
If you consider these to be weeds, the best way to control them is by maintaining grass cover. Bare ground offers an opportunity for these plants to take hold.

Herbicidal control measures implemented in the fall are often more effective than those applied in the spring once flowering has initiated. Young, actively growing plants are more readily controlled than fully mature, flowering plants. If not controlled, plants will produce seed in the spring that will remain in the soil until environmental conditions are appropriate for germination. Controlling winter annual broadleaf weeds before seed set will reduce future weed
