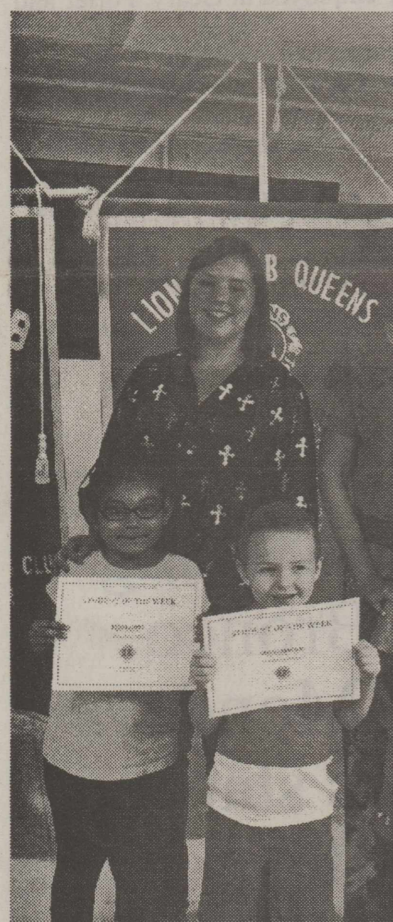

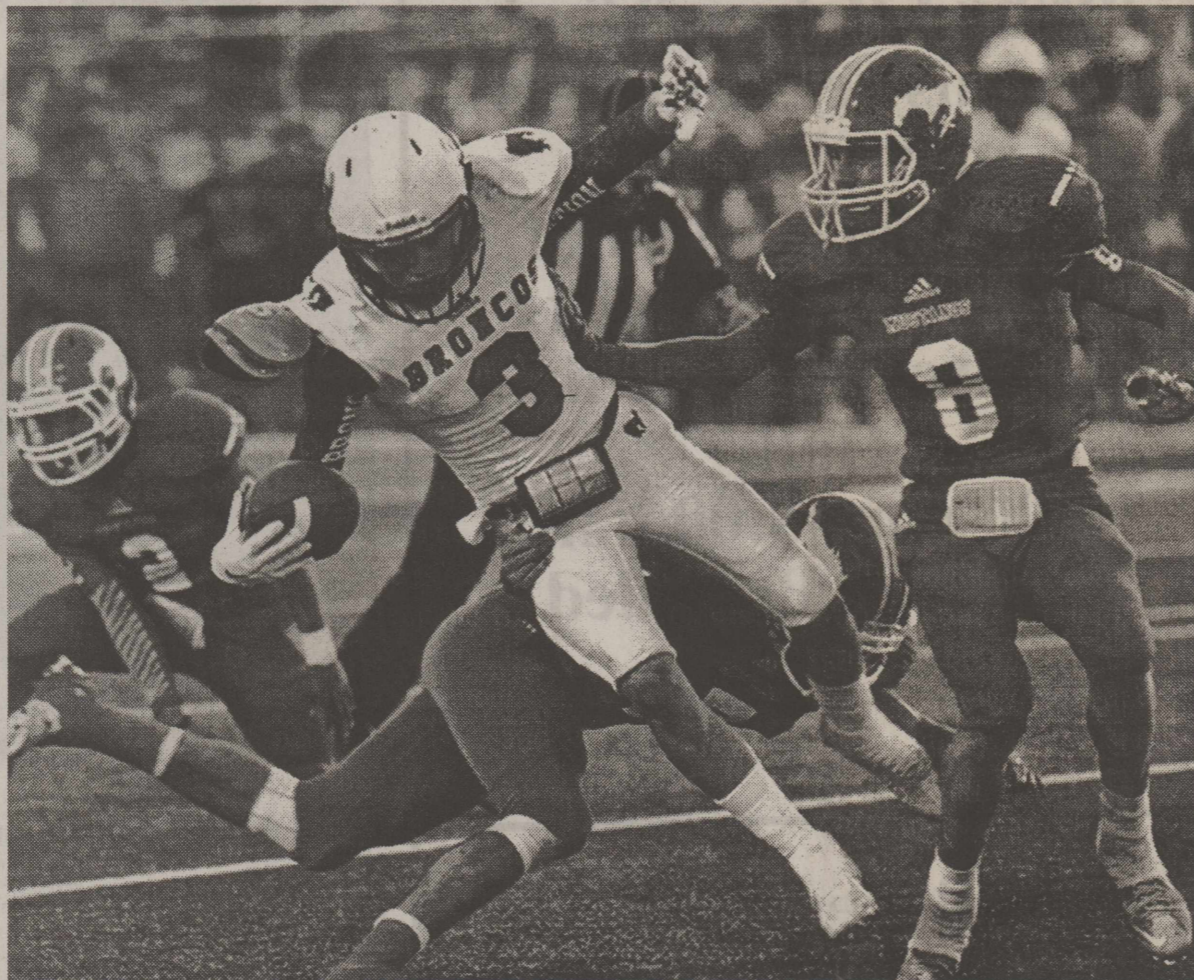

## Denver City 49 – Sonora 28

The Broncos started their first scoring drive of the game with 5:44 left in the first quarter and Denver City leading by three touchdowns. On third down, Kaden Cordell threw to Noah Sanmiguel who gained 15 yards on the play. On the next third down, Cordell threw to Jonathan Martinez who gained 12 yards to the Mustang's 29-yard line. On second down, Cordell threw to Luke James on a route over the middle. James caught it at the seven-yard line. He juke through three Mustangs for the first Bronco touchdown. Octavio Mendez kicked the PAT, and the Broncos were on the scoreboard with 4:07 left in the first quarter.

Cordell completed long passes to Michael Solis and James. Jarrett Jackson made an eight-yard run. The drive ended when a Cordell pass from punt formation was knocked incomplete giving the ball back to the Mustangs near midfield.

The Bronco defense stepped up and forced a Mustang turnover on downs. Starting from the 50, Solis ran the quarterback delay to Denver City's 37-yard line. He followed with an excellent screen pass to Jackson who weaved his way to the 27 yard line. After a pass interference call against Denver City, the Broncos had a first down at their 11-yard line. Four incomplete passes later, Denver City had the football again.

gung's drive, Liam Yourgalite stripped the ball and recovered the fumble at their 15-yard line.

Solis and Jackson once again executed another screen pass for a 38-yard gain. The drive ended when a tipped Cordell pass was intercepted. The Mustangs took a knee to end the half. Denver City 28 – Sonora 7 at the half.

