

# New Jersey casino opens

- As more than 1,000 dice-rollers and card-players waited eagerly to try their luck, the nation's only legal gambling casino outside Nevada opened for business today on the Boardwalk of this famous resort

New Jersey Gov. Brendan T. Byrne cut an orange ribbon to officially open the Resorts International Hotel Casino at 10. a.m. EDT. Then he and the crowds who had milled around the windowless cocktail lounge on a dreary gray morning moved into the gaming area with its shiny slot machines

plush betting tables. The casino reached its capacity of 5,000 persons a half hour after it opened.

"My father once advised me never to bet on anything, but Notre Dame and the Yankees." Byrne said. "For those of you who are unwilling to take my father's advice, this casino is now open.

Singer Steve Lawrence, the first entertainer at the hotel's large showroom that also opens

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) to the public today, went straight to the craps table "I'm \$50 down," he said after five minutes of betting. "But I'll get that back in no time.

Byrne himself went to the

craps table, where he blew on the dice used by Lawrence. I.G. "Jack" Davis, president of Resorts International Inc. stood to Lawrence's left and

smiled broadly as the entertainer cheerfully lost. You're not going to get this smile off my face for a long. long time," Davis said. "It was

The casino opens with 893 slot machines, 60 blackjack tables. 10 craps tables, 10 roulette wheels, three baccarat tables and three wheels of fortune. Already about half the size of a football field, the casino is to expand soon into one of the

largest in the world. "I wanted to be in the swing of things," said Lee Kalman, who rode the bus from Philadelphia. She said her father used to manage an illegal casino at the 500 Club here years

ago. "It's so sentimental to be here." she said

The last raodblock was removed when the New Jersey Casino Control Commission voted late Thursday night to grant a certificate of operation to Resorts

The Florida-based conglomerate, which owns two hotels and operates two casinos in the Bahamas, has spent \$40 million to renovate the former Chalfonte-Haddon Hall Hotel.

"Atlantic City can be revived as the Queen of Resorts, Byrne proclaimed as he announced the commission's unanimous vote to about 2,000 people at the premiere of the hotel's Las Vegas-style show.

In five nights of test runs last week, thousands of excited sightseers jammed the casino. They carelessly bet \$100 bills in play money on the tables and real nickels, quarters and dollar coins in the slot machines. which could not accept slugs.

This once-fashionable seashore resort - home of the Miss America Pageant and the Monopoly game - is betting on casinos to pull it out of 25 years of decline that has left it with bankrupt Boardwalk hotels. burned-out neighborhoods and winter unemployment topping

20 percent In 1974, city leaders failed to persuade New Jersey voters to go along with a provision that would have allowed casino gambling anywhere in the state. But they came back in 1976 with \$1.3 million campaign for a revised proposal that limited gambling to Atlantic City and won overwhelming voter

Resorts International's casino is expected to gross more than \$100 million in its first year, with 8 percent going to the state for senior citizens and the disabled

Several other developers, including Playboy, Penthouse and Caesars Palace, are waiting to see how Resorts Internations does before building their ow casino hotels on the Boardwalk

# Bailing out 'Fun City'

federal "loans" to New York City will end June 30. By then the government will have lent \$2.3 billion in all. Seasonal financing is what this was originally called — based on the idea that the city had only a temporary cash flow problem.

But New York City officials again have been banging on the U.S. Treasury door, asking for federal guarantees of long term bonds they would like to sell. This exposes the seasonal financing scheme as pure pretense; New York has had much more than a cash flow problem all along.

The immediate problem is the need for credit, which gross mismanagement has forfeited. The city is simply not credit worthy. The budget deficit is at least \$1 billion and even larger budget deficits are in the offing. New York's budget remains in this perpetually red condition because city politicians simply

decisions, like being tough about unreasonable wage demands and paring down municipal spending. These root causes are plain to

see, yet the Carter administration proposes that American taxpayers guarantee some \$2 billion in New York bonds. And who does Washington suggest as the lucky purchasers of these bonds? The city's employees, through their pension funds. But the employees aren't fools; already they've announced they're not buying.

