

In the sort of duet we have in mind here, the singers will both need to know both the melody and the harmony, and they'll need to be wise enough together to know when the time is right for which one to sing which part. And they'll need to know, most of all, that the really important thing is that they sing together and that uppermost in their minds is that the music of their duet is blended with and orchestrated by the Conductor to whom they both swear allegiance.

No doubt about it. Duets are more complicated than solos. But I think they also tend to be a lot more beautiful.

One of these singers is headed to Africa in a few weeks for a long stay. The other is working hard to complete a very demanding degree. I'm quite sure there will be some tears in their eyes that wouldn't have been there if this beautiful song hadn't been begun. Beauty and tears are no strangers. But I'm also sure that as they are committed to following the lead of the Conductor, some of the most beautiful music of their lives has already begun.





What if a superintendent was asked for suggestions?

Hypothetically, what if a enator representative asked a school superintendent for the school finance dilemma? Here is what one would say:

Dear Senator Representative,

I appreciate you asking for some suggested solutions to the school finance dilemma. I know this is very complicated, and just when a solution looks like it will do the job, a problem surfaces with it. Since you asked, I will offer some suggestions. Good luck as this heads toward a conclusion.

If there is "not" enough in a moment...

I know everyone is saying there isn't enough money for education. But there seems to be enough money to raise taxes for property tax relief. sometimes, if money is at a much lower tax rate. short, we have to go with our top priority.

ticket of reducing property reduction. But if the polls asked, "Do you want property tax relief at the expense of your school," I would guess most people would say no.

Let's put the money into schools first and work on property tax relief next session, instead of the other way around. That would show that education was our top priority. The state's own study showed schools need \$4 - \$5 billion a year in new money to meet the state and federal requirements. The courts have essentially said the same thing. Instead of trying to go reach that goal, the school community feels like the legislature is instead placing many "punitive" requirements and mandates on them without the funds to pay for them.

Of course, we all know the real answer to lowering property taxes and fully funding education, but no one is willing to say it out loud: A balance of a small property tax, a small sales tax, and a small income tax. Our constitution requires that if an income tax is voted on by the public, two-thirds has to go to buy down property tax and one third has to go to public education. No increase in

Former student shares history of Lazbuddie ISD

It was no more than a wide place in the road in 1925, when the first students enrolled at Lazbuddie school. They walked, rode in Model Ts, and occasionally horseback to school, and it was the beginning of a long, rich heritage that continues today.

While many small country schools have consolidated, or went to either elementary or high school grades only, Lazbuddie School, in the eastern part of Parmer County, will celebrate its 80th birthday on Aug. 6, with ex-students, teachers and friends gathering for a special all-school reunion.

The original "Old Red" school building was built in 1928, attended and the campus grew in 1948 with the addition of a new high school building, just north of Old Red. An elementary school was built on the south side of Old Red in 1956.

E.R. Haskins was the first superintendent, and served from 1929 to 1935. He was also the first boys' basketball coach. The first girls' coach was George Forman.

"There was a quonset barn out behind the school where services Sunday afternoon. they played basketball," recalled Barbara (Hinkson) Lust. "I remember sitting in my grade school classroom and looking out the window and seeing the quonset on fire. We formed a bucket brigade, but it burned down.'

Mrs. Lust, who authored a history of Lazbuddie school, which was later published in a Parmer County history book, said parents and teachers formed the first PTA in 1929, and the school participated in its first DIL contest in 1930.

"Home economics classes were started in 1931," she said, "and vo-ag in 1932. Also, in 1932, the school played go to the family and friends football for the first time.

The first graduation ceremony was in1931, and Lazbuddie became a fully accredited high school in 1934.

Old Red was torn down in 1965, to make room for a new cafeteria, offices and classrooms.The building joined together the high school and elementary building, which stands today.

Many faces have come and gone in 80 years. Many students and teachers are no longer with us. But for those who gather at the school on Saturday remember the second line in the school song: "May we ever be loyal and true."

And as they gather on the well-worn school grounds, they will be asking the age old question that has been asked by people for 80 years: "Where in the world did Lazbuddie get its name?"

Cotton Report

Cotton futures on the New York Board of Trade Tuesday dropped to the daily trading limit of 300 points lower in response to a surprisingly bearish supply and demand report from USDA before recovering on Thursday.

In the United States, the numbers were mostly in line with market expectations. U.S. production for 2005-06 was raised to 19.8 million bales in July from 19.5 million in June. Domestic use was left unchanged at 5.8 million bales while exports fell to 14.5 million bales from 15.0 million. USDA boosted ending stocks to 6.7 million bales from 6.2 million the previous month.

Meanwhile, a weakerthan-expected export sales report from USDA started Thursday's trading session on a bearish note. While shipments totaled 340,700 bales in the week ended July 7, up from 254,100 bales the previous week, most traders and analysts were looking for 400,000 or more given the fact there are only about three weeks left in the 2004-05 marketing year for exporters and mills to take advantage of the government's Step 2 program.

Usda to extend CRP contracts

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation has announced that farmers and ranchers with certain Conservation Reserve Program contracts expiring this year may extend their contracts for one year.

"Farmers choosing to extend their existing contracts will help to preserve CRP's environmental benefits." said CCC executive vice president James R. Little.

The extension option applies to CRP participants with contracts scheduled to expire on Sept. 30, 2005, and whose original contract with the extension will not exceed 15 years.

Local offices of USDA's Farm Service Agency will notify eligible CRP participants of their option to modify and extend their CRP contracts. The deadline to apply for this extension is Sept. 2, 2005.

The extension will not change participants' rental rates. All or a portion of the acreage under contract may be included in an extension, but no new acreage may be added. Obligations and responsibilities under the original contract continue to apply to contracts that are modified and extended.

USDA is not planning to offer a general CRP signup in fiscal year 2005. However, producers may continue to enroll relatively small, highly-desirable acreage in the continuous CRP at any time at their local FSA office.

Hanks was last seen running south in the area of the Methodist Church.

According to the sheriff, Hanks, who was incarcerated on a motion to revoke a previous sentence on a property crime, is from the Muleshoe and Bailey County area, and doesn't have a record of violent behavior.
