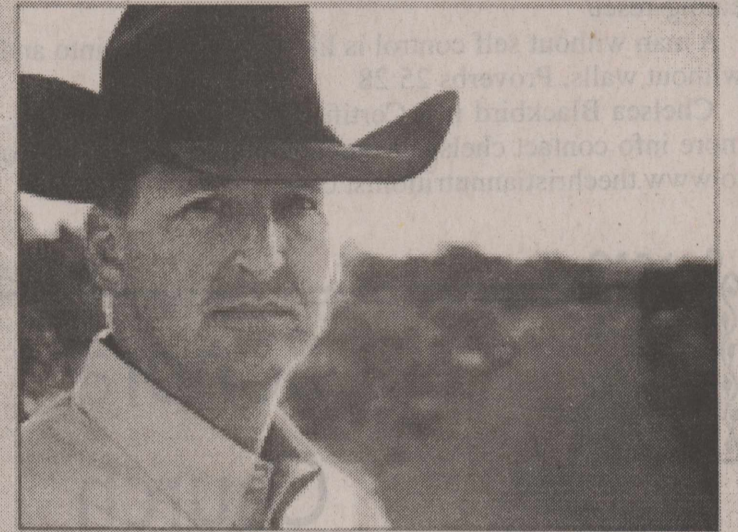

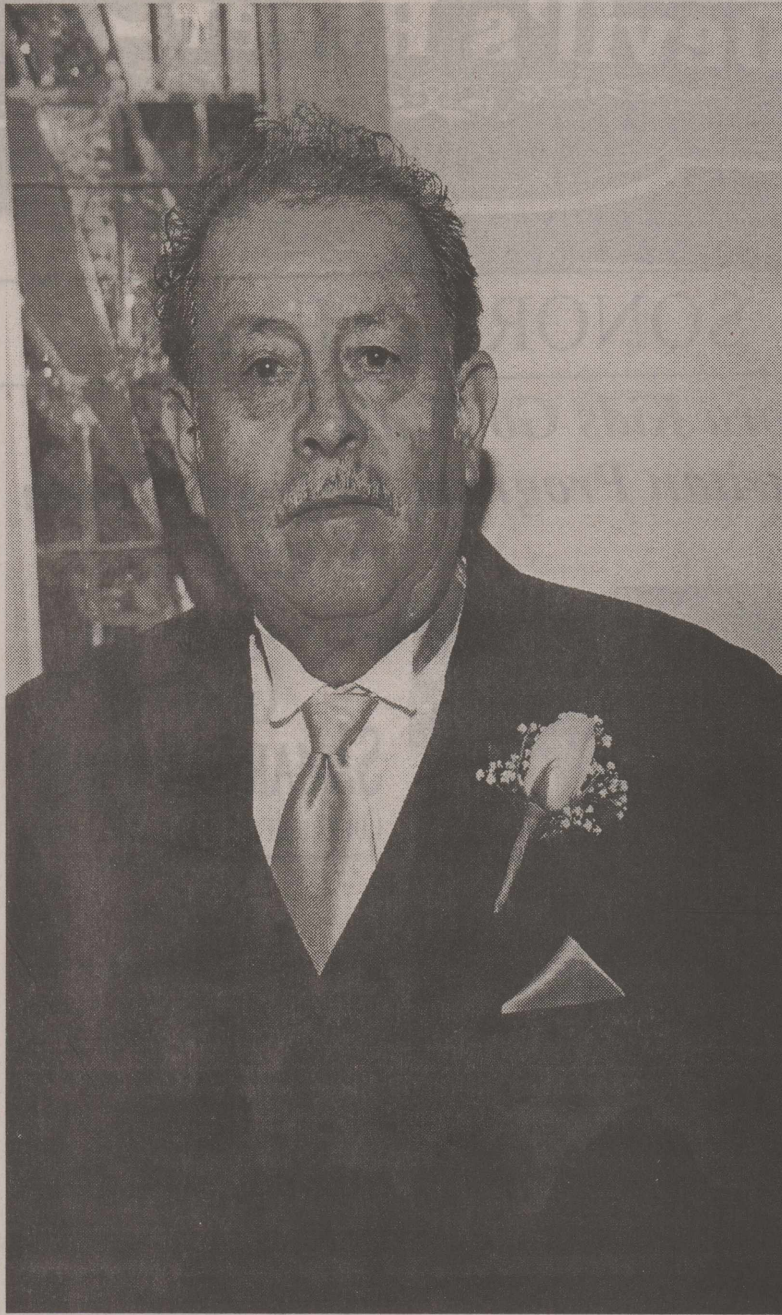
1. a green Smoothie for breakfast

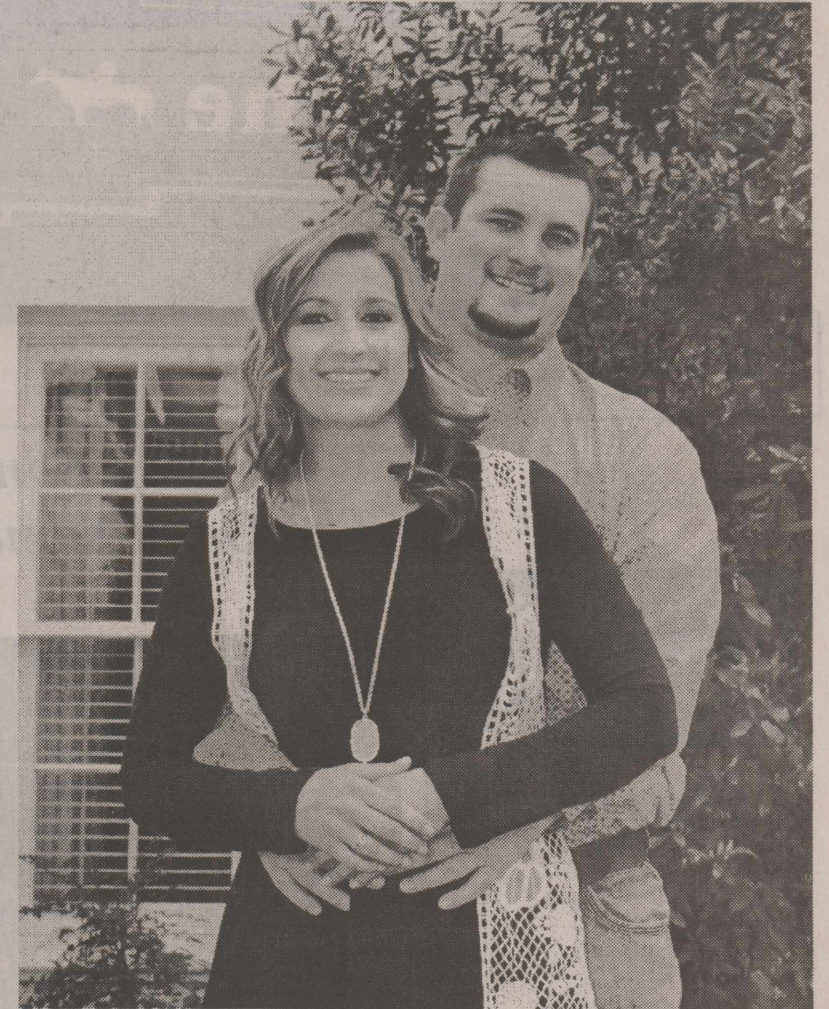

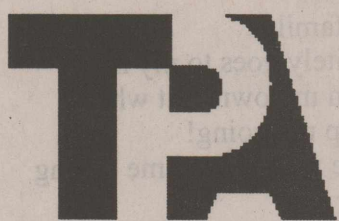

Potty Training 101

Oh, the joy of a new puppy or rescue dog! Your new, four-legged youngster brings laughter and fun. But, along with the fun comes more responsibilities, like potty training. Let's be honest. How many of you want to pull your hair out from the frustration of potty training? I don't doubt it.

Potty training your puppy or adult dog is one of the more difficult tasks to accomplish. Let's start with the basics of communication.

