## Texas A&M Agrilife Researchers Investigate Salmonella In Texas Feedlots



mental faculty and graduate students on the findings from projects sponsored by the Beef Checkoff and Texas Beef Council. Taylor described the recovery and identification of salmonella serovars from feedlot environmental samples, while Gill gave an overview of the presence and types of phages recovered from these samples.

Taylor and researchers looked to identify the serotypes of salmonella from environmental samples taken from a select group of feedlots in South Texas previously identified by study collaborators Drs. Kerri Gehring, Jeffrey Savell and Ashley Arnold, all in College Station, to bear differing rates of salmonella presence in the lymph nodes

COLLEGE STATION – A study examining the presence of salmonella in beef cattle feedyards was the focus of a series of studies by Texas A&M Agrilife Research scientists and faculty in the department of animal science at Texas A&M University, College Station. The findings could help develop new pre-harvest food safety interven-

tions in providing safe, wholesome food for consumers.

AgriLife Research scientists Drs. Jason Gill, Dr. Matt Taylor and other professors are researching bacteriophages, or phages, which are viruses that act as predators to bacteria, for use as food safety interventions.

Both Gill and Taylor gave seminars recently to depart-

## July 4th Weekend Law Enforcement Roundup Texas Game Wardens Investigating Multiple Water-Related Incidents

AUSTIN – Texas Game Wardens are investigating several incidents from the July 4th holiday weekend, including multiple fatalities.

On Monday, game wardens recovered the fourth victim from a canoeing accident on Houston County Lake. Three victims were recovered late Sunday afternoon and the incident remains under investigation.

Also Monday night, game wardens led by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Dive Team recovered a victim who had driven into Richland Chambers Lake.

A 41-year-old Marble Falls man was arrested by game wardens late Saturday and booked into the Burnet County Jail on intoxication assault charges after the boat he was allegedly operating collided with a Mar-

ble Falls Police Department marine safety patrol vessel on Lake Marble Falls. A Marble Falls police captain onboard the patrol vessel was seriously injured.

Game wardens are also investigating the death of a five year old girl that occurred Saturday on Lake Travis near Austin, but are not releasing her name at this time. Mechanical failure may have caused the death.

Other incidents encountered by game wardens during the holiday weekend included: responding to nine boating accidents, recovering two stolen boats, conducting nine search and rescue events, and multiple felony arrests. While on patrol through the July 4th holiday weekend, game wardens contacted over 47,000 boaters. A total of 63 arrests

were made for boating while intoxicated.

"I appreciate the hard work and dedication of our Game Wardens who work every day to protect our citizens and our natural resources," said Colonel Craig Hunter, TPWD Law Enforcement Director. "We also realize this is a difficult time for families and friends who have lost loved ones and TPWD would like to extend our deepest sympathies to those affected by the tragedies."

TPWD recommends you learn to swim, closely supervise children while on or near the water, utilize a designated driver, wear a life vest, take a boater education course, and use the ignition safety switch while operating a motorized vessel.

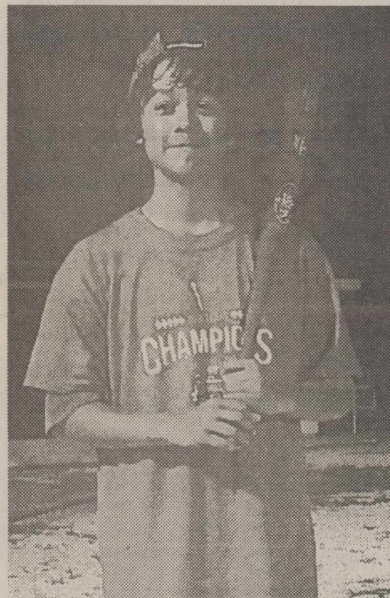
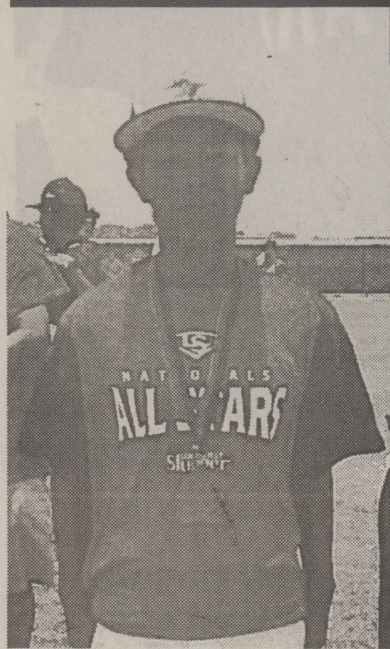

