Conversations With God... The Gravity of Faith

Make Real what your **Love** of God means.

I suspect that the majority of our modern world views Christianity as a philosophy outlined by a series of values based on the teachings of Christ (I also personally believe that this view is also held by a majority of Christians). Even the most hardened Atheist will likely state that "faith in God" is something that exists in the minds and hearts of those that chose to believe in Him but it is not a "real" physical force that exists in the world. Simply put, faith is spiritual but gravity is real. I make the argument that faith not only exists in the physical world, but that it is much more valuable to you than any universally accepted "real" physical process.

A lot of folks would say that gravity is considered real because it can be measured by science and given a value, while science has yet to devise an instrument to measure a persons faith. The truth though is an entirely different matter altogether. The fact is that there are a good number of things that are thought to "exist" even though they can't directly measured. The most obvious example would be gravity itself.

For over 300 years the study of gravity and its effects on our universe have changed the very course of humanity. The theories that Sir Isaac Newton was able to formulate after his observations on gravity have transformed us from a society that traveled by horse and buggy to one that frequently travels in space. If you look deep enough almost all the great advances of humanity (air travel, computing, industrial processing, etc) are directly linked to the effects of gravity. That point is key because we still haven't been able to directly measure gravity, we only are able to measure its effects on our world. In 1919 Albert Einstein predicted that gravity exists as a wave that permeates everything in the universe, but we have yet to detect a single gravity wave. Think about it this way. We were able to fly to the moon not because we knew that gravity existed, we flew to the moon because we believed it existed. Imagine then what we could do as a society if we could only make our belief in God as strong as our belief in gravity.

If our inability to directly measure gravity has no impact on our belief in its existence then why is it so difficult for us to believe that the power of faith in God also exists in the physical world? It's because gravity is free, while faith takes work.

Imagine that you are on your way to work when you stop to get a cup of coffee. As you pull up to the drive through-window you pull out your wallet to pay when a voice comes over the intercom that says.

"We are so sorry but our

credit card machine is down this morning. There will be no charge for your order. I hope you have a wonderful day."

I think we all have been there, and I feel even more confident that all of us had a similar reaction. The first thing we tell our co-workers when getting to the office is how you got a free cup of coffee. Every time somebody makes some kind of small talk, somehow the subject of your free coffee gets brought up and is discussed. When you get home you tell your significant other about how you were lucky enough to get a free cup of coffee. Have you ever thought to ask yourself why you would spend so much time talking about that "free" cup of coffee while never mentioning the countless others you paid for with hard earned money? I think because as a society we tend to praise things that have no real value at all, or more specifically we focus on the idea of "worth" over "value".

If something's worth is defined by how much it cost (or what someone would pay for it) then a free cup of coffee is actually worthless, but our love affair with something's price tag blinds us to that fact. The same is true for just about everything in our modern world. People are getting famous not because of the value of their talent, they get fame by simply being famous (see all reality TV). The amount of lottery ticket sales and news coverage skyrockets each time someone wins a big load of free money but there is no special attention given to those that earn that much money through a lifetime of toil. Game shows are loaded with people willing to do anything (regardless of dignity) just for the chance to get something for free.

The problem is that we are so obsessed with how much something is worth that we lose track of its value in our lives. If a man is in the desert what do you think he would ask for first, a million dollars or a glass of water? Where does that water have more value, in the hands of the man that earned it on the desert sands or in a swimming pool somewhere in Middle America?

Things like money, fame, and material possessions are universally accepted as important in the physical world simply because they have a price tag. For example, when I am sent to the grocery store to buy toilet paper I usually have no idea what brand to get, so I do what just about everybody else does in that situation. I pick out the most expensive kind. I rationalize my choice by thinking that since it costs more it must be better. This is how the worth of something (what it costs) becomes more important to its value (the benefit to your life). The truth that all of us need to hold onto is that the real value

of things does not come from what they are worth, but how they are acquired. In order to learn about gravity you need to only open a book, but to learn about your faith in God you need to open your heart. Which then is more valuable, the free cup of coffee or the one you paid for with hard owned money?

In a very real way our entire lives are nothing more than a series of transactions. We go to school thirsty for knowledge and our teachers' exchange ignorance with information. We go to church full of questions and doubt and our spiritual leaders exchange that with enlightenment. Every experience we live is a transaction where ignorance is exchanged with some kind of knowledge. It's the same interaction that occurs at your coffee shop but instead of money, the currency of our reality is belief. As is our nature, it has become exceedingly easy to value things that are "free" from the obligation of belief over those that require it.

