## Broncos Win District

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Veterans

For the second week in a row, the Broncos went three and out and were forced to punt on their opening series. But... like last week, the Bronco offense scored touchdowns on every possession until it was time for next year's varsity to get some reps.

The Owls ran eight plays after the previously mentioned punt before turning the ball over on downs to Sonora. The Broncos scored their first touchdown after Kevin Martinez broke through the Owl line for a 56-yard run to a first and goal. It took three plays, but K Mart got the touchdown by following the Bronco offensive line as they pushed the pile into the end zone and K Mart followed. After a motion penalty, Octavio Mendez tried a longer PAT that was unsuccessful. The Broncos led 6 to 0 with 3:13 left in the third quarter.

The Broncos caught a good break on the kickoff. The football bounced wildly towards the Owl returner. The football went past the returner and he turned to chase after the football. Wesley Dutton, Abel Cruz, and Drew Buitron pursued the returner and the bouncing ball until it went out of the back of the end zone for a safety. The Broncos had an eight-point lead, and the Owls kicked off from their 20-yard line.

On third down from the Owls' 49-yard line, Kaden Cordell dropped back to pass. He waited until a speeding Carter Zook came open. A perfectly thrown pass resulted in to 49-yard touchdown reception for Zook. Mendez made his kick resulting in a 15 to 0 score with 2:10 left in the opening quarter.

The Bronco defense made DC Coach Cordell proud as they forced a three and out. After two incompletions, Cordell threw an outlet pass to Martinez who gained 19 yards for a first down. After losing some yards due to an offensive pass interference penalty, Michael Solis caught a Cordell pass for a first down at the Owls' 49-yard line. Cordell took the snap and threw his second 49-yard touchdown pass to Luke James. James

caught the ball at the 23-yard line and ducked under an Owl tackler. Then he made a sharp cut to his left to avoid another tackler before swerving back to the right and into the end zone. Mendez made his kick, and the Broncos led 22 to 0 with 9:10 left in the first half.

After five Reagan County plays, Jose Hernandez recovered a fumble, and the Bronco offense was on the field again. Noah San Miguel caught a pass and ran to the Owls' 24-yard line. Cordell took the snap and looked the field over for a receiver. He found James in the center of the end zone for his third touchdown pass. Mendez kicked true, and the scoreboard showed that Sonora was ahead 29 to 0 with 5:19 left in the half. There was no more scoring in the first half.

The Owls opened the second half with a long drive, and their quarterback scored a touchdown on a sneak. Our defense stuffed their two point running attempt. Broncos 29 - Owls 6 at 7:40 in the third.

The Owls executed a perfect onside kickoff and recovered right at midfield. After three plays failed to get a first down, they tried a fake punt. The Owls snapped the ball to a blocking back. Hernandez stormed in and forced the runner to turn up field where Rafael Mendoza and his buddies finished him off short of the first down.

San Miguel gained 37 yards on the shovel pass from Cordell. When it appeared that the Owls might finally get some pressure on Cordell, Cordell scrambled just a bit and, while in the grasp of an Owl, threw his fourth touchdown pass to Solis from 16 yards out. Mendez kicked the point after, and the Broncos led 36 to 6 with 5:36 left in the third.

The Owls responded with their best drive of the game. They had impressive runs on the counter play and the wrap around draw. The Owls scored on a pass play from 11 yards out. Going for two, they snapped the ball to the holder who lateraled to a back. When he was about to be sacked, he tried a despera-

tion pass. Bryndon Robles intercepted and started his sprint for the end zone. But he didn't get very far before he was tackled. Broncos 36 - Owls 12 with 0:23 left in the third.

On the first play of the fourth quarter, Cordell hit Solis for a 40-yard touchdown, but it was called back by a Bronco penalty. The Broncos were persistent. Cordell completed passes to James, two to SanMiguel, and two to Creek. The second pass to Creek was Cordell's fifth touchdown pass of the game. After a rare miss by Mendez, the final score was posted at 42 to 12 with 7:19 left in the game.

