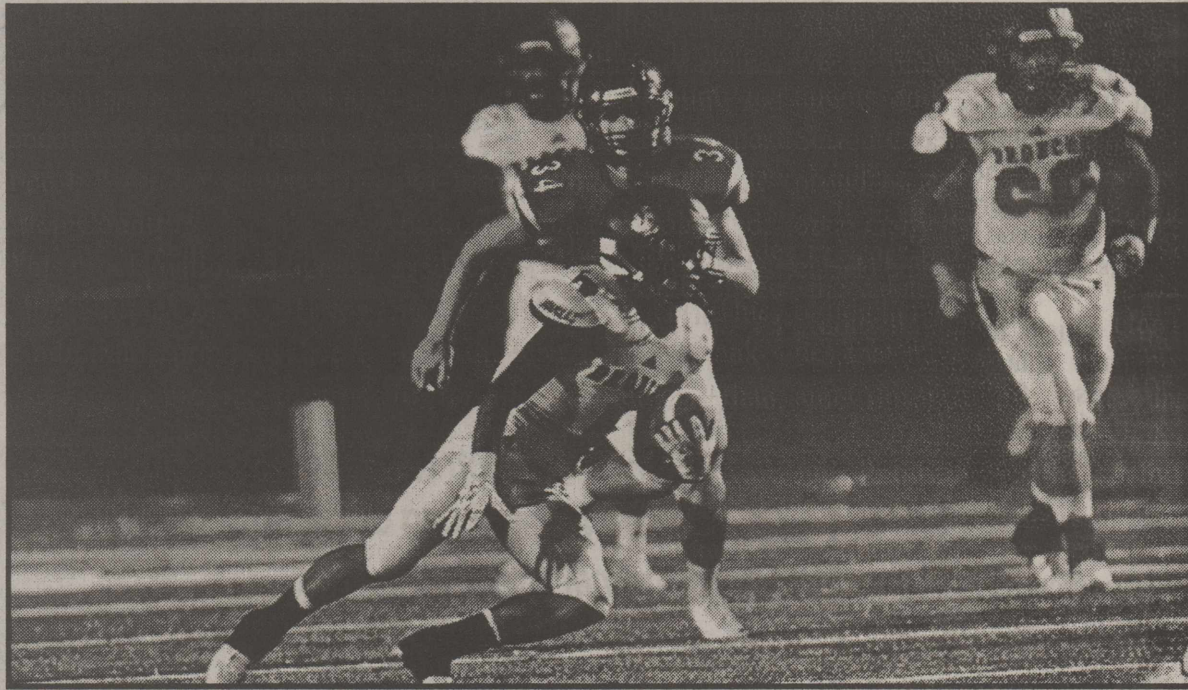

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## Greyhounds Are Hard To Catch

The Boerne Greyhounds, a Class 4A Division I school, outscored the Sonora Broncos 55 to 38. Despite the game going into the loss column, I felt that the game was a lot of fun to watch. I am sure the players had fun playing in this game.

Most people, when they see a score of 55 to 38, will assume that the winner jumped out to a commanding lead and, then, the loser scored a lot of meaningless touchdowns to make it look closer than it was. Not so. The Greyhounds jumped out to 14 to 0 lead in the fourth quarter. From the first play of the second quarter to the end of the game, the Greyhounds scored 41 points to the Broncos' 38.

When the Broncos got the ball with the score 14 to 0 with 5:30 left in the first quarter, the Broncos lined up in variants

of the Wing T, I, and Wishbone formations and ran the ball. On the next eleven plays, the Broncos ran "the sweep" for huge chunks of yardage. Jarrett Jackson, Luke James, and Kevin Martinez followed great run blocking during the drive. When the drive appeared to stall on a fourth and four, James got the pitch and appeared to be stopped behind the line. He kept fighting and dragged some defenders past the first down marker. When they reached the Red Zone, Martinez took the inside handoff and ran straight ahead dragging Greyhounds for 13 yards to a first and goal. After changing ends of the field, Jackson ran the twelfth sweep of the drive for a ten-yard touchdown. Octavio Mendez continued his outstanding kicking by making the PAT. Boerne 14 - Sonora 7 with

11:52 left in the half.

The Greyhounds answered with a one play touchdown pass and catch. Boerne 21 - Sonora 7.

The Broncos continued to run. On the sixth play, a deep pitch to Michael Solis gained 15 yards into Greyhound territory. A holding penalty wiped it out. On the next play, the deep pitch was mishandled for another large loss bringing up a punting situation. Kaden Cordell got off an excellent punt. The Greyhound returner ran forward to make the catch on the run, and the football bounced off his chest. Louie Castro recovered for the Broncos at our 48-yard line.

Returning to the spread, Solis used his legs to run the Broncos into the Red Zone. When the drive stalled, Mendez kicked a 28-yard field

goal. Boerne 21 - Sonora 10.

Starting from our 49-yard line, the Hounds were driving for their next score. On the eighth play, Jose Hernandez stepped into front of their receiver and sped untouched for a 92-yard Pick Six. Boerne 21 - Sonora 17.