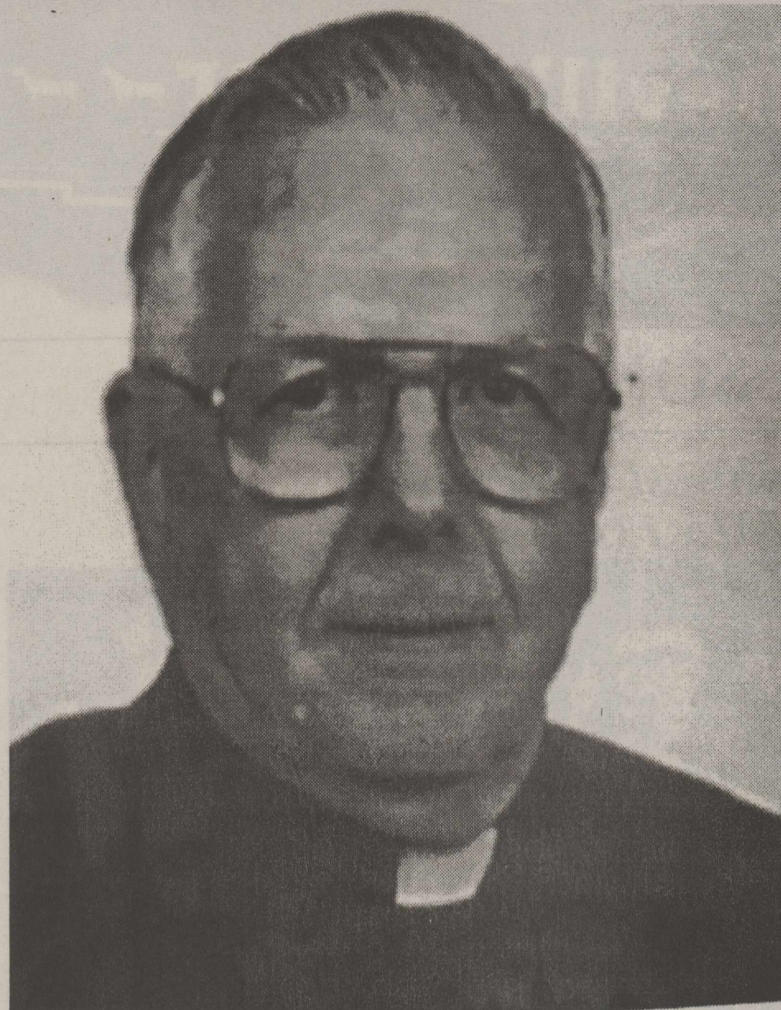
**Wellness Ministry**

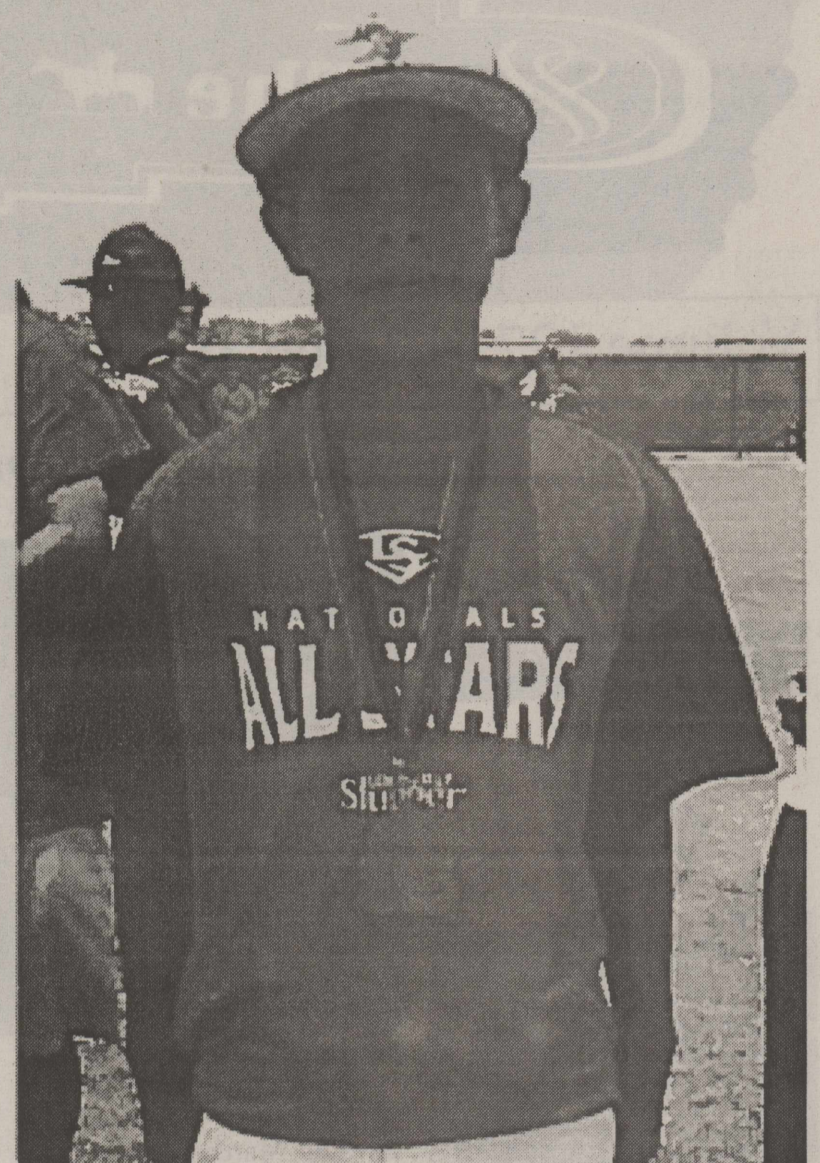
**Obituary**



**Rev. William R. DuBuisson**

December 25, 1929 - June 25, 2015  
 Rev. William R. DuBuisson, OMI, born in San Antonio, Texas on December 25, 1929, died in San Antonio on June 25, 2015 at the age of 85 years. Fr. DuBuisson entered St. Peter's Novitiate on May 30, 1948 in Mission, Texas and professed vows as a member of the Congregation of the Missionary Oblates of Mary Immaculate on May 31, 1949. Fr. DuBuisson completed his studies in philosophy and theology at the DeMazenod Scholasticate, now Oblate School of Theology, in San Antonio. He was ordained to the priesthood on September 8, 1955 at St. Mary's Church in San Antonio, by Archbishop Robert E. Lucey, DD. Fr. DuBuisson later earned a Master's degree in Canon Law at University of Ottawa in Ontario, Canada and a Licentiate in Canon Law at Saint Paul University, in Ottawa, Ontario, Canada. Fr. DuBuisson's first assignment was Associate Pastor at Sacred Heart Parish in Edinburg, Texas. He also served as Professor at St. Anthony's Seminary in San Antonio; Professor and Vice Rector at Notre Dame Seminary in Cotabato City, Philippines; Associate Pastor at Immaculate Heart Parish in Harlingen, Texas; Associate Pastor at Our Lady of Sorrows Parish in Houston, Texas; Pastor at Sacred Heart of Mary