Sonora started their next scoring drive with 6:51 left in the third quarter. The Broncos used completed passes and Mustangs penalties to keep the drive alive. A touchdown completion from Cordell to Jackson was negated by a Bronco penalty. Jackson fumbled on a run to his right, but he was able to recover it. Facing a fourth and goal, Cordell threw to Martinez at the goal line. The Mustangs were flagged for another pass interference giving the Broncos a first and goal at the five. The Broncos finally scored on fourth down when Cordell threw a touchdown pass to Jackson. With 1:15 left in the third quarter, the Mustangs led by score of 35 to 14.

Carter Zook caught a short pass from Cordell and showed the fans that he can run fast without hurdles in his way. It appeared that he had scored on a 70-yard pass completion, but he stepped out of bounds at their 33-yard line. On the following play, Cordell threw to a wide open James for the touchdown.

The first gain of the Broncos' last scoring drive came on the tip drill. A Cordell

pass to Zook bounced off of his hands into the hands of James who then gained 15 yards. After Cordell completed passes to James and Zook, Solis and Jackson continued their magic with another fine screen pass. On fourth down, Solis avoided two tacklers at the line of scrimmage and rushed for a Bronco first down. Cordell threw his fourth touchdown of the night to Sanmiguel who had run a crossing pattern.

In case you were wondering about how the Mustangs scored. Cole McLeroy, who can run the 100 meters in 10.7, gained 389 yards on 35 carries. He scored six touchdowns.

Cordell passed for 235 yards completing 20 of 41. He threw four touchdown passes. Solis completed 4 of 10 for 56 yards. He also rushed four times for 22 yards. James was the leading receiver with 11 receptions for 135 yards and two touchdowns. Jackson caught seven for 70 yards, and Zook had one for 40 yards.

On defense, four players had nine or more tackles. Michael Mungia had nine, James and Kevin Martinez had ten, and Cordell led with eleven.

This week, the Colts open their season in Wall on Thursday. The 9th grade team and JV are in Sonora versus the Hawks. The Broncos and Hawks meet again on Friday night in Wall.