Five plays later, Boerne scored on a pass play, but they missed the point after. The score at the end of the first half was Boerne 27 - Sonora 17.

On the opening drive of the second half, Boerne used five plays and scored on a pass completion. Boerne 34 - Sonora 17.

The next Bronco drive lasted eight plays and ended on a lost fumble. Boerne used ten plays to score their next touchdown. It came on a designed quarterback run of eight yards. Boerne 41 - Sonora 17.

The next seven plays for the Broncos didn't look good. Facing fourth and very long from our own 35-yard line, it looked like the wheels had finally come off, and the Greyhounds would pull away for a demoralizing blowout. Cordell took the snap and threw deep. James caught the pass between two defenders for a 45-yard completion and a first down at the Hounds' twenty yard line. Three plays later, Cordell handed off to Solis who ran eight yards for the touchdown. Boerne 41 - Sonora 24 with 1:51 left in the third.

Five plays later, the Greyhounds scored on a long touchdown pass. Boerne 48 - Sonora 24. The next Bronco drive lasted eleven plays. During this drive, the Broncos converted on two fourth downs. Jonathan Martinez caught a pass for one and Noah Sanmiguel caught the other. Sanmiguel caught the touchdown pass from Cordell. Boerne 48 - Sonora 31 - 9:38 left in the game.

The Bronco defense stepped up and forced a three and out. Boerne punted and the ball

rolled dead at Sonora's two-yard line.

The Broncos took 20 plays to drive 98 yards of a touchdown. James contributed two first downs on this drive. The first was on a sweep that moved the chains and, just as importantly, got the offense some breathing room. His next first down came the hard way. He was the victim of a horse collar tackle, and the penalty gave the Broncos a first down. Sanmiguel contributed 55 yards on three receptions. Cordell had an 18-yard scramble. Jackson got the touchdown on a pass from Cordell. Boerne 48 - Sonora 38. 2:35 left in the game.

The Greyhound quarterback scored the last touchdown on a 28 yard run on the read option. Final Boerne 55 - Sonora 38.

Solis completed 1 of 4 for 36 yards. Cordell had 20 completions on 33 passes. Two went for touchdowns.

Solis led all rushers with 54 yards on 10 carries and one touchdown. Jackson gained 36 yards on 10 carries with one rushing touchdown.

Sanmiguel led the receivers with 109 yards and one touchdown on six catches. Jackson caught eight passes for 47 yards and one receiving touchdown.

Kordell led all tacklers with 14 tackles with 10 being solo. Michael Mungia and James tied for second with seven tackles each.

The 7th and 8th grade (Red team) Colts both lost their games to the Boerne Pups on Wednesday, 42-0 and 50-24.

The 8th grade White team lost to the Junction 8th grade 26-14. On Friday, the 9th grade Broncos' team lost its first game of the season 20-13 to the visiting Boerne Freshmen team. The Bronco JV (sophomores) lost 48-0 to the Boerne Greyhound JV.

This week the Varsity has a BYE. District play starts October 9th at home against the Grape Creek Eagles (2-3).

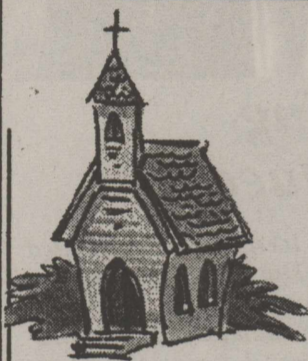

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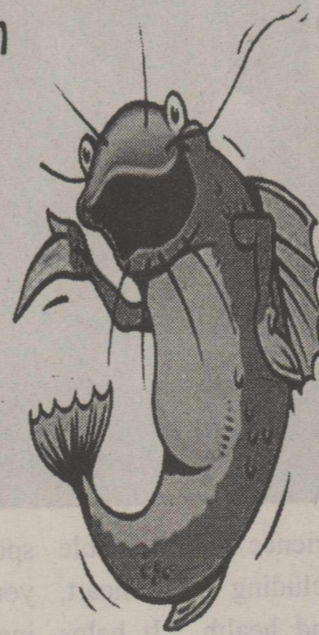

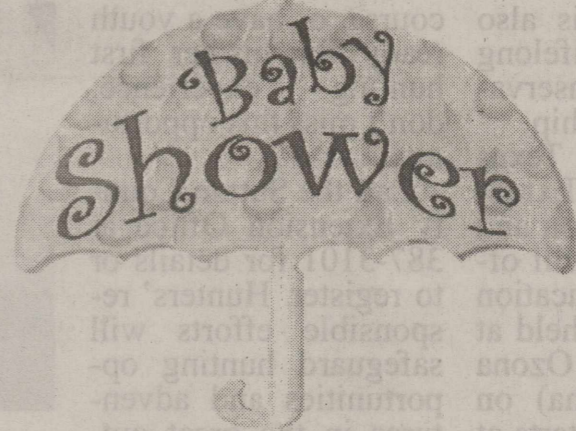
## Lions Roar

September 28, 15

The Sonora Downtown Lions Club met at noon on Tuesday. There were no students in attendance this week. Our guest speaker was Jimalee Dutton, with the Bronco Booster Club. Mrs. Dutton reported that the run-through for the football teams had finally worn out after seven years of service. She stated that the run-through had been used for the Special Olympics, and many other events, as well as all the varsity football games. She stated that a new run-through was approved for purchase at the club's September 20th meeting. The final cost, with rushing the order