in Rocksprings, Texas; Pastor at Sacred Heart Parish in Del Rio, Texas; Associate Pastor at Our Lady of Guadalupe in Midland, Texas; Associate Pastor at St. Ann's Parish in Midland, Texas; Pastor at Our Lady of Lourdes Parish in Andrews, Texas; Pastor at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Parish in Ozona, Texas; and Pastor at St. Ann's Parish in Sonora, Texas. Fr. DuBuisson also served as Judge on the Appellate Court for the Dioceses of Texas; and as Judge and Adjutant Judicial Vicar for the Tribunal in San Angelo, Texas for many years. In 2009, Fr. DuBuisson retired and moved to Oblate Madonna Residence in San Antonio, Texas. Fr. DuBuisson is preceded in death by his parents, William Robert DuBuisson, Jr. and Louise (Fox) DuBuisson, and his brother, Donald. In addition to his Oblate family, Fr. DuBuisson is survived by numerous cousins, nieces, nephews, and friends. Fr. DuBuisson will be remembered with respect and esteem by his Oblate brothers and all the people who were recipients of his pastoral care. Funeral services were held at Immaculate Conception Chapel at 285 Oblate Drive, San Antonio, Texas 78216. A Vigil was held on Tuesday, June 30, 2015 at 7:00 PM. Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated on Wednesday, July 1, 2015 at 10:00 AM. Interment followed at the Oblate Cemetery. Arrangements by: THE ANGELUS FUNERAL HOME