The very idea of the federal government guaranteeing city bonds is a silly subterfuge to have Washington bail out a bankrupt municipality. Treasury Secretary Michael Blumenthal, the architect of the administration's proposal, might as well propose an outright grant of \$2 billion to the

officials have been engaging in a little sly blackmail, warning the nation that if the city government is permitted to go under, it will drag down some important U.S. financial institutions in a national chain reaction of disastrous

In reality, it is the other way around. The more likely way to hard times for the nation is through a federal bail - out of New York City. This will open a door that cannot be closed. Other mismanaged cities, any number of which have vast pension fund problems, will get the message. They will cease to worry about the consequences of their politically motivated excesses. They can assume they, too, can successfully beg in Washington.

# Implications of corporate free speech

opinion may be tolerated where reason is left free to combat it."

Those words from Thomas Jefferson's First Inaugural Address are still the definitive statement about freedom of speech, as the Supreme Court reaffirmed on April 26.

The case was The First National Bank of Boston et al. v. Bellotti. The National Chamber Litigation Center participated as a friend of the court, in support of First National Bank.

In its decision, the Court sruck down a Massachusetts law which prohibited corporations from trying to influence voters on any issue "other than one

WASHINGTON - "Error of materially affecting ... the corporation.

Writing for the majority, Justice Powell said, "The proper question ... is not whether corporations 'have' First, Amendment rights ... Instead, the question must be whether the Massachusetts statute abridges expression that the First Amendment was meant to protect. We hold that it

In other words, it is the speech that matters, not the speaker. This position is the only one consistent with political democracy. If there cannot be free competition in the marketplace for ideas, then a society is in reality controlled by

"acceptable" idea. Voters cannot choose among alternatives that are never presented to them.

Surprisingly, the Court's decision has been criticized by some pillars of the liberal community, whose fear of business (other than their own) is evidently greater than their devotion to freedom of expression. Corporate wealth can buy public opinion, they charge.

Taking that view seriously requires both a monumental contempt for the intelligence of the American people and a gross misunderstanding of the

Even if America's corporations were free to expend all of their resources in support of a unified stance on public issues, all they could do is add to the information available to the voter, not subtract from it.

But the two conditions above are impossible conditions. First and most obviously corporations often disagree among themselves about the proper approach to public problems. Such disagrement would be reflected in most issue advertising undertaken by the business community. And second, the vast majority of corporate funs are committed to

There are, however, some other interesting implications of the Court's decision:

1. Regulation of lobbying. Statutes intended to regulate business lobbying are now suspect and subject to challenge if they abridge First Amendment rights of speech. association or petition.

2. Tax implications. Current Internal Revenue Serivice regulations impose a tax "penalty" on certain forms of corporate and trade association communications. It can now be argued that these rules have a "chilling effect" on the exercise of free speech.

3. Independent political advertising. If the Bellotti decision is read broadly, it can be interpreted to permit independent expenditures by corporations to advocate the support or defeat of candidates for public office.

Let me emphasize that these last three points are not settled. They will have to be thrashed out in the courts before a corporation may safely ignore present restrictions on the activities listed.

It will be years before the last of the fallout from the Bellotti case reaches the earth. But the decision clearly strengthens the American tradition of extending freedom and encouraging debate. Mr. Jefferson would

I am reminded of this as I -ponder the forthcoming graduation ceremonies at the University of the South, in which I have personal interest.

Let me tell you something about the University, or Sewanee as it is called, for the story of this institution is an intersting chapter in the history of American higher education.

Like so many American colleges founded in the mid-19th century, Sewanee was built in a near wilderness - on a mountaintop. Its earliest foundations were destroyed in the Civil War. The University was revived in the late 1860s through the generosity of British

Over more than a century, the University has remained small in size and dedicated to high academic standards. Its buildings are neo-Gothic in

design; its president is titled Vice Chancellor, in the Oxford fashion, and the ablest students wear academic gowns another Oxford touch. The institution has gained and maintained an eviable reputation for supplying its region with educated citizens in a variety of occupations. Bishop Gailor, who saved Sewanee for extinction in the early decades of this century, described its mission as one of transmitting

Younger members of the faculty might not describe the University's current mission in those terms, but the traditional goal and outlook continues to have meaning for many of the graduates. It's a worthy mission in an age that's increasingly alienated from the historic values of the Western world.

Anglo-Saxon civilization.

Transmitting these values depends on the scholars constitute a university. At Sewanee, I had the privilege in recent years, as a visitor to become friends with two splendid, inspirational scholars.