Next year's Broncos played the rest of the game. Dutton entered the game as quarterback. He started a drive on the Broncos' 12-yard line that lasted ten plays. During the drive, Dutton completed all three of his passes. Dutton had a 17-yard run. Freshman Brandon Martinez had two long runs. Buitron had a nice run and was hit out of bounds for 15 more yards on the Owl penalty. Coach Sine called off the dogs, and Dutton got to practice taking a knee from the victory formation.

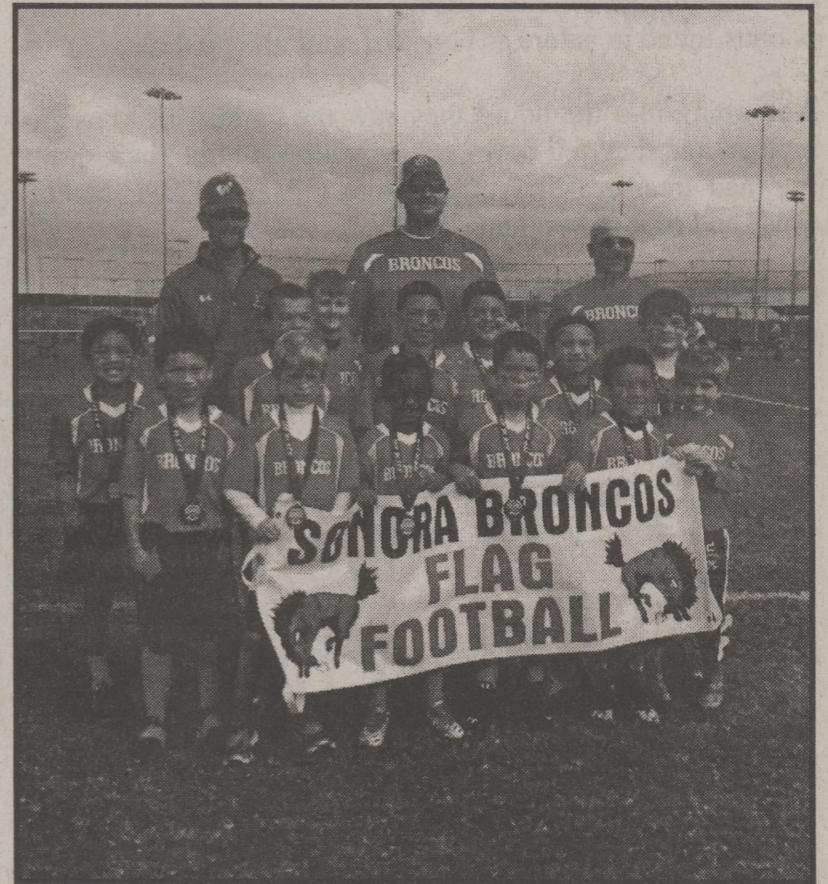
Prior to this drive, the Owl quarterback had thrown a sideline pass. Coach Sine had a clear shot at an interception, but Zook left the field of play and batted it out Sine's hands. Extra sprints for Zook this week.

Last week, Coach Sine wanted me to see if anyone had ever thrown five touchdown passes in a game. Even though, I haven't had time to research his question, I am certain that no one has ever thrown five touchdown passes in consecutive games! Cordell completed 20 of 28 passes for 325 yards and five touchdowns.

The Broncos rushed 16 times for 103 yards. K Mart led all rushers with 59 yards on five carries and one touchdown.

San Miguel caught five passes for 100 yards, and James snagged six for 92 yards and two touchdowns. Creek, So