Obviously, your dog can't talk to you to tell when it needs to go outside. However, dogs do communicate with you through nonverbal body language and signals. Dogs will usually develop a signal to indicate to you when it needs to potty. The problem is when that signal is missed to let Fido outside. Little Fido then goes over to a corner and squats or hikes a leg on mama's favorite couch or chair. Oh boy, does mama get mad! But who is at fault? Is it the dog, which had a natural urge to potty? Or is it the human, who missed the

signal to let the dog outside to go potty? Either way, you have a mess to clean up.

Communication from your dog may take the form of a sound such as whimpering, whining, barking, or even a snort. Behavior and body language signals could include scratching at a door, licking you, licking themselves, going to the front or back door, running away to get your attention, or a look/stare toward you. My dog, Tipper, is a Border Collie and is highly intelligent. However, potty training her, as a puppy, was a big challenge for me. I never could figure out her signal. Then, one day, I noticed how intently she was staring at me. I couldn't understand why she was so focused on me. Because I did not react to her "look", she proceeded to go ahead and squat right in the middle of the living room. I call it her "silent but deadly" stare. That was my "ah-ha" moment when I realized what her signal was for a potty break. After that, I was always watching for that stare. From then on, potty training

Tipper was not a problem. But it took time for me to get with the program with her. Your dog may not be so difficult to read, but it is giving you some kind of signal saying potty time. Pay attention to your dog, especially after playing, eating or drinking. In general, a dog will urinate within 15-20 minutes after drinking and defecate within 30-45 minutes after eating. A puppy learning to control its bladder will be shorter than the time I have mentioned for an adult dog.

Keeping calm and having a nice, neutral tone in your voice is a better way to communicate with your dog. Keep in mind, scolding a dog or puppy after the fact of piddle or poo does not help the situation. This also goes for "rubbing their nose" in the mess. The dog is not going to understand why it is in trouble or why you are so upset. If you did not see the action, you cannot punish, scold, hit, spank or yell at the dog. The dog does not retain the memory and will not understand. The best way to handle the situation

is to be calm and start over. There are several methods to try when potty training a dog. Depending on your personal preferences, you can choose which method may work best for you and the dog.

The crate training method, my personal favorite, is often misconceived as a cruel way to houstrain your puppy. This is a false conception. Based on the natural instincts of a dog, crate training is a great method because it provides clear boundaries and a small, cozy den for the dog to feel safe and comfortable. The crate should only be as big as the dog. Getting a crate larger than the dog will give too much space for a puppy to eliminate in a corner. You only want the dog to have enough room to walk in, turn around, and lie down. No extra "wiggle" room is needed. A dog does not want to eliminate in its sleeping quarters but will if it has no choice. Always let your dog go potty before putting them into the crate. Limit the time the dog is in the crate to just two or three hours. If you will be gone more than three hours,

have someone else let the dog out to have a bathroom break. The puppy will not be able to hold its bladder for much longer than a few hours, or you will have a mess to clean upon your return.

Set up a schedule! Let your puppy out on a regular schedule and try not to deviate from that schedule. Puppies may need to go out every hour until they have figured out the routine. Get yourself an egg timer and set it every hour to remind yourself to take Princess out to do the doggie doo. Use your cell phone alarm clock or whatever you can to help you remember and pay attention to your dog.

Puppy training pads and diapers can also be useful tools. There is a trick to using the potty pads many people do not know. Place two or three pads spaced a few inches apart in the same area. Have you ever watched a dog urinate? When urinating on grass, dogs typically do not go to the exact same spot because it is already scented and "used". They return to the area, but not the same spot. If you have a potty pad already used and wet, re-

place it with a fresh one. The pup may go piddle on the outer area of the pad because it is already scented and used. Pay attention to the area the puppy is consistently returning to for elimination. Watch and see if your dog will go to the exact spot it peed on last time. You may be surprised with your puppy's pattern when you see it. Potty pads can also be helpful for people who live in an apartment on upper levels. People living in a third floor walk-up may have a hard time getting Fido down fast enough before elimination. You can even set up a doggie litterbox! Finally, the best and most reliable way to potty train is to pay attention to your dog and be consistent. Know where your puppy is at all times! When you're not watching is when your precious pooch is going to get into trouble or leave you a surprise. When you are not able to watch your puppy, put it in the crate. That is the best way to know your puppy is safe, and you won't have a piddle or poo to clean later.

