## slated for June 29 in Mertzon

The good rains continue and things keep looking better and better. Range and livestock managers are having to make all sorts of decisions regarding pastures and the production they support. To that end, the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service will conduct the second workshop of the multi-county Range and Livestock series on June 29 in Mertzon.

The Irion, Sutton and Tom Green county program will be at the Mertzon Community Center, located behind the football field at 118 W. Duncan Ave.

Registration will begin at 8 a.m. with the program to follow at 8:30 a.m.

This program aims to help ranchers take advantage of the good rainfall and improving range conditions we're having. Livestock selection, optimizing grazing and improving habitat will be the focus of the day.

Presentations will include: Considerations for Rambouillet and Dorper Sheep Production in West Texas, Grazing Strategies for the Long Haul, Herbicide Updates for West Texas Brush Control, Enhancing Wildlife Habitat and a Predator Association Update.

AgriLife Extension specialists from San Angelo who are scheduled to speak include: Dr. Reid Redden, state sheep and goat specialist; Dr. Morgan Russell, range specialist, and Dr. John Tomecek, wildlife specialist.

Individual preregistration, which includes lunch, is \$15 by June 26 and \$20 thereafter. Three Texas Department of Agriculture continuing education units, one integrated pest management and two general, will be offered.

To preregister and for more information, call the AgriLife Extension office in Irion County at 325-835-2711. You can also drop off registration at the Sutton County Extension Office or contact the Sonora office at 325-387-3101.