When a dependent's income tops \$750

(Fifth in a series of seven columns)

You may provide more than half the support of a parent, but still miss out on a dependency deduction because your dependent's gross income from various sources is \$750 or more a year. And as a general rule, that eliminates our dependent as a tax deduction.

But does it? Income counts for the gross income test only if it's taxable. And Social Security payments are tax - free, thus are disregarded for the gross income test.

Q. What about interest and dividends? Let's say your father's income is from stocks paying \$825 in dividends. The \$100 dividend exclusion cuts your father's taxable income to \$725, so he passes the test. But the exclusion isn't enough if, say, the dividends add up to \$900 or \$1,000.

TAX MOVE NO. 1: So now, when there's plenty of time before yearend, consider registering your mother as joint owner of some or all of the stock. Result: your father's share of the joint dividend income will be reduced below \$750.

Q. Still not enough? Say your father's investments throw off \$2,000 of dividends and interest. Then, suggests Prentice-Hall:

TAX MOVE NO. 2: Have him switch into investments that pay tax-free income - tax-free municipals in the many forms in which they are now available. Do it right and your father's dollar income will remain the same while you win a dependency deduction.

Q. What if your parents have a substantial sum of cash in municipal and want to keep this nestegg because having it available gives them a valuable sense of security? The \$750 test is no problem - but there still is the requirement that you provide more than one - half their support.

TAX MOVE NO. 3: You still

A revealing decision by the Tax Court recently approved deductions for a son who supported his parents, despite the fact that the parents had

more than \$60,000 in the bank. Both of Mr. Jewell's parents were ailing and lived in a rest home. Although the parents had \$60,000 in joing bank accounts, Jewell was concerned that funds would not last his parents' lifetime. Medicare picked up only a nominal amount of the medical expenses. Jewell paid nearly all of them, amounting to more than half the parents' support. So he claimed a deduction for the medical expenses and took a dependency deduction for his mother. The IRS agreed that her gross income was less than \$750. (His father's taxable income exceeded \$750.)

The IRS denied Jewell's deductions. His parents had deposited funds in the bank topping one - half their support in that year. His father had included Jewell's name on the joint bank account when he opened the account years before this was done, so the money would go to Jewell without probate. Thus, the IRS argued, Jewell was being reimbursed for the medical expenses he paid by the funds available in the joint account.

The Tax Court held that Jewell's deductions were valid. It didn't matter that Jewell's parents had enough to support themselves. The Court looked only at the fact that Jewell provided over one - half his parents' support.

Also under the laws in Jewell's state, he had no current right to any of the money in his parents' account, despite the fact that his name appeared on the account.

Caution: Check your state's laws to find out whether or not you can use funds deposited by your parents in a joint account with you. In effect, you would be reimbursed for your expenses and would not be providing for your parents' support.

WHAT TO DO NOW: Discuss with your parents how their accounts are set up. Find out whether Jewell's approach would work in your family situation. Make sure your parents deposit their funds in a ioint account that gives you no right to the money until your parents are deceased.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Recalling more examples of bizarre behavior exhibited by those under the influence of "Angel Dust," Sen. Lloyd Bensten continues to preach the virtues of a bill that would increase the maximum penalty for trafficking in the devilish

The Texas Democrat quoted from an unpublished report by a Washington doctor that stated PCP - angel dust - "presently remains the major drug of abuse in the Washington metropolitan area."

Bentsen's comments came during a Thursday speech as he tried to rally Senate support for a bill that would increase the maximum penalty for trafficking in PCP from five years in prison and a \$15,000 fine for first offenders to 10 years and a \$100 000 fine

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

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WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter is going public with his campaign to stem what he considers a dangerous congressional trend toward interfering with presidential conduct of U.S. foreign policy.

Carter, who has frequently expressed his frustration in private meetings with members of Congress, used a nationally broadcast news conference on Thursday to complain that he "can't compete at all, even peacefully," with Soviet and Cuban adventurism in Africa.

"There's a trend in Congress that is building up that puts too sistance to factions fighting in much restraint on a president to deal with rapidly changing circumstances," he told reporters in Chicago.

In his remarks, Carter seemed more determined to draw a line against further restrictions than to repeal those already on the books.