and shipping, is \$14,995. She stated that the money raised by their program/poster fund-raiser goes to support all sports and the sports banquet; therefore, the money for the new run-through will be raised separately. As of the beginning of the Lions Club meeting the booster club had already raised \$7,950, but she walked away from the meeting with over \$1,000 in checks or pledges to be added to that amount. The expected delivery date is October 12th, but Mrs. Dutton is working to try to get it here by the October 9th game. She stated that the new run-through will be four feet taller, ten feet longer, and eight feet wider than the previous one. She stated that the old run-through was beyond repair and that she will be cutting the sides, with the five stars representing state championships, and framing one side for the high school and will give the other side to the Miers Museum. She also stated that she will cut the #1 from the back of his jersey and frame it, to be auctioned off at the Lions Club Annual Auction on October 20th. And speaking of the Auction, we will be posting a list of the items already donated for the auction in the October 15th edition of the Devils River News, so keep an eye out for it.

## Hunter Certification Course To Be Offered October 17th

Deer season is just around the corner. Hunters await anxiously. But before going to deer camp, there are a couple of things to keep in mind- safety and the law.

Every hunter born on or after September 2, 1971 must successfully complete a Hunter Education Training Course. Hunter education not only teaches hunting safety, skills and responsibility, but is also the first step in a lifelong commitment to conservation and sportsmanship.

To that end, The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service in Sutton and Crockett Counties will offer a Hunter Education Course. It will be held at 1301 Avene AA in Ozona (by the rodeo arena) on October 17th, and starts at 8:00 a.m. The cost is \$25 and includes course mate-

rials, certification, and lunch.

The course is open to anyone. However the minimum age of certification is 9 years of age, and those under 16 must be accompanied by an adult.

If you want to learn about firearm and hunter safety, need to take a hunter certification course, or have a youth ready for his/her first hunting experience, don't miss this opportunity.

## Youth Leadership Program to Expand To Include Coastal & Marine Resources

San Antonio, TX – The population of Texas is expected to grow to 30 million by 2020 with over 60% of the population located within 100 miles of the coast. The coast is an important part of the state as Texas has 367 miles of ocean front coastline, 3327 miles of coastal bay shoreline and 350 miles of barrier islands. Texans depend on coastal areas for recreation, seafood and wildlife habitat.

In the summer of 2016, the 1st Battalion of the Coastal Brigade will be held at Sea Scout Base Camp Galveston. The camp will be held the last week in July. Those interested in attending must submit an application by March 15, 2016. It is a competitive application process and only 30 youth will be selected to participate.

Texas Brigades' mission is to educate and empower youths with leadership skills and knowledge in wildlife, fisher-

ies, and land stewardship to become conservation ambassadors for a sustained natural resource legacy. There will be eight camps to choose from in 2016: Buckskin Brigade (2 sessions), Bobwhite Brigade (2 sessions), Bass Brigade, Waterfowl Brigade, Ranch Brigade and the new Coastal Brigade. This is a co-ed

camp for youth ages 13-17.

"We are excited to bring Texas Brigades to the coast and look forward to giving youth the opportunity to experience boating, saltwater fish, habitat management, coastal marshes and more through hands-on activities led by premier biologists and researchers in the state." Said Charriss York,

camp co-coordinator and program specialist with the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service and Texas Sea Grant. "This camp is a unique opportunity for Texas youth, any youth interested in the outdoors should consider attending."

## Notice of Tax Revenue Increase

The Sutton County conducted public hearings on September 3, 2015 and September 14, 2015 on a proposal to increase the total tax revenues of the Sutton County from properties on the tax roll in the preceding year by 2.000112 percent.

The total tax revenue raised last year at last year's tax rate of 0.529804 for each \$100 of taxable value was \$3,319,639.06.

The total tax revenue proposed to be raised this year at the proposed tax rate of 0.565355 for each \$100 of taxable value, excluding tax revenue to be raised from new property added to the tax roll this year, is \$3,382,090.92.

The total tax revenue proposed to be raised this year at the proposed tax rate of 0.565355 for each \$100 of taxable value, including tax revenue to be raised from new property added to the tax roll this year, is \$3,411,229.04.

The Sutton County Commissioners' Court is scheduled to vote on the tax rate that will result in that tax increase at a public meeting to be held on September 28, 2015 at Sutton County Annex Meeting Room, 300 East Oak St, Sonora, TX - Texas 76950 at 9:00 AM
