Livestock Stewardship During Cold Weather

Our first freeze of the season was right on time, but a dry fall has reduced both forage quantity and quality. As a result, stockmen need to go the extra mile while caring for livestock this cold season. Our principal concern should be for the livestock at greatest risk—the old, newborns and those in thin con-

With their winter haircoat and shelter from the north wind, most livestock can fare well. However, during wet weather, a wet haircoat provides little insulation against the cold. Animals in thin flesh and newborns are especially vulnerable because they have minimal fat which provides them insulation. Thus, livestock should be wintered in pastures that contain shelter from the elements. If forage is in short supply, provide enough hay for cattle, sheep and goats to eat their fill at least once a day. Forage digestion will generate heat, so if possible, feed livestock in the late afternoon to take advantage of this 'internal heat' during the colder nighttime temperatures. Adequate water intake is necessary for survival during cold times. During freezes, ice should be broken and removed from troughs, thus allowing for refilling with relatively warm water. If necessary, call livestock to fresh water with feed or hay.

Grazing horses are less susceptible than those kept in stalls, but colic is a winter health concern for horse owners. Feeding extra long stem hay will help, and if feasible, feed it twice daily. Adult horses will drink 10+ gallons of water daily. Maintaining water intake is a critical component of colic avoidance and essential for proper digestive function. Exercise is also

Cold spells can be a challenge for stockmen and their livestock. With just these simple steps, we can go a long way towards insuring that our livestock are able to withstand the winter's cold spells.



Gordon William (Bill) Stewart, 89, passed away Tuesday, November 25, 2014. Funeral services will be held at St. John's Episcopal Church on Friday, November 28, 2014 at 10:30 am.

Bill was born January 16, 1925, in San Antonio, Texas, to Gordon and Lora Stewart. He began his life on the family ranch in Sutton and Edwards counties. He completed his early education in the country school at Station B. As a teenager he first attended high school at Alamo Heights in San Antonio but finished at Carrizo Springs in 1943. After graduation Bill entered military service where he proudly served during WWII with the 4th Marines in the Pacific Theatre and in the early occupation of the Japanese mainland after the surrender in 1945. He was fond of telling about 2014. his 21st birthday when he left Japan heading home, with green icing and big red lettering saying "Happy Birthday Tex." After honorable discharge from military service he attended Sul Ross State University where he met his wife, Betty Meador. He and Betty

were married May 5, 1950 and made their home and life on the ranch.

Bill, along with wife Betty, was an accomplished rancher, receiving the Conservation Rancher of the Year award in 2007. Ranching was Bill's occupation, Bill E. Stallworth, 82, passed away on Sunday, Nobut he had a deep and profound passion for the study of gun history and collecting. He was an outstanding community member and was named Citizen of the Year in 2008. His activities included membership in, and one time chairmanship of, the Sutton County Historical Society. As chairman of the society he was instrumental in getting the Sutton County History Book published in 1979. He and Betty have been Fling Ding members since the 1950s, and he was once president and director. He was recently honored by the Lion's Club for serving over 50 years as a loyal member. Bill was an avid Sonora Bronco with play-by-play details of those games, and most since. He was honored as "Fan of the Year" in 2006. Bill was a founder of the Sutton County Game Dinner. The vision for the dinner was developed after Bill and a few friends traveled to a similar event in San Antonio. He was instrumental in its initiation, organization and implementation through the early years, ultimately enabling it to become what it is now. He spent many hours over camp fires cooking his famous camp bread and enjoying the company of friends and family. The Stewart family has been active in St. John's Episcopal Church since the mid 1950s, with Bill serving several terms on the vestry.
