## Broncos are Bi-District Champs

While the overall win/loss record between Sonora and Coahoma is 14 and 5 in favor of Sonora, our playoff series stood at one to one before last Thursday's game. In 1965, the Bulldogs ended the Broncos undefeated season in the Regional game with a 25-14 victory. In 1968, we met them once again in the same play-off round in San Angelo Stadium. The field was covered in snow and it was COLD. We kicked off to start the game. The Bulldogs fumbled on their first carry. Bronco quarterback David Wuest called 48 sweep, and Ed Lee Renfro was pushed out at the one-yard line after gaining 25 yards. On the next play, fullback Mike Gosney scored

the winning touchdown. The final score of that game was 7 to 6. The 2014 Broncos improved our head to head playoff series with a 35 to 18 win over the Bulldogs in the Bi-District round of the 2014 Class 3A Division II playoffs.

The temperature at kickoff was 32 degrees due to a very early Arctic Vortex cold front. Coahoma kicked off to start the game. On the second play of the game, Andres Acevedo rolled to his right. When he appeared to be trapped for a short gain, he reversed his field, found a hole, broke some tackles, and ran for a 65-yard touchdown. Hunter Hughes came in to kick the PAT, but the Bulldogs jumped

offsidies. With the ball now at the one and half yard line, Brett Castillo ran off right tackle for the two point conversion to make the score 8 to 0 with less than two minutes off the game clock.

The Bulldogs ran five plays before Gabe Rollert intercepted for the Broncos at our 48-yard line. Elijah Cross and Acevedo alternated carries for one first down. The Bulldogs held and they took over on downs at their 26-yard line.

Coahoma tried a double reverse that Jonathan Gutierrez stopped for no gain. Then, the Bulldogs fumbled and lost five yard recovering their own

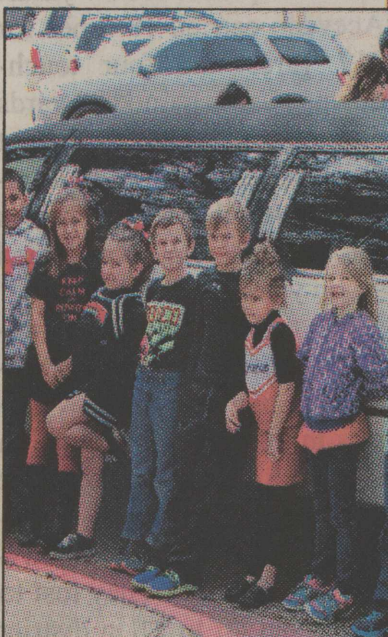




## Wellness Ministry

fumble. The Broncos started their drive with good field position. The Bulldog defense was up to the task and forced Acevedo to punt. His punt rolled dead at their 12-yard line.

The Dogs moved the chains once and then had to punt. This time Coahoma couldn't stop the Acevedo/Cross duo. Cross broke through the line and appeared to score. The zebras ruled he was down at the two-inch line. Acevedo scored on the sneak. Hughes kicked the PAT, and the Broncos were up 15 to 0 with 9:10 left in the first half.

The Broncos had one more drive that reached the red zone. Acevedo passed to Hughes and Rollert. But the wheels came off after achieving a first and goal. Acevedo ran for a touchdown, but it was called back due to a ten yard penalty. Once again, he ran for a touchdown only to have it called back. The two ten yard penalties stopped the drive. Hughes attempted a 35-yard field goal that came up about three yards short.

As the first half was ending, off-setting penalties due to a disagreement between opponents cancelled a large Bulldog loss, and Coahoma was able to finish the drive for a touchdown. When they tried to pass for the two point conversion, Noah SanMiguel

picked it off and started for the opposite endzone. He almost made it all the way, but was finally tackled at the Broncos' six yard line.

Coahoma recovered an on-sides kick. Their drive to tighten the game ended when Castillo intercepted. The score at the end of the half was 15 to 6.

Coahoma's opening drive of the second half lasted several plays before a fourth down attempt was stopped at the Broncos' 41 yard line. Acevedo rolled to his left, avoided a Bulldog and threw to Hughes. Hughes was brought down at their 41 yard line for an eighteen yard gain. Acevedo rushed to their 29 yard line. Acevedo threw a jump pass to Rollert who made it to their five yard line. Cross got the handoff and rolled into the endzone. Once again, the officials ruled him down just short of the goal line. Acevedo got the touchdown on the sneak. A mishandled snap caused the PAT to fail. It was 21 to 6 with 5:38 left in the third.