The president also was careful to emphasize that he has "no intention of getting involved in Angola" or of sending U.S. troops into Africa.

His complaint concerned use of peaceful forms of economic and humanitarian aid to combat Soviet-Cuban involvement.

Meanwhile, a senior U.S. official told reporters traveling with Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance in New York that the administration has dismissed any notion of intervening in Angola to back pro-Western guerrillas fighting the Marxist government

What the administration would like to have, this official said, is a contingency fund from which it could make special, spur-of-the-moment grants to friendly African govern-

ments needing help for a particular economic project.

Carter said he has asked Vance, in cooperation with congressional leaders, to review existing restrictions on presidential action. Until that is completed, Carter said, "I am not going to advocate any change in existing law." But, he added, "I will oppose

further restrictions." Carter made a point of saying he has "no present intention" of seeking repeal of the Clark amendment, which bars direct or indirect U.S. as-

But, said Clark, "I'm confident the president did not originate the plans and did not have any intention of carrying them out.

Clark was referring to a plan, presented to him earlier this month by Stansfield Turner, director of the Central Intelligence Agency, and David Aaron, deputy White House national security adviser, that would involve funneling U.S. arms through a third party to pro-Western guerrillas in Ango-

Clark opposed the idea. The White House said on Wednesday that although administration officials are considering sending U.S. aid to Angola guerrillas, the president had not decided whether to seek re-

## Zaire president clears civilians from zone

PARIS (AP) - President Mobutu Sese Seko of Zaire has ordered his troops to clear civilians from a 65-mile stretch of Shaba Province and create a free-fire zone to block further infiltration of rebels from bases in Angola

After Thursday's announce ment by the French Defense Ministry that it was withdrawing Foreign Legion troops from southern Zaire. Mobutu told a news conference he was evacuating the area along Zaire's border with Zambia and Angola and ordering his forces to "shoot at anything that moves within the area.

The Defense Ministry said all of the 600 paratroopers dropped into the copper-mining city of Kolwezi last week had begun their withdrawal to the provincial capital of Lubumbashi prior to their return to France.

The announcement said the legionnaires had "accomplished their mission" of rescuing white expatriates trapped in the city by the May 12 invasion of Katangan exiles who crossed into Zaire from Angola through northern Zambia. Zairian troops, aided by a contingent of 100 Moroccans will take over responsibility for security in the area, the ministry said.

Mobutu, in Paris to discuss defense measures for Zaire, said at the news conference he was not informed in advance of the French withdrawal but he avoided criticism of French President Valery Giscard d'Estaing

"Giscard d'Estaing is the European chief of state who best understands the problems of Africa," he said. "In the West's total abandonment (of Africa) to the Russians and Cubans, only France has shown a willingness to take up the challenge - but France does not have the means to do it alone."

The president did not say whether he had asked the French to remain in Zaire He agreed the French mission had been achieved as far as Kolwezi was concerned, but said "there is still the problem of some 60 white hostages taken away by the invaders for whom the search continues.'

# Dollar declines; oil nationl worry

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) -Prime Minister Jamshid Amouzegar says the world's major oil producing countries may be forced to find a substitute for the dollar to pay for oil if the value of the U.S. currency continues to decline.

Unless the United States takes steps to reduce its budget deficit, he said, "the dollar is not going to recover and oil producers might have to peg oil prices to the World Bank's Standard Drawing Rights," a kind of composite world currency created by the International Monetay Fund.

Iran, the world's second largest oil-producer, is a member of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries. which decided earlier this month in Saudi Arabia to keep the dollar as the standard pricing currency.

In an interview with The Associated Press, Amouzegar said OPEC may begin raising oil prices annually beginning next year to encourage investment in alternative energy sources. "It is better that each year a

small percentage be added to the price of oil rather than freezing prices three or four years and then all of a sudden in the mid-1980s, we will have to double and triple the price again," Amouzegar said, noting that when OPEC quadrupled oil

prices in 1973 the impact on the world economy was disastrous. OPEC's base price now is \$12.70 for a 42-gallon barrel. Some OPEC countries have

suggested creating a new unit of payment for oil based on a combination or "basket" of currencies, but Amouzegar said "for the time being we maintain we should stick with the dollar because we believe the basic structure of the American economy is strong.' If the dollar continues to

weaken, however, OPEC "might be forced" to dump the dollar in favor of another pricing system, he said. It might be difficult for OPEC to agree on a currency basket because the producing nations have different trading partners, and each would back the currency that nost affected its imports.