When you are faced with any kind of transaction that relates


to faith, you must first believe before you can see its effect on your life. When a transaction relates to something like gravity its effect on your life can be seen without you having to believe that it exists. Put more simply, gravity will keep you firmly on the ground regardless of whether you believe in it or not, while faith requires your belief before it can lift you up.

My challenge to you is simple. Change the way you see your faith by choosing to believe that God is everywhere. He is not just asking you to choose love over hate, in a very real way He wants us to choose value over worth. Choose the things that add value to your life so that you can be freed from the empty promises of worth.

We have all become accustomed to thinking that "seeing is believing" which only serves to limit and cheapen our existence. We did not fly because we could see gravity, we flew because we chose to believe that we could. Make your faith real by understanding that "believing is seeing"!

DEVIL'S SINKHOLE BEGINS PRE-SEASON BAT TOURS

The Devil's Sinkhole State Natural Area, home to the biggest one-chamber cave in Texas as well as Texas's fourth-biggest bat colony, is now offering pre-season evening bat viewing tours. Because of adequate rains and temperatures, an appreciable number of bats have returned already from Mexico and points farther south where the bats spend their winters. To arrange for one of these pre-season tours, call 830-683-2287 or e-mail devilsinkhole@swtexas.net. All tours to the Devil's Sinkhole State Natural Area and the National Natural Landmark begin at the Rocksprings Visitors Center and are led by volunteers of the nonprofit Devil's Sinkhole Society. Reservations are necessary. The pre-season bat tour is priced as a regular day tour, \$6 per person, though at least two people (or \$12) are needed to have a tour. The Rocksprings Visitors Center is located at 101 N. Sweeten St. on the Rocksprings town square. Guests traveling in on US Hwy 377 or Texas Hwy 55 will come directly to the visitors center door. The volunteers of the Devil's Sinkhole Society also provide day tours, nature walk tours, and birding tours, all by reservation. Tours are available Wednesdays through Sundays. The regular bat season at the Devil's Sinkhole runs from May 1 through October 30, Wednesdays through Sundays. Fees are \$12 per person, with discounted tickets of \$10 for adults 65 and older, and \$6 for children 4 through 11. The Devil's Sinkhole State Natural Area is part of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department

Control Tree Borers Now

Many insects feed and make their homes in the bark, trunks and branches of shade trees and shrubs in Texas. Most insect borers are attracted to weakened, damaged, dying or dead plants. These are referred to as "secondary invaders" because they attack only after a plant has been weakened by another stress.

Borer infestations often go unnoticed until plants or parts of plants begin to die or show external signs of damage. Wood-boring insects often produce sawdust-like frass (excrement). Their holes are normally round, oval or semicircular and are found in a random pattern on the plant. Woodpecker damage is sometimes confused with that of wood-boring beetles, however woodpecker damage will not produce frass. One woodpecker, the yellow-bellied sapsucker, produces square holes in rows around a trunk or branch.

Many borers damage

plants by tunneling through the inner bark layer (cambium) into the sapwood (xylem) that transports nutrients and water to the leaves. When the cambium layer is completely girdled the plant eventually dies above or beyond the damage site. Partial girdling reduces plant growth and vigor above the site of attack.

One group of borers are called long-horned beetles or round-headed borers. Adults are called long-horned beetles because their antennae are occasionally longer than their bodies. Larvae tunnel underneath bark and into the heartwood. The tunnels are oval to almost round in cross section because of the round shape of the larvae.

A second group is known as metallic wood-boring beetles (or flat-headed borers). Adult beetles are flattened, hard-bodied and boat-shaped with short antennae. These are beetles with distinctive metallic colors (green, blue,

bronze, copper). Larvae are cream-colored and legless with widened, flattened body segments just behind the heads. Consequently, when these larvae tunnel beneath bark or into the sapwood they produce oval or flattened tunnels in cross section.

Since most wood-boring insects are considered secondary invaders, the first line of defense against infestation is to keep plants healthy. Minimizing plant stress and stimulating growth by using proper watering and fertilization practices helps do that.

Arizona ash, birch, cottonwood, locust, soft maple, flowering stone fruits (such as peaches and plums), slash pines (in west Texas), willow and poplar are especially prone to borer attack. You might consider other, more resistant species.

Try to avoid injury to tree trunks from lawn mowers, weed trimmers or construction. Promptly care for wounded or broken plant parts using pruning or wound paint. Remember to prune during colder months. Finally, remove and destroy infested, dying or dead plants or plant parts, including fallen limbs.