Coahoma answered with their best drive of the night. With a combination of some outstanding pass plays and Bronco penalties, the Bulldogs reached the Broncos' ten yard line for a first and goal. Two runs later, they scored

their second touchdown. Castillo intercepted the two point conversion pass. With 25 seconds left in the third, the score was 21-12 Sonora.

For a heart stopping moment, it appeared that Coahoma had executed another successful onsides kick at the Broncos' 40 yard line. Luckily, the Bulldogs were offsides and had to rekick. This time, Carter Zook returned the football to the 40 yard line but a Bronco penalty brought the ball back to the 20 yard line.

As the fourth quarter started, the Bronco offense got rolling. It took seven plays to go the 80 yards. Zook had a reception, and Acevedo had two runs of over 20 yards. Cross finally got a touchdown on a 17 yard run right up the middle. Hughes made the kick, and the Broncos had the Bulldogs down by 16 points at 28 to 12.

Coahoma wouldn't quit. They responded with a long drive that ended with a 23 yard touchdown pass. Desperately needing a two point conversion in order to get within eight points, they tried again. Braxton Iden's pass was wide, and Coahoma prepared to kickoff down two scores.

Jonathan Martinez recovered the Bulldog onsides kickoff at midfield. Coach Phillips turned to the big boys

to seal the victory. Acevedo gained 20 plus yards on a run where he escaped two tackles by using the 360 degree spin move. From the 18 yard line, Cross gained 16 yards on the toss sweep. Acevedo got his fourth touchdown on the quarterback sweep. Hughes finished the scoring when he made his kick. The final score was 35 to 18 in favor of the Broncos.

The Broncos rushed 35 times for 323 yards and completed six of 14 passes for 94 yards. Acevedo carried 18 times for 217 yards and four touchdowns. Cross gained 83 yards on nine runs. Hughes caught three passes for 53 yards, Rollert hauled down two throws for 34 yards, and Zook gained seven yards on one catch.

This week, the Broncos travel to Midland Greenwood Stadium to play the Idalou Wildcats in the Class 3A Division II Area Round. Kickoff is at 7:30 this Friday. The Wildcats are 8 and 3 overall and 4 and 1 in district. They lost to Spearman 40 to 21 in district and are the second place team of District 1. In non-district, they lost to 5A Lubbock Cooper and to big 3A Shallowater. The last time we played Idalou was in 2000 when the State Champion Broncos beat them 42 to 16 in the Area Round.

## Winterize Home & Landscape

We've had a taste of cold weather already. When the cold weather season starts, we look for ways to keep our homes as warm as possible, but don't want the higher energy bills that accompany turning up the thermostats. Fortunately, there are a few things we can do to winterize the home.

Following are a few rather inexpensive ways to get ready for the cold.

For starters, replace the filter for central heat and air unit. It's a must to change your furnace and air conditioning filter on a regular basis, at least every three months or more often. Clogged filters reduce heating and cooling efficiency and can reduce the useful life of the appliance.

Use caulk to fill gaps in siding, windows, and doors. For

drafty windows and doors, don't just fill the gaps on the outside, pull the molding off to fill the insulation gaps around the window jamb.

An interesting option is a plastic film window insulating kit. It is transparent, which allows light in and is easily removed at the end of the cold season.

Door threshold/sweep strips are also a good way to fill air leaks beneath doors.

Did you know you can reverse ceiling fans? Most of us don't know that we can use our fans during the winter to keep your house warm. On every ceiling fan there's a switch that allows you to reverse the direction of the blades. Switch it so the ceiling fan rotates clockwise. That will push warm air down and force it to re-circulate throughout the

room. Don't forget to make the switch again when it starts to warm up!

There are also a few chores for the landscape.

Drain gasoline from power tools and run the engine until fuel in the carburetor is used up.

Drain and store garden hoses and watering equipment in a readily accessible location. Remember that the lawn and plants may need water during a prolonged dry spell.

Before freezing temperatures occur, water everything thoroughly. Water displaces the air in the soil interspaces and is much slower to cool than air. Moist ground stays warmer than dry ground.

And it goes without saying—don't forget to wrap (insulate) water pipes!

## Texas Leaders Extend State-Led Border Surge

### Extension Of Operations Ensures Continuity Through Fiscal Year

AUSTIN — Having established the model for securing the border in the absence of effective federal action, Texas leaders have reached an agreement to extend the ongoing law enforcement surge through the end of the current fiscal year. Signed by the governor, lieutenant governor and speaker, the budget execution will marshal resources from a variety of state sources to enhance the state's efforts to secure the border region.