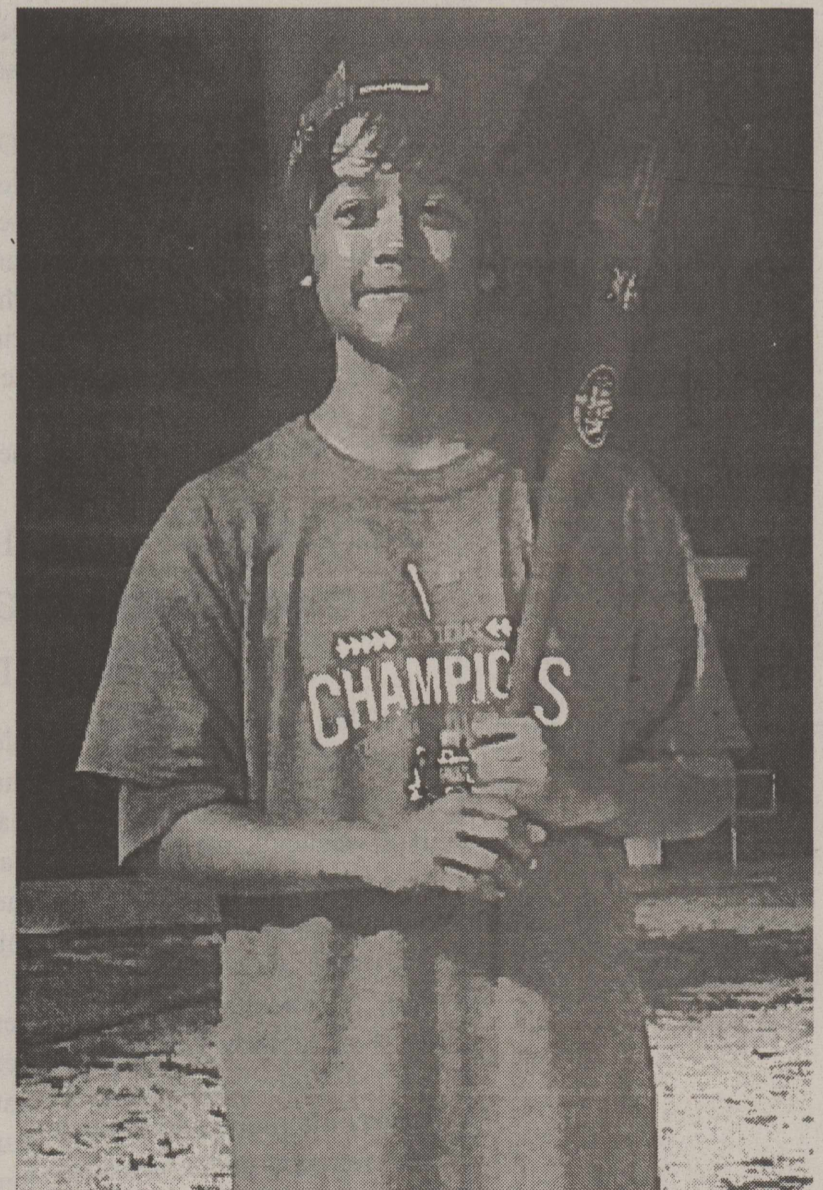

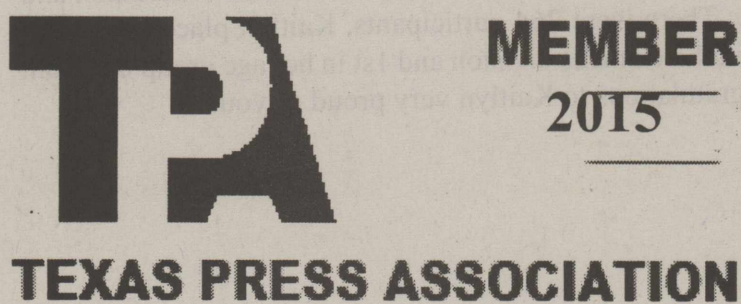

There was no program because of a last minute change of schedule for our scheduled speaker. ### July Home Horticulture Tips

We've enjoyed a rather mild growing season with regard to temperatures. Having good rainfall definitely helps the home garden and landscape be productive and grow well. But, as we go into the hot part of the year, we'll need to be watchful. Here are a few tips.

#### Planting

Tomato transplants can be planted now for fall gardens. Good older varieties include Surefire, Celebrity, Heatwave, 444 and cherry types. Transplants must be acclimated to the sun in order to prevent sunscald from occurring.

Warm season grasses can be planted, but an abundant amount of water will be necessary until the grass is established.

#### Pruning:

During these fast-growing periods, we may have to mow lawn once a week and be sure blades are sharp. We should also remove dead, diseased, and damaged branches from trees and shrubs.

#### Fertility:

Apply iron sulfate to plants that are showing yellow leaves with green veins. Remember to keep iron sulfate or other iron products off of sidewalks and houses.

