



The Colts got off to a bumpy start but finally put points on the board with eleven seconds left in the first quarter. Jalen Lopez set up the Dermody touchdown after a great run to the one-yard line. The try for two was no good. Crane scored twice and had one good two-point conversion to make the score Crane 14 Sonora 6.

Later in the game, Wilson Johnson completed a halfback pass to Lopez in the end zone. The two-point conversion failed again. The score was 14-12 in Crane's favor. With time running out in the fourth quarter, it appeared the Colts were going to lose the team's second consecutive game. ## Sweet or Sour For The Pork?

It is estimated that there are over 2 million feral hogs in Texas. The ever-increasing pest is harming water quality, landscapes, gardens, native plant and animal communities, and agricultural production in many areas of the state. Trapping is one method of control. Two keys to success are trap placement and pre-baiting.

Feral hogs are omnivores; they eat both plants and animals, thus a

foods are they most attracted to when trying to trap them?"

One size does not fit all when it comes to baits. However, research by Dr. Tyler Campbell (formerly with USDA-APHIS/WS) suggests that wild pigs are attracted to baits that have a sweet pungent odor, such as strawberry or berry flavorings. That's why we see several commercial "pig baits" that contain some type of strawberry flavoring. Many baits work, and landowners are encouraged to vary baits ingly among traps to find out what pigs find most attractive at a particular location or season. However, the more abundant the food supply, the more difficult it is to attract pigs to these baits.

Shelled corn is often used, but landowners have also been successful by fermenting corn, milo, rice, or oats to increase the odor attraction. Old fish grease, catfish "stink" baits and overripe fruit and vegetables have also been used successfully. Still others have

used maple syrup on corn.

Some research in the southeast indicated that while catch rates were no different between shelled corn and soured corn, we know from experience that non-target species such as raccoons or deer use shelled corn more than a soured grain product. Please note: We do not advocate the use of diesel on corn to encourage use by wild pigs and discourage use by non-targets such as deer or raccoons because we do not know the full impacts of diesel ingestion by the pigssome of which many be destined for human consumption.

When it comes to toxic baits, research at the Kerr Wildlife Area has concentrated on on sodium nitrite, a toxicant that has been used with good results against feral hogs in Australia. Sodium nitrite kills by disrupting blood's ability to carry oxygen to the brain. Pigs are highly susceptible to sodium nitrite because, unlike humans and other mammals, they lack the ability to produce an enzyme that re-

verses the effects. Research indicates the poisoned pigs pose little or no threat to scavengers or predators. Developing bait/sodium nitrite mixtures that deliver a lethal dose to swine and a "delivery system" - a feeder that feral hogs can access but can't be used by non-target wildlifeare the focus of research at the Kerr.

This is one of several topics that will be addressed at the Wildlife Ranches Workshop slated for October 28 at the Sutton County Civic Center. The 9 a.m. program also features topics such as "The Biology of Texas' Main Exotics" and "Managing Habitat For Multiple Species". Cost to attend is \$20 and includes program materials, a catered lunch, and 3 continuing education units (CEUs) for those with a pesticide applicator license.