Plans Are Being Finalized For Two Major Sheep, Goat Events In San Angelo, Aug. 28-29

SAN ANGELO – What organizers tout as the largest, most comprehensive sheep and goat production educational opportunity in recent times is coming to fruition.

A diverse and changing sheep and goat industry will highlight two back-to-back educational opportunities in San Angelo on Aug. 28-29. (Texas A&M AgriLife Communications photo by Steve Byrns)

The venue is actually two events set back-to-back on Aug. 28-29 in San Angelo, said Marvin Ensor, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service regional program leader in San Angelo.

He said the first of the two is the 42nd Annual Sheep and Goat Field Day conducted by and on the grounds of the Texas A&M AgriLife Research and Extension Center located just north of San Angelo. That event starts with registration at 8 a.m. followed by the program from 9 a.m.-1 p.m. Aug. 28.

The second event is the first ever Texas Sheep and Goat Expo set from 2-8:30 p.m., also on Aug. 28, and again on Aug. 29 from 7 a.m.-4 p.m. at the San Angelo Fairgrounds.

“The Texas sheep and goat industry is undergoing tremendous change,” Ensor said. “And the AgriLife agencies, AgriLife Extension and Texas A&M AgriLife Re-

search, are staying abreast of those changes. The industry is as diverse now as perhaps it's ever been, so we are offering these events that will specifically target this diversity.

“As an example, our traditional wool sheep, by far the most predominant variety in the West for generations, are making way for an ever increasing hair sheep population. And while both are sheep, there are significant differences in the management and marketing of wool sheep, a dual-purpose animal, and hair sheep kept solely as meat producers. The expo curriculum will recognize and address the specific

needs and interests of these two sheep types and the other major segments of the industry—club lamb, and meat goat production, while recognizing and providing support in the common areas that impact all aspects of the sheep and goat industry.” <http://youtu.be/VnD7n3DF0BA>

The annual Sheep and Goat Field Day is a long-standing tradition of the AgriLife center dating back to the 1970s. The field day is generally scheduled the first Thursday of each September, but Ensor said both events complement one another so well that planners opted to move the field day to coincide with the expo as a convenience to participants.

The expo is to be a premier state-level event with emphasis on demonstrations and hands-on activities that will follow the center's Aug. 28 field day. Activities on Aug. 29 will start early at the San Angelo Fairgrounds with a chuck wagon breakfast followed by concurrent sessions featuring the various management and marketing techniques specific to wool breeds, hair sheep, club lamb production and meat goats.

Commercial businesses will exhibit new equipment, products and services at both events.

“Both these programs will be packed with information,”

Ensor said. “We’d like folks to first attend the center’s field day that touts work being conducted there, including the extensive flock guard dog work being done, work on using juniper in deer feed to limit the problem of feral hogs eating much of it, insight into factors affecting lamb prices, the latest in prescribed fire management and some very interesting wool garment work. After a sponsored lunch at the center, activities will move to the San Angelo Fairgrounds for the start of the expo.

“It will be a full two days, and participants can take part in any or all of both events. We do hope they will take advantage of both programs though, as we have never offered such an opportunity before.”

Ensor said expo presenters will include AgriLife personnel, Texas A&M University faculty, veterinarians, Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory staff, agribusinesses and area ranchers.

The concurrent expo sessions will include:

– Wool Sheep Session: rancher panels on effective coyote, bobcat, feral hog control; lambing rate expectations and current goals, and how to increase the number of lambs marketed.

– Hair Sheep Session: hair sheep breeds overview; recommended best management

practices-rancher panel; tips on selecting breeding stock with a cull-keep demonstration; marketing opportunities for hair sheep; and cause, prevention and treatment of pneumonia.

– Club Lamb Session: ram breeding soundness and semen collection; testing for reproductive and other diseases; breed classification standards; the facts about coccidiosis and other internal parasites; and keys to a successful embryo transfer program.

– Meat Goat Session: use of embryo transfer technology to improve genetics-producer panel; testing for reproductive and other diseases; pregnancy testing using ultrasound and Pregnancy-Specific Protein B technology; coccidiosis and other parasites; and cause, prevention and treatment of pneumonia.

The AgriLife Center sheep and goat field day is free including the lunch there.