## Lady Bronco Volleyball



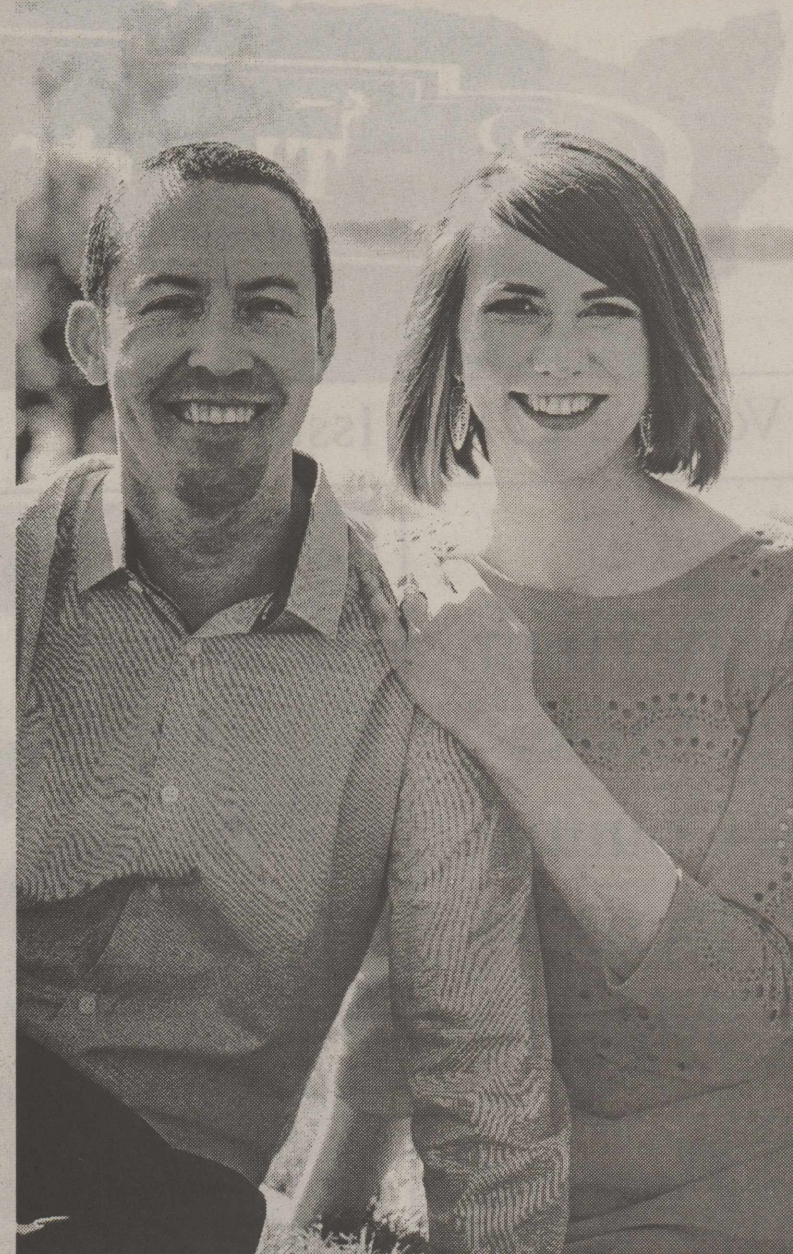

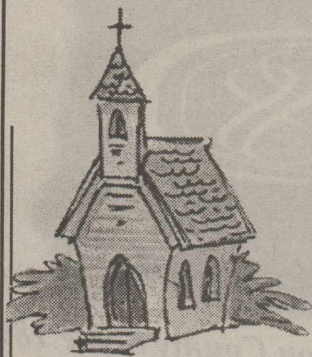

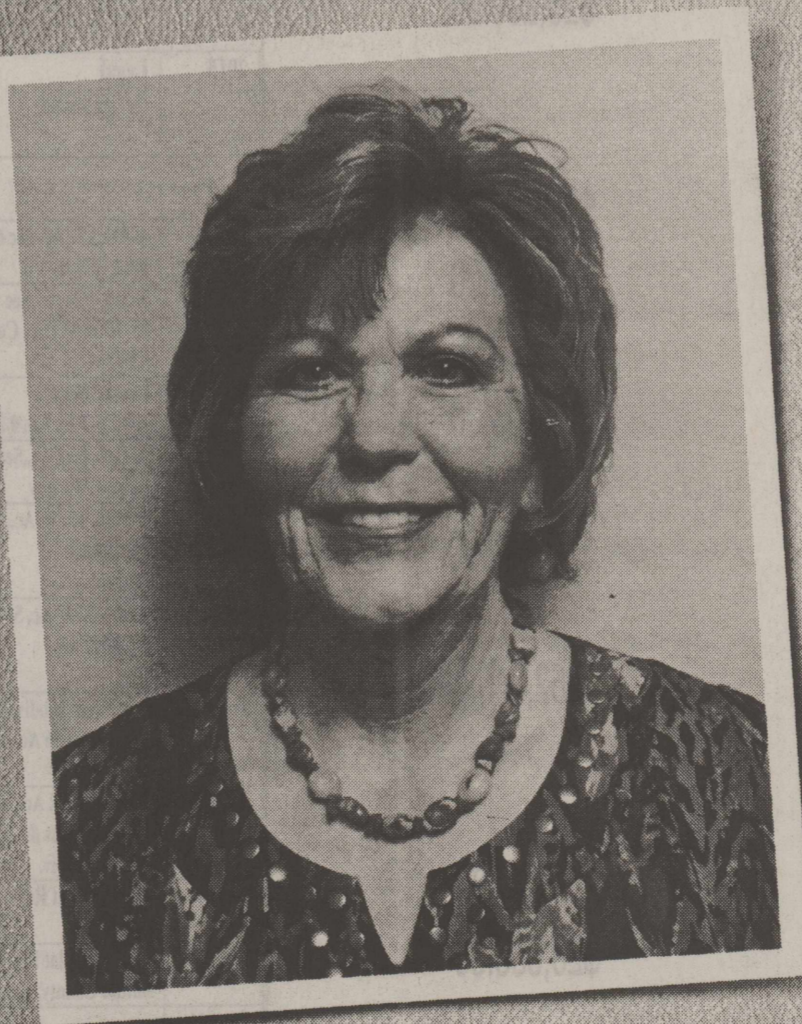

## Fall Lawn Fertilization

As everyone who mows a lawn must realize, grasses like Bermuda, St. Augustine and Centipede experience their highest leaf growth during the warm days of summer, but when the cooler days of early fall arrive, this will change. It's been hot out there, but not too long from now, lawns will not need to be mowed nearly as often and eventually will not need to be mowed at all.

During the days between the arrival of cooler weather and the first "killing" frost when the lawns turn brown, a very important process takes place. All summer, the food material produced by the plant has been mostly used for leaf growth, but once leaf growth is low in

the fall, higher amounts of this same food material become available for root growth and for storage in the root system.

It is critical for winter survival that the plant be able to store adequate amounts of food. Under most conditions this is not a problem at all, but if fertilizer, especially if it is a fertilizer that contains nitrogen in a soluble form, is applied to the lawn too late in the year, there may be a problem. When too much nitrogen is supplied to the grass plant, it tends to stimulate leaf growth. Leaf growth makes heavy demands on the plant's food

production. High leaf growth may even reduce food reserves - the food reserves needed for winter survival. This is the basic reason the first to mid part of September is generally considered to be the time for the last application of fertilizer for the year.

A fertilizer with a nutrient ratio of 3-1-2 (such as 15-5-10) will work well for most of our lawns. We can apply it at a rate of 1 pound of nitrogen per 1,000 sq. ft. of lawn area.

### Study Examines Role Of Vegetable Pairings In School Plate Waste

COLLEGE STATION – A study led by a team of Texas A&M University System researchers found school meals paired with popular vegetables are less likely to wind up in garbage bins.

A team led by Texas A&M AgriLife Research and the Institute for Obesity Research and Program Evaluation at Texas A&M University measured food waste in three elementary schools in Bryan and Dallas. The schools are participants in the U.S. Department of Agriculture National School Lunch Program both in pre- and post-implementation of the new standards.