The prime minister said Iran and other OPEC members have suffered because of the dollar's weakness but that changing to another currency system wouldn't necessarily solve the problem because the dollar would be one of the currencies in the "basket."

Saudi Arabia is the world's leading oil producer. Other OPEC members are Algeria, Iraq, Kuwait, Venezuela, Ecuador, Gabon, Indonesia, Libya, Algeria, Qatar, and the United Arab Emirates.

OTTAWA (AP) - By accident or design, Canadian aid to Cuba is being eliminated at a time when Prime Minister Pierre Elliott Trudeau's government is under heavy pressure to repudiate the Castro regime for its military activity in

Reports that Cubans may have helped train rebels involved in recent killings in Zaire have drawn protests from opposition critics. Some have demanded an end to Canadian-Cuban diplomatic relations.

Trudeau has made clear that he regards the presence of Cuban troops in Africa as "indefensible." But in the past, he has argued that Canada separates aid from other considerations in its dealing with Cuba and other countries in order to help the needy.

"It's not a comfortable policy," he told a news conference recently. "But it certainly is better than to just say you're going to help those who agree with you on everything in terms of values and institutions, because then you

Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB - I would like to know if estrogen causes a woman to grow hair on her face. Since I started taking it I feel better but I am growing hair on my face. I've asked two doctors; one said it would and one said it won't, so could you please let me know.

DEAR READER - The main estrogen hormones will not cause you to grow hair on your face. However, some of the medicines women take after the menopause, for a variety of reasons contain combinations of hormones, including some male hormones in some preparations.

Male hormone does increase the prominence of hair on the face. You may be surprised to know you have had the same amount of hair all along but the hair shafts become thicker, darker and hence more noticeable. The very fine hair you usually have may not be noticed.

You should know that women normally have increased prominence of hair on their face at the time of the menopause and thereafter. It may also be more prominent during the onset of puberty and during pregnancy. Your increased hair prominence may be from your menopause, not your

At the time the ovaries stop, the adrenal gland becomes the major source of sex hormones. Often it produces more male hormone than female hormone. The change in balance has a lot to do with many of the changes a woman notices after the menopause. The skin may change, hair changes on the scalp, the voice may change and hair may be more apparent on

the face. When doctors give female hormones they often give enough to limit symptoms such as hot flashes. There is still an increase production of male hormone in some women from the adrenal

gland and this will cause some of these changes.

DEAR DR. LAMB - Just what is neuralgia? Is it inflammation of the nerves? I have pain from the back of the neck to the left shoulder blade and around the left rib cage. My family doctor says it is neuralgia. My 87-yearold husband has rather severe pain in the back of the neck and it seems to radiate to the skull. Does not act like a headache. Could this be

neuralgia too? DEAR READER - Neuralgia means pain along the course of one or more nerves, usually in a periodic fashion. Since you have innumerable nerves you can have neuralgia almost any-

If a nerve between the ribs is involved the pain will be between the ribs and it is called intercostal neuralgia. If it involves the trigeminal nerve over the jaw area it is trigeminal neuralgia. Neuralgia is also classified as to its cause. If a diabetic has pain in a nerve because of changes associated with diabetes it might be called

diabetic neuralgia. Unless the disease causing the neuralgia is identified the term neuralgia is merely descriptive. You could have neuralgia because of changes in your spine, if the nerve roots in that area are under pressure. The same could be true of your husband if he has arthritic changes in the neck. Your doctor probably has a pretty good idea of what is causing your pain and what he can or cannot do for it.

Hollywood (NEA) - If you have any compassion at all, after an hour or so with Louise Lasser you find yourself wanting to reach out and touch her and say, "There, there. Everything will be all

She has the air of a putupon soul, of a little girl who has been told she has to go to bed without her supper. There is something, obviously, that keeps her from enjoying her success, some-thing deeply troubling that hovers around her continual-

And she admits it. "I am a tortured soul," she says, and you don't often find tortured souls any Some of that torture comes out in a television drama she wrote, which NBC grandly called, 'Louise Lasser's Just Me and You." They also called it "a zany human comedy," and it had some zane about it, but a lot of tortured soul,

In the recently telecast film, Louise Lasser played an unhappy lady who answered an ad for a driverrider and found herself driving cross-country with Charles Grodin, who played a very square salesman.

