



AgriLife Specialist: Need to recycle water? 'Give the ground first shot at it'

TEMPLE - The key to solving some of Texas' water shortage problems may be as simple as teaching homeowners and cities how to efficiently and cleanly return wastewater to the ground, according to a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Specialist.

"To me, having a longterm positive impact on our water supply is to put the treated effluent back in the ground safely," said Dr. Anish Jantrania, AgriLife Extension specialist, Temple. "And if cities and towns start doing that, it will stabilize the groundwater supply because you're putting millions of gallons back in the ground. And the ground holds water a lot longer than reservoirs."

Jantrania is the new wastewater specialist at the Blackland Research and Extension Center in Temple. His emphasis, according to his website bio, will be to develop "a statewide AgriLife Extension education and research program related to surface and groundwater quality protection, with specific emphasis on nonvironmental issues."