Effective December 1 through August 2015, the funding agreement would transfer FY15 funding to extend the presence of personnel from the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS), Texas Military Forces (TMF) and Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) along the border. The agreement is subject to approval by the Legislative Budget Board at its December 1 meeting.

"Texas has proven beyond any doubt that this border can be secured, even if the federal government refuses to take the steps necessary to do so as required by the Constitution," Gov. Rick Perry said. "This

agreement will ensure the hardworking men and women from DPS, the Texas National Guard and Texas Parks and Wildlife, who have been working with local and federal partners, have the resources they need to maintain a robust law enforcement presence along the border until the Legislature can act."

The agreement authorizes DPS to implement 10-hour shifts for its commissioned officers, which will immediately increase the department's patrol coverage along the border. This authorization will increase the statewide full-time-equivalent (FTE) count by more than 650.

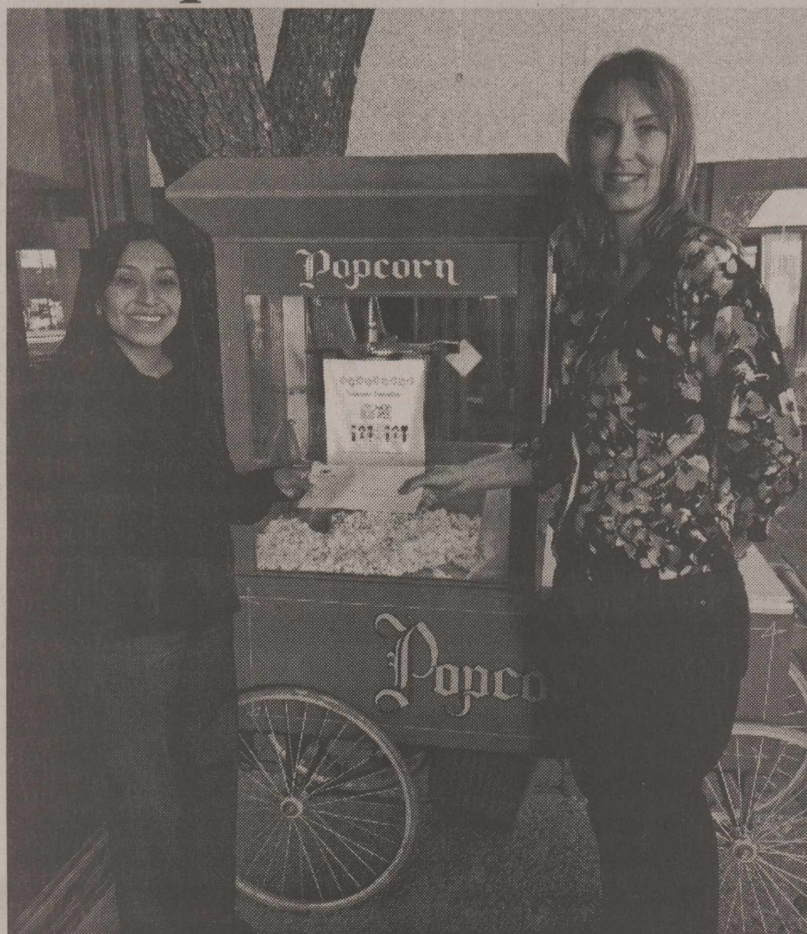
"Having spent the last eight years appropriating more than \$800 million for border security, I am proud to see the effectiveness of Operation Strong Safety and believe its continuation is essential to the safety of all Texans. I am very pleased to have reached the consensus needed to extend border surge operations through the end of next August," Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst said. "In the absence

of sufficient action from the federal government, the state of Texas has proven it is possible to secure the border, reduce crime, and combat the impacts of illegal immigration. This agreement proves Texas is serious about border security."

Funds for DPS would include the addition of new shallow-water boats and other technological capabilities, which would be used to extend tactical capabilities as well as the surge footprint beyond the Rio Grande Valley Sector.

"This approach provides an important bridge to the 2015 legislative session," House Speaker Joe Straus said. "The state's law enforcement agencies will have the tools and technology they need to continue an enhanced presence on the border. Meanwhile, this funding will allow members of the next Legislature to evaluate the state's border security strategy during the session and make adjustments if necessary."
