Fruit Trees Need To Chill Too

I noticed some peach trees already in bloom. Though we may still have cold weather ahead of us, some amount of cold

or chill is required by our fruit trees. Why are chill hours im-Most hardy fruit trees need a certain amount of cold weather

to end their dormancy and to promote spring growth. When winters are too mild, spring growth is delayed, irregular, and

During the fall season, decreasing day length and cooler temperatures induce a tree to produce growth inhibitor hormones that disrupt its growth. It is these hormones that maintain a tree in dormancy during winter. The dormant buds of many plants require cold weather to grow, flower and develop properly, but requirement vary by species.

Dormancy is interrupted when sufficient cold temperatures break down the growth inhibitors within the tree. A precise number of cumulative hours of chill (temperatures lower than 45 F), are required to break dormancy. When enough chilling accumulates, the buds are ready to grow in response to warm

If the buds do not receive sufficient chilling temperatures during winter to completely release dormancy, trees may develop physiological symptoms such as delayed and extended bloom, delayed leafing, reduced fruit set and reduced fruit quality. Extreme cold during winter dormancy, however, may kill the fruit buds.

So what's the story for peaches?

If you're thinking about planting a peach tree, consider the chilling requirement. If you choose varieties that have a chilling requirement that is too low, there is a greater probability that they will bloom early and be more subject to frost. If Our guest speaker for the day was Mr. Billy Dickson who the chilling requirement is too high, they may be very slow to break dormancy and abort fruit.

> Our zone gets about 800 hours of chilling. Plant varieties which have the correct chilling requirement for our area. Some of these include Sentinal, Redglobe, and Fireprince, but there are others. Do some homework.