#### Be on the lookout for:

Watch for chinch bugs in St. Augustine grass. Chinch bugs cause dried areas in sunny parts on the lawn. Chinch bugs are black and white with white diamonds on their wings.

White grub worms will show up 6 weeks after the major June beetle flight. Be on the look out for these damaging insects in the lawn and flower beds. Treat only if there are 5-7 grubs per square foot of soil.

#### Miscellaneous chores:

It hasn't been the case so far this year, but during dry summers, soil moisture becomes extremely important and essential for good plant production. A good mulch will retain valuable moisture needed for plant growth, and improve overall gardening success. Mulches are usually applied 2 to 6 inches deep, depending on the material used. In general, the coarser the material, the deeper the mulch. For example, a 2-inch layer of cottonseed hulls will have about the same mulching effect as 6 inches of oat straw or 4 inches of coastal Bermuda hay.

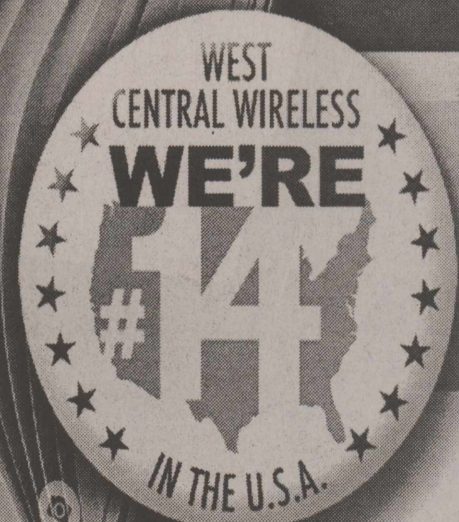

Continued from Front Page of cattle at harvest.

The work was published in the Journal of Food Protection. The researchers recovered no detectable salmonella from superficial cervical lymph nodes from cattle in one feedlot, while cattle sourced from feedlot B yielded 100 percent positive salmonella detection from cervical lymph nodes at harvest.

