## Horse Power Drops A Close One







### **Flowered Melic?**

**Do You Know**



This week, we're talking range plants. With the cool season upon us, I thought we'd put the spotlight on one of our less common cool season grasses. It is usually referred to as threeflowered melic.

Three-flower melic (Melica nitens) is a very graceful-looking, rhizomatous, cool-season grass usually found in part-shade in savannahs and open woodlands. This native perennial is found from Pennsylvania to Iowa and Kansas, and south to Virginia, Arkansas, Oklahoma, and Texas. In the northern range, it is called Three-Flower Melic, because its florets, appearing in spring, are in groups of three. In Texas, the florets are most often in groups of two. However many there are, they are white and showy swaying above the spring green foliage. By summer, the grass has gone to seed, turning tan as the hot months progress.

In Texas, it is most often found in the Edwards Plateau and the North Central regions, but can also be found west to the Trans-Pecos and East to the western portion of East Texas. It is usually found in open woods, on moist canyon slopes, in canyon bottoms, and on rocky grasslands, as well as along streambanks, and along roadsides. Three-flower melic tends to prefer partial shade, and calcareous or sandy loam soils.

Three-flower melic can be a good cool-season grass for restoration of riparian or wooded pastures in central Texas. It does not appear to be suited to south Texas conditions where it will survive, but does not thrive or produce seed. Other names for this grass include Tall melicgrass, Threeflower melicgrass, and Melicgrass.

"Ray, go get the horses in the pen. We have to round up Divide and Sylvester tomorrow," said Daddy. I had come home from college to help with shearing.

I went out the front gate and started to the barn. Suddenly, I sensed something close to me, and I thought I could feel something breathing on my neck. I jumped and quickly turned around only to see a horse that I had never seen before. The horse jumped back and bucked a few times before coming right up to me. Not knowing what to expect, I reached out and scratched his nose. He seemed to really like it. I continued on to the barn, and he followed right behind me.

When I got to the barn, I filled the buckets with fresh oats and started whistling for the other horses. They came to the gate and were reluctant to come in. But the smell of the fresh oats finally lured them in. I, nonchalantly, walked to the gate to close them in. The new horse seemed to be immune to the oats and walked right by me. I thought he might bolt out of the pen, but he seemed to only want to be near me.

"Come look and see what the fool horse is doing now," said Mother. There were some black birds trying to eat some of the feed that the bucks had left on the ground. Popcorn was out there trying to chase the birds away. As the birds flew up, he would chase them while looking up at them. As he chased them, he didn't see some old cedar posts causing him to trip - and tumble head over heels!

At 5:30 the next morning, Daddy, Juan, and I went to saddle up. I was riding old Blue, and my father decided to ride Popcorn. Blue and I had our routine down. I always approached him from his left side with the bridle. He waited until I was almost able to put the reins around his neck. Then he turned and loped away to the other side of the pen. SONORA - The Texas A&M hog biology and control. AgriLife Extension Service

will conduct Wildlife Ranches: The Good, The Bad and The Ugly on Oct. 28 at the Sutton County Civic Center in Sonora.

Registration starts at 8:30 a.m., and the program begins at 9 a.m., said Pascual Hernandez AgriLife Extension agent in Sutton County.

"With recreational ranches becoming more and more the norm rather than the exception in our region, many questions arise," Hernandez said, "There's white-tailed deer, turkey, quail, exotics and now, even hogs. Questions arise about nutrition, management, interaction between wildlife species or wildlife with livestock and so much more. Some ranches manage for exotics, while others don't want them-the list goes on."

To that end, Hernandez said he and his AgriLife Extension counterparts in Crockett, Edwards and Val Verde counties have tapped some of the area's top professionals to answer some of the questions most frequently asked by game and wildlife managers, and those seeking information on feral

The program's morning topics and speakers will include: White-tailed Deer Research, Ryan Reitz, Kerr Wildlife Management Area biologist, Kerrville; Basic Biology of Texas' Main Exotics, Mark Mitchell, Mason Mountain Management Area, Mason; and Managing Habitat for Multiple Species, Dr. Charles "Butch" Taylor, superintendent of the Texas A&M AgriLife Research Station at Sonora.

Following a catered lunch, the program will resume with presentations on feral swine research by John Kinsey, Kerr Wildlife Management Area research biologist, and conclude with a hunting season forecast by Mary Humphrey, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department game biologist at Sonora.

Three Texas Department of Agriculture continuing education units will be offered, one integrated pest management and two general.

Individual registration is \$20 by Oct. 23 and \$25 thereafter and includes lunch.

When we got the sheep to the pens, we knew to take our time letting the sheep look at the open gate and decide on their own to enter the pens. We also expected a few sheep with a "wild hair" to try to escape by running between the horses. Popcorn took this personally. He started chasing an ewe, and Daddy let him do his thing. He chased the sheep down and tried to bite it. We had never, ever seen a horse do such a thing.

Since Daddy was so mad at Popcorn, I volunteered to ride him the next morning. As most ranchers some 40 years ago, we had some Spanish goats that lived on the ranch. (This is opposed to saying we owned them as they often travelled from ranch to ranch.) When we rounded up the sheep, we always tried to get any goats into the pen if it were possible as they were good eating. But a wild goat has lots of tricks to use to avoid going into a pen. I was struggling with a goat that got into an oak thicket and refused to budge. When I got off Popcorn to throw rocks at it, or to run at it, it simply ran to the next thicket. I got back on Popcorn, rode to the thicket, and once again tried to scare it out. The goat just stayed there as long as I stayed mounted. The next time I came home for college to help round up, Popcorn was gone.