The study was funded by the Alliance for Potato Research and Education and is published in the journal, Food and Nutrition Sciences. It can be found at <http://bit.ly/1JEBpjz>.

“Our research team looked at whether there is a relationship between consumption of certain entrees and vegetables that would lead to plate waste,” said Dr. Oral Capps Jr., an AgriLife Research economist in Col-

lege Station. “We found that popular entrees such as burgers and chicken nuggets, contributed to greater waste of less popular vegetables.”

Conversely, entrees paired with potatoes – served as tator tots, oven-baked French fries, and wedges – experienced the least amount of overall waste, Capps said.

“Our study shows that optimizing entrée-vegetable pairings in schools meals has the potential to positively impact vegetable consumption, which is especially important for those students relying on school meals for their energy and nutrient needs,” Capps said.

The data were collected by a team of “plate waste warriors,” Texas A&M students who were paid by the hour, Capps said. Each wore a different colored apron that is associated with the assigned waste bin in which the entrée is discarded. A minimum of eight workers was needed at each school during the lunch periods, which were typically 10:45 a.m. through 1 p.m. The

A&M students gathered the trays containing leftover portions.

Leftovers were separated into different waste bags and each bag was weighed on a scale for plate-waste measurement. When students went through the lunch line, a sticker was placed on the food tray to identify the vegetable and entrée chosen. Students on the free lunch program were also evaluated for plate waste. The tray with the corresponding sticker was weighed and recorded to help calculate overall food waste.

Joining Capps on the research team was Dr. Peter Murano, associate professor from the department of nutrition and food science, founder and former director of the Institute for Obesity Research and Program Evaluation at Texas A&M; Ariun Ishdorj, assistant professor in the department of agricultural economics at Texas A&M; and Maureen Storey, president and CEO of the Alliance for Potato Research and Education.
