#### Broncos Topple Coahoma

Broncos jumped out to an early lead on COAHOMA and captured a 15-3 victory on Tuesday at BRONCO BASEBALL FIELD. With 12 runs in the first three innings, Broncos left no doubt about the eventual outcome. Andres Acevedo got the win for Broncos. He allowed three runs over four innings. Acevedo struck out eight, walked two and gave up six hits.

Taylor ended up on the wrong side of the pitching decision, charged with the loss. He allowed nine runs in 1 2/3 innings, walked three and struck out two.

A two-run single by Hunter Hughes, and a two-run single by Louie Castro in the first inning and an RBI single by Isaiah Lira, an error, a two-run single by Elijah Cross, and a two-run single by Castro during the second inning supplied the early offense for Broncos. 

#### Mallie Gilbert Turner

Mallie Gilbert Turner went to be with the Lord on April 16, 2015, in Eldorado, Texas. There will be visitation from 9AM to 7PM on Wednesday, April 22 at Kerbow Funeral Home in Sonora, Texas. Funeral services will be at 11AM on Thursday, April 23, in Sonora at the Church of the Good Shepherd. On April 24, visitation will be in Coleman, Texas at Allcorn Funeral Home from 11AM to1PM immediately followed by graveside services at Mt. View Cemetery.

Mallie was born in Tokeen, Texas on September 7, 1923. He left high school early and entered active duty in the Navy as a SeaBee on October 5, 1942 and was honorably discharged on December 11, 1945. He served from North Africa through the Pacific Theater in WWII and he was proud of his service to his country.

Upon his return from the war he briefly farmed with his father then the oil field became his career. At different times he was also a car salesman, the owner of a service station, the superintendent of mining, and mayor of Van Horn, Texas. He finally returned to the oilfield where he stayed until his retirement late in life. Mallie was a member of the Sonora and Eldorado Masonic Lodge achieving the title of District Deputy Grand Master.

He was also a member of the Church of the Good Shepherd. It was during his work as a car salesman that he met and married Jeanette Bell Morris. They were married on August 4, 1964 in Van Horn, Texas. She preceded him in death on July 13, 2012.

Mallie will be remembered by his many friends and family as a great storyteller and for his sense of humor that he never lost. He was a patriot and he loved his country.

Mallie is preceded in death by his parents, Homer Gilbert Turner and Ollie Lee Ammons, his sister Jewel Lucille Day. He is survived by his daughters, Betty Overall and Debra Pogue, and his son Shannon Turner; seven grandchildren; two great grandchildren; numerous nieces and nephews.



NHTSA just announced its first-ever national advertising campaign aimed at parents of children ages 8-14 to make sure their kids are consistently and properly wearing their seat belt every time the car is

#### State Unemployment Rate At Lowest Level Since July 2007

AUSTIN -Texas' seasonally adjusted unemployment rate fell to 4.2 percent in March, down from 4.3 percent in February. The state has not seen a rate this low since July 2007 and Texas continues to trend below the national average of 5.5 percent.

Texas' total nonfarm seasonally adjusted employment decreased by 25,400 jobs in March's preliminary estimate. This comes on the heels of an impressive string of 53 straight months of job growth for the state. Over the year, the state has added 327,500 jobs for an overall growth rate of 2.9 percent, outpacing the national growth rate of 2.3 percent.

"Maintaining a diversity of employment opportunities has kept Texas strong for the past four years," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chairman Andres Alcantar. "We must continue to build and support partnerships that will help connect employers to a quality supply of skilled workers and equip job seekers with training that will help them succeed." The Mining and Logging industry, which includes oil and gas employment, saw a decline in March with the loss of an estimated 2,800 jobs statewide.

"While some workers may be temporarily impacted by statewide reductions in the oil and gas industry, our 28 local workforce boards stand ready to help these and all job seekers identify transferrable skills for other employment opportunities or obtain training that will help them quickly transition to new jobs," said TWC Commissioner Representing Labor Ronny Congleton.

The Education and Health Services industry added 3,400 jobs in March, followed in job gains by the Financial Activities industry which increased by 2,400 positions. Job gains were also experienced in the Leisure and Hospitality and Other

"Connecting employers with the workers they need is critical to our state's success," said TWC Commissioner Representing Employers Hope Andrade. "Employers and job seekers can access the largest job-matching network in the state through WorkInTexas.com. Today, the site offers more than 250,000 available positions for those seeking work, and a tremendous pool of outstanding job seekers for employers to choose from for their workforce needs."

The Midland Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) had the lowest March unemployment rate in the state at 2.9 percent, followed by the Amarillo MSA with a 3.0 percent rate and the Lubbock, College Station-Bryan and Austin-Round Rock MSAs at 3.3 percent (not seasonally adjusted).