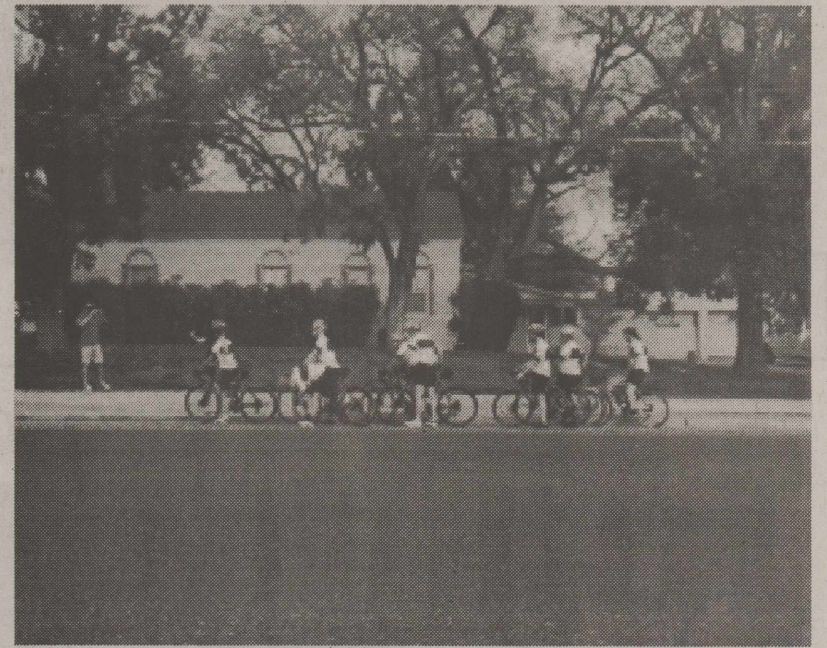



## Should I have Winterized The Landscape?

We've probably all heard about "lawn winterization". It simply means fertilizing with nitrogen sometime during late September to late October. A few weeks ago I wrote about fall fertility, so let's elaborate on that, from the concept of winterizing.

Research has validated the importance of fertilizing perennial plants 4-6 weeks prior to winter freeze. Because of the cool temperatures, short days, and high light intensity, nitrogen fertilizer applied at this time helps the photosynthetic production of carbohydrates. These carbohy-

drates are stored for use the following growing season, providing earlier spring green-up and an energy source for turf grasses to recuperate from winter.

The benefits of fall fertilizing include a healthier turf before winter, a healthier root system, and stimulating a turf that greens up earlier in the spring without excessive top growth.

Stated differently, fertilizing when top growth is minimal but when soil temperatures are still warm enough for nitrogen absorption, allows plants to resume growth and green-up early the following spring without the

excessive shoot growth associated with early spring nitrogen applications. That means dense, green spring lawns without the mowing chores that come with spring fertilization.

Just keep in mind that for warm season grasses, winterizing should be completed before November (when killing frost normally occurs). Select a fertilizer with low phosphorus such as 16-4-8, 21-7-14 or similar analysis.

So, should trees be winterized?

The short answer is "yes". The benefits of fall fertilization for trees and shrubs have also been confirmed by researchers. But it should be done about a month after the first killing frost. The explanation is lengthy, so we'll leave that for another article.

One last comment on fertilizing. Be careful to read label directions closely if weed and feed fertilizers are used. Some may damage trees and shrubs when roots are near the treated area.

## Range and Pasture Workshop set for Dec. 3 in Eldorado

ELDORADO – The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service will conduct a multi-county Range and Pasture Workshop Dec. 3 in the Eldorado Civic Center.

The center is a mile south of Eldorado on U.S. Highway 277. Registration starts at 8:30 a.m. followed by the program from 9 a.m. until 1:30 p.m.

"So far, this is shaping up to be a great winter from a moisture standpoint," said Tait Cooper, AgriLife Extension agent in Schleicher County. "Many pastures have a lot of standing forage, so prescribed fire may be a viable option for many landowners, and that option will be one we cover during this workshop. We'll also look at herbicides, winter feeding and parasite control."

Individual registration is \$15 before Nov. 27, and \$25 thereafter. The fee includes lunch. For more information and to RSVP, call the AgriLife Extension office in Schleicher County at 325-853-2132.

The workshop is a collaborative effort among the AgriLife Extension offices in Schleicher, Sutton, Edwards, Irion and Crockett counties.

Topics and speakers will include:

- Grain updates and winter feed cost outlook, Dr. David Drake, AgriLife Extension agronomist, San Angelo.
- Brush control and herbicide update, Dr. Bob Lyons, AgriLife Extension range specialist, Uvalde.
- Pesticide laws and regulations, Cory Pence, Texas Department of Agriculture, San Angelo.
- Patch burning applications, Dr. Charles "Butch" Taylor, superintendent of the Texas A&M AgriLife Research Station at Sonora.
- Do-it-yourself fecal parasite sampling, Dr. Reid Redden, state sheep and goat specialist, San Angelo.
