5. In my opinion, Brenda Bryant should have vacated her seat on the council when she moved from the ward where she was elected. It is in the City Ordinances and also State Statutes (Sec. 22.041), which reads, "(a) If an alderman moves from the ward from which the alderman is elected, the alderman's office is considered vacant." It is a fact that she moved to the river; someone else is living in her house, and when she visits Sonora she stays at her mother's house, which is in Ward 2, not Ward 1 in which she was elected. I think she means well and cares about Sonora, but she has been given some wrong information as far as I have been able to find out from my research. If I'm wrong I apologize in advance.

> 6. Betty Hernandez was hired as the "Office Manager", not City Secretary, as was thought. I would like to see a copy of her job description and compare the two. The office manager is not voted on by the city council; therefore Sam David Hernandez is not breaking the nepotism law.

> 7. If the city manager were doing his job, we would not need an assistant city manager (which was not in the budget) to do his job for him. There's a nice little chunk of change that could be cut from the budget!

> 8. There is a long list of highly qualified city employees, with many years of service, who have left their positions because of the current city manager. Many people do not know that Elizabeth Wallace is no longer the City Attorney. Mr. Kosub from Eldorado now fills that position.

> There is no doubt in my mind that Charlie Graves wants the police department to just fade away, simply so he can balance his budget, despite his objections to the contrary. And he has managed to put the Police Department in a position where he will probably get his way. He does not live in Sonora and will not be affected by the loss of our protection. We live right on 110 and Hwy 277 and because of that we are very vulnerable to crime. None of those other cities he mentioned in the city council meeting are in our position. And if we as citizens of Sonora don't stay on top of this issue he will get his way. I am guilty of not being informed about what goes on in our City, but that will change. When it comes to the safety of my family and friends, I feel the need to speak up. I think many of us just assume that the local government will take care of it for us, mainly because that is what we elected them to do. But I have come to realize that we as citizens must become involved or they WILL do it for us, whether we like it or not.

Bees' Role in Crop Pollination

Bees' Role in Crop Pollination

As it's been a cold, dry winter, I'm in count-down mode til spring green-up. And then, plants are in bloom and honeybees get to work. With so much discussion on the decline in honey bee populations, let's take a quick look at the important work of pollination.

For most vegetable plants, seed or fruit development depends on pollination and fertilization. In most cases, this involves the transfer of pollen from the male portion of the flower to the female portion. Pollen is also used as a protein source by a wide variety of insects. It is particularly important to bee species specializing in pollen collection. In the process of collecting this valuable food source, these insects provide the pollen transportation link that many plants need for reproduction.

At least 90 crops grown in the United States depend to some extent upon bees as pollinators, either for seed or fruit production. But plants aren't entirely dependent on bees.

Some plants are self-fertilized. These include tomatoes ,peanuts ,green peppers, sweet peas, green beans, chili peppers, eggplant , oranges, and all legumes. Other plants are wind-fertilized. Wheat, corn, oats, walnut, pecans, cabbage, broccoli, and spinach are examples.

And, there are other pollinators besides honeybees. Here are a few examples. Squash bees pollinate squash and pumpkins. Bumblebees pollinate strawberries and sunflowers, while figs are pollinated by fig wasps. However, cucumbers are pollinated by squash bees, leaf-cutter bees, and solitary bees. Solitary bees include miner bees and leaf-cutter bees.

Many factors influence the honey bee's role as the leading pollinator. Only honey bees are significantly socially developed to overwinter as a colony. This is the key factor that makes it possible for humans to manage honey bees.

Populations of naturally occurring bee species have been declining for the last few decades. This may be due to a number of factors, including the reduction of natural habitats, parasitic mites, brood diseases, and pesticide use. For this reason, always read and follow label directions when applying pesticides.





Although preventing pipeline leaks is our top priority, sometimes leaks do occur. Look for blowing dirt, loud whistling noises, bubbling water, the odor of oil or dead vegetation in an otherwise healthy area - all are signs of a possible leak.

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
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

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
