





Get Ready To Get Back in The Garden

With spring just a few days the upcoming gardening seaneed to keep in mind.

Prune: Pruning of evergreens and summer flowering trees and shrubs should be completed in early March.

Fertilize: Fertilize pecan trees with 21-0-0 or similar high nitrogen fertilizer early in the month and repeat after 30 and 60 days. On young pecan break.

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