"These results led the research team to question what factors contributed to such dramatic differences in the presence of salmonella in cattle lymph nodes coming from these feedlots from within the same geographic region," Taylor said.

Gill suggested phages might be actively suppressing the indigenous salmonella in the one feedlot, while the other feedlot lacked phages capable of controlling salmonella populations.

The researchers in the current study, including graduate animal science research assistant Yicheng Xie, collected samples from feces, feed, drinking water and soil in pens.

"Those samples were processed in the Food Microbiology Laboratory and Texas A&M

Center for Food Safety where salmonella was positively identified," Taylor said.

Taylor said the laboratory work utilized equipment from Roka Bioscience Inc.'s Atlas System at the Texas A&M Center for Food Safety in College Station. Of all the samples, 85 percent of recovered salmonellae were collected from a single feedlot, with the remainder from a second feedlot. None were recovered from the feedlot previously testing negative for salmonella in lymph nodes of sourced cattle during harvest. In a comparison of culture plus biochemical-

based detection of salmonella versus the Atlas System, test results yielded only one disagreement, where the single discrepant result was between an Atlas negative and a culture positive.

From a set of 38 isolates representative of salmonella-positive samples, Salmonella Anatum was the most frequently recovered serotype, according to the researchers. Salmonella Montevideo, Muenchen, Altona, Kralingen and Kentucky were also recovered. These results are similar to those from other researchers around the U.S. also researching the transmission of salmonella in beef via lymph node carriage.

"Interestingly, recovered salmonellae did not display resistance to multiple types of

antibiotic drugs, though resistance to streptomycin was frequently observed, as well as sporadic resistance to other drugs, including gentamicin sulfisoxazole," Taylor said. "Eighteen different phage isolates were recovered from the feedlot samples, some with lytic activity against a diverse set of salmonella serovars."


These data were recently presented at the 2015 Beef Industry Safety Summit meeting in Dallas, and the Texas Association for Food Protection meeting in Austin.

"One opportunity from the current data may be to develop new pre-harvest food safety interventions that reduce the numbers of salmonella on cattle hides at harvest by combining salmonella-at-

tacking phages together to kill any salmonella on the animal prior to harvest, Taylor said. "Such interventions already exist for some pathogenic E. coli, such as E. coli O157:H7.

"While such an intervention for salmonella would be unable to attack all serotypes of the pathogen, interventions could be designed that work to reduce the serotypes of salmonella most frequently recovered from cattle, or rather those serotypes most frequently associated with human disease on fresh beef products. This would benefit not only Texas but also U.S. cattle producers and the beef industry in providing a safe, wholesome food for consumers."

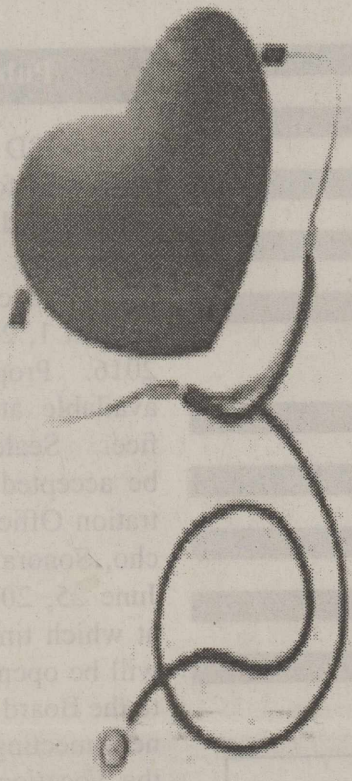

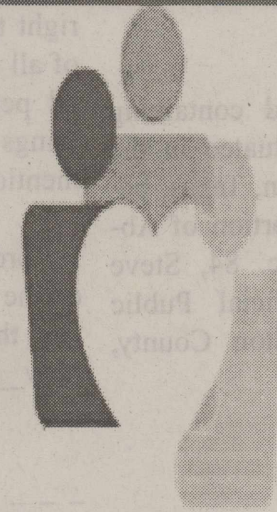
