## City of Sonora's Water System Under the Nicroscope

San Antonio residents, Cynhia and Thomas Schiotis, are plied to their soon to be retirement home in Sonora, especially after receiving two letters reporting, "Routine Monitoring Viola ions Total Coliform Rule."
In an e-mail to the Devil' River News, they expressed their concerns about the city's water testing methods and the health risks associated with contaminated water
ity's water superintendent, addressed the violations last month with a standard form letter as required by the Texas Quality. The letter, sent to [most, but not all,, city water customer said, "The City of Sonora failed of bacteriological samples for coliform monitoring of the water distribution system." According to McElwain, water department staff routinely each month from five designate
collection sites throughout the city, including residential outTCEQ.
Additionally, the samples are ollected in special containers rovided by Pace Analytical an A new style flip-top lid, bottle as supplied by the lab prior to he first positive coliform readng in October 2015 . Mample bottles including the flip top lids are easily contaminated during the collection process. "If you touch anywhere n the lid, around the bottle opening or if the wind blows
something onto the lid, then the sample is contaminated." Sample collection is done by a process outlined by TCEQ. For example, a faucet is turned
on and allowed to run for three on and allowed to run for three
to five minutes. The spout is also treated with chlorine and torched before water is collected. Reports obtained by the DRN sample collected from an outdoor
faucet, in a residential neighbor hood, tested positive for coliform
but negative for E -coli. collected and the data reflected negative for coliform and E-coli. On December 22, 2015 another water sample tested posi
tive for coliform but negative for E -coli, Again, the three follow-up samples revealed negative. Both samples were collected using a new flip top collection
bottle recently provided by Pace bottle recently proviled
Other municipalities reported similar issues using the new style collection bottles, according to McElwain TCEQ requires five water
samples to be collected instead three and submitted for follow-up testing.

This failure resulted in two violations for not collecting the mar follow-up testing of samples McElwain said, in the event of water contamination, sites providing water to residents would immediately be shut down

The Total Coliform Rule, Protection Agency (EPA) in 1990 is a standard limit guideline for the presence of total coliform in drinking water public water system monitor for the presence of total coliform to protect customers from illness. Total coliforms include
bacteria found in soil, water contaminated by surface water
or wells and human or anima waste. These bacteria came
come from anywhere in the come from any w Fecal coliforms and E-coli are a specific group of bacteria that originate in the intestine of warm blooded animals and
introduced into water through fecal matter via contaminated wells or other sources, according to the New York State Department of Health.
McElwain and Public Works Director Peter Dura said no open wells or polluted pools exist near the city's six fresh water wells, which dra
from the Trinity Aquifer from the Trinity Aquifer.
As for Schiotis, she wou like to receive notification of the results from the supplemental testing to assure her that the water is free of con
taminants and safe to use Schiotis said it is important to protect the water. "People who have water supplies will be the rulers in the
future and those without it will be up a creek," Schiotis said.