The format permitted Miss Lasser, in her first writing effort, to say a lot of things which, she confesses, are autobiographical. One example is this speech her character (Jane) had:

"I'd like to feel, uh ... less anxious ... all the time about what I'm gonna do this day or this night or this holiday or this Sunday. I don't wanna worry about that."

Louise Lasser says that anxiety is a big thing with her. That contributes to the torturing of her soul. She says she has always worried, been nervous, anxious. Even when there's nothing to be worried, nervous or anxious about.

At the moment, you would think she would be anxietyfree. After all, she is a major success, thanks to the 'Mary Hartman, Mary Hartman" hit. But that carried the seeds of more anxiety for her, despite its making her a major star.

The problem with "Mary Hartman" was that it was too tiring, too demanding, too all-consuming. She starred in 325 episodes of the soap-opera-for-adults. For her, doing those 325 shows with virtually no break was mind-boggling. Worse, it also boggled her body and helped boggle her emotions,

"I was exhausted," she says, "and I was beat. After it was over, I went to my apartment and I withdrew for five months."

It was, she says, a real withdrawal. She seldom went out. She seldom entertained. She sat and read and wrote and, for hours, did nothing.

"I'm still not sure I'm over it," she says. When she came out of the

apartment, she was a new person. Mary Hartman had gone in, with her braids and bangs. Louise Lasser came out, with a totally new hairstyle. The braids and bangs had been Louise's own style, at first, but it got to be so closely identified with Mary Hartman that she couldn't stand it.


Antique and old doll and baby quilts, a size especially desirable for use as wall hangings, are becoming difficult to locate, Mrs. Giles says.

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# Ford's advice: back off WASHINGTON (AP) - For terventionism in Africa. He

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former President Gerald R. Ford said Thursday that Congress should "back off" and give President Carter the flexibility to deal with foreign crises on his own authority.

Ford also said that if he were still in the White House, he might tell the Soviet Union that there will be no new strategic arms limitation agreement until the Russians and the Cubans stop meddling in Africa.

He said a president should be able to act swiftly, and without special congressional clearance, to deal with a situation like that in Angola. Administration officials have discussed posible U.S. aid to the guerrillas combating the Cubanbacked government in that African nation.

But Carter has complained that congressional strictures are an obstacle to executive action in such foreign and military matters.

Ford said Congress has gone too far.

'I believe that Congress has encroached much too far on the prerogatives of the executive ... to conduct foreign policy," the former Republican president told a news conference.

dent told a news conference.
"I hope that Congress will back off and give to the president as commander-in-chief a freer hand to do what is right for American foreign policy."

Ford also said that while he would strongly support a sound strategic arms limitation agreement that guarded U.S. interests, he does not think such a pact should be negotiated without consideration of Russian in-

# Government recalls diet meal bars

WASHINGTON (AP) — The federal government says it's recalling 14.1 million Carnation brand Breakfast Bars and Slender Diet Meal Bars because some may contain pieces of wire.

While some of the products may still be on store shelves, all of them have been reclaimed from warehouses, the company said. The Food and Drug Administration said Wednesday it had not confirmed the company's report and the recall was still in effect.

A spokesman for the Los Angeles-based company, George Wilkins, said, "We do not believe there is any significant health hazard."

He said the wires, "about a quarter-inch long and the thickness of a paper clip," apparently got into the processed bars through a contaminated shipment of raw material.

FDA spokesman Wayne Pines agreed that the wire "is not likely to cause adverse health

terventionism in Africa. He said such issues are interrelated.

Ford said the Carter administration must take a firm position "someplace in Africa" to deter Soviet and Cuban adventuring there. He said a harder line on the SALT negotiations would be one place to do it. And he said that if Moscow doesn't pull back in Africa, the United States may well have to declare that "SALT II is not a possibility."

Ford fended off questions about his political plans. While a new Louis Harris survey shows him leading Carter in a hypothetical rematch of their 1976 contest, Ford said he won't make a decision on 1980 candidacy for 12 to 18 months.

But he also said the polls indicate Carter "may have some problems" 'gaining renomination, and more trouble in the 1980 presidential election.

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
