The present wage scale at Highland General Hospital and the introduction of a new telephone system were the main topics discussed at a special meeting of the Board of Managers of Highland General Hospital and McLean Hospitals last night

Guy Hazlett, hospital administrator, presented a salary survey to the Board of Managers. The Survey compared the present salaries at the hospital with salaries across the state of Texas.

Hazlett said that according to the survey, the nursing service at the hospital, which has the most employees, is the farthest behind on the pay scale. Hazlett told the board that the hospital is beginning to lose its nursing services to other hospitals. "We

can't get anyone to apply for postitions." said Hazlett. He added that at the present time the nursing care is adequate. Hazlett made the

recommendation to the board that a change should be made in the nurses wages before the increase in minimum wage goes into effect on January 1 Hazlett added that many of

the smaller hospitals in this area are paying good wages for their Dr. M. C. Overton Jr., a member of the board, said that

the hospital is going to have to find a way to raise the nurses wages. Overton cited the example of a young nurse that had just started at a wage nine cents lower than a nurse that had been working there for 10 vears.

Overton said, "We're in desperate shape for more

personnel. If we get one girl out of a nursing class, we're doing great, because the pay is better elsewhere

Other doctors and members of the board also cited their concern for the present situation

Hazlett also told the board that a labor union for nurses had been formed in the panhandle area. and that there was already one instance of approximetely 250 nurses walking out. Hazlett said that his office had already ordered information to tell the employees about the other side

of the labor union. The board decided to study the situation and the recommendations that had been made, and table the discussion until the next regular meeting. A second item of interest on

last nights agenda dealt with introduction of a new telephone

according to Hazlett system for Highland General Hospital. The proposed new system was introduced to the board by Eli Anzaldua, a representative of Southwestern Bell from Amarillo.

Anzaldua pointed out that not many telephones can be added to the present system. Another major area of concern is inadequate access to the lines. With the present System many doctors are unable to get a line in or out of the hospital.

The present system is also in frequent need of repairs. Presently 15 trunks are available, but the new proposal recommends 30 trunks to solve the problem of getting adequate access to the lines.

Anzaldua said that the proposed new system would be a more flexible system with many repair calls being eliminated. If this system is adopted Anzaldua proposes that labor costs willalso be reduced by the elimination of one and possibly two operators. Hazlett said this could mean a maximum saving of \$26,000 a year.

Under the present system the hospital has approximately 120 patient telephones plus the phones that are needed for the administration. The hospital is presently paying approximately \$490 a month for the patient telephones and only about one half of them are being used

Over a one-year period the hospital would save \$4,966. and over a ten year period the savings would add up to \$46,303.60 The new system would have a first time installation charge of \$10,862 and Anzaldua said half the amount could be spread over the ten vear contract

Anzaldua said that after the ten year contract is completed the monthly charge will go down to \$1.862.

After the presentation by Anzaldua, a considerable amount of discussion centered around the expense of the first time installation charge.

Several members of the board felt that the installation charge was too high, and that the board should look at some other type of system. Discussion also centered around the number of trunks being proposed. Several board members felt that this number of trunks was in excess of what the hospital actually needed

Hazlett suggested that the hospital take a survey to find out how many patients whated a phone in their room. At the present time many of the patient phones are going unused and with a reduction in the number of phones being used, the hospital would be able to save some money on the present

Pioneer Natural seeks base rate price increase

Officials of 65 cities served by Pioneer Natural Gas Co. including Pampa and Panhandle, have been notified that the firm is applying for an increase in its base rate for gas service

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In his letter to the cities, K.B. Watson of Amarillo, company president, said, "As you are probably aware. Pioneer's last base rate increase became effective during 1970, based on recommendations of the company and a committee of city representatives

Watson continued by noting, "Since that time, in spite of the increased cost of gas to the consumer, the company's rate of return has decreased substantially due to many factors and an increase in the base rate is now essential.

The Pioneer official pointed out that the increase in the customer's cost of gas during the past several years has come about by the "cost-of-gas adjustment, an adjustment that is designed to pass the increased cost of gas in the field directly through to the consumer.

Watson continued, "Pioneer does not retain any of the increased cost of gas and does, in fact, fail to recover much of the increase because of several items not recovered in the cost-of-gas adjustment.

Pioneer has not specified the new rates needed in this initial request to the cities and said the application will be supplemented later.

The gas firm has retained H. Zinder and Associates Inc. utility consultants. The gas firm has retained H. Zinder and Aassociates Inc., utility consultants, to assist in the study currently being made to determine the appropriate amount of the deficiency in gas service revenue at Pioneer.

> In other action, the board voted to approve the payment of approximetely \$5,000 to the First National Bank, Hazlