

Ports-to-Plains Moving a Growing Portion of U.S./Canada Trade

Canada is the No. 1 export market for U.S. goods. In 2014 the U.S. exported over \$19 billion in goods by truck to the entirety of Canada. The Ports-to-Plains Alliance Corridor connects Alberta and Saskatchewan, Canada with Montana and North Dakota. While there are fourteen (14) border crossings from Portal, ND to the east and Sweetgrass, MT to the west, there are four commercial crossings including Portal, ND/ North Portal, SK; Raymond, MT/Regway, SK; Wild Horse show appreciation to these giving so much to our com- MT/AB and Sweetgrass MT/Coutts, AB which are used to track trade using the Ports-to-Plains Alliance Corridor. These four crossings will be referred to as the PTP crossings. The data summarized below all address movement by truck.

> The PTP crossings accounted for over \$6 billion in exports from the nine states in the Ports-to-Plains Alliance region. Since 2004, the exports through the PTP crossings have increased by 184.3% or almost \$4 billion. This increase outpaces the 65.5% increase in all U.S. exports to Canada. This represents 31.6% of all U.S. exports to Canada in 2014. So in terms of the market share of total exports from the U.S. to Canada, the PTP crossings have gained 13.2% of the market

> In what is certainly a positive trade balance, the U.S. imported over \$13 billion in goods from all of Canada in 2014. The PTP crossing processed over \$3.8 billion or 29% of those imports. Again, the PTP crossings accounted for an increase of almost 132% or almost \$2.2 billion since 2004. As with exports, U.S. imports from Canada, using the PTP crossings gained an additional market share of 10.4% since 2014. The strength of export and import market shares demonstrate the strength of economies in both the nine-state Ports-to-Plains region and Alberta and Saskatchewan in Canada.

> The U.S. /Canada trade relationship cannot be discussed without including the impact of the Alberta Oil Sands to the nine-state Ports-to-Plains region. Canada is the largest supplier of oil to the U.S. For every two jobs created in Canada from the oil sands, a third job is created in the U.S. New oil sands development is projected to generate \$521 billion in economic activity in the U.S. over the next 25 years. The Alberta Oil Sands will contribute over \$901 million in terms of GDP to the Ports-to-Plains Alliance region, 15.5% of the entire U.S.

> In the FAST Act recently passed by Congress, freight program funds are available to state designated Critical Rural Freight Corridors (CRFC). The Act allows each state to identify up to 150 miles of CRFC which includes principal arterial roadways or facilities; access or service to energy exploration, development, installation, or production areas; provides access or service to— agriculture facilities or connects to an international port of entry. The Ports-to-Plains Alliance Corridors certainly fulfill those criteria.





Obituary



Dr. Alvis Francis Johnson was born in Sonora, TX, on October 5, 1917 and passed away peacefully on November 27, 2015 in Dallas, TX. He was born to Alvis Johnson and Thelma Fields Johnson on the Fields family ranch in Sonora, Sutton County, TX. He learned ranching at an early age and spent his childhood roaming the ranch on horseback. Following graduation from Sonora High School, he attended the University of Texas at Austin and earned a bachelor of arts. He attended medical school at the University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston and completed his MD in 1946. As an intern in Cleveland, OH, he met a student nurse, Patricia Craig, and they returned to Texas and were married on January 31, 1948.

Following his internship, Alvis accepted a pediatric residency at The Children's Hospital of Texas, now known as Children's Medical Center, in 1947. After several years practicing as a pediatrician, Alvis transitioned to specialty care and became the first pediatric cardiology fellow at the UT Southwestern Medical Center in 1952. When he finished his fellowship, pediatric cardiology was a new field with only about 12 other pediatric cardiologists nationwide. He remained in Dallas at Children's Medical Center and the Department of Pediatrics at UT Southwestern Medical School, where he rose to the rank of Associate Professor. In addition to teaching to residents and medical students and managing his pediatric cardiology practice, Alvis served as the medical director of Freeman Clinic, the only clinic for indigent children in Dallas, for eleven years.

Alvis and Patricia had five children and he loved spending time with them at the North Shore Club on Lake Grapevine. Alvis had a love for boats, slalom water skiing and spending time on the water. He bought his first boat in 1957 and had lake houses on Lake Grapevine, Lake Amistad and Lake LBJ at different times in his life. Spending time with friends and family and having large barbeque cookouts on the lake were some of his most favorite times.

Alvis retired from teaching and practicing pediatric cardiology in September of 1983 having served at Children's Medical Center for 32 years. Alvis and Patricia moved to Sonora where he returned to his roots and the land he loved, raising cattle and Angora goats for seventeen years. Alvis served as the Board President for the Lillian M. Hudspeth Memorial Hospital for fourteen years. He was instrumental in the creation of the Sutton County Hospital District and the Sutton County Health Foundation to establish a firm financial structure to ensure the future operation of the hospital to serve the residents of Sutton County. His work on the hospital earned him the Citizen of the Year Award from the Sonora Chamber of Commerce in 1998. Also while in Sonora, Alvis was a founding board member of Friends of Big Bend (now Big Bend Conservancy). After retiring again in 2003, they moved to Granite Shoals, TX to be near their lake house on Lake LBJ. In 2012, they relocated, once again, to Presbyterian Village North in Dallas, TX where they enjoyed socializing with their many friends.

Alvis' life consisted of many roles: physician, husband, father, grandfather, rancher, boat enthusiast and water skier, master rib cooker, expert hotcake and waffle chef, poker player, stock trader, and many other talents. He spent his 98 years living a full life and doing everything he did with determination and resolve. He loved the outdoors, tinkering in his shop, and was able to fix just about anything that was broken. Above all, Alvis was a teacher and he spent his life teaching all of us. For this, he will be greatly missed.

Alvis is survived by his wife of 67 years, Patricia Craig Johnson and five children: Beverly Johnson Smith and husband Tom of Coppell, Sarah Johnson of Dallas, Craig Johnson and wife Susan of Dallas, Becca Johnson Munsch and husband Joe of Heath, and Scott Johnson of Marble Falls; eight grandchildren: Thomas G. Smith III, MD and wife Christy of Bellaire, TX, Heather Smith Crane and husband Doug of McKinney, Liz Johnson of Dallas, Ben Johnson and wife Emily of Dallas, Hillary Munsch of Dallas, Austin Munsch of Dallas, Jordan Johnson of Marble Falls and Cage Johnson of Austin. Dan is also survived by his sister Nancy Groom Turner who remarried in July of 2015 and is survived by once niece and three nephews. Alvis is also survived by four great grandchildren: Thomas G. and Samuel Smith and Scarlett and Madeline Crane, and another on the way, Alexander Fields Johnson and first cousins, George Milton Hopkins, Mary Elizabeth Hopkins Hill, Betty Fields Smith, Francine Fields Hardeman, John David Fields, Jr. and Tryon Lewis Fields. He will also be missed by many other cousins, friends and colleagues.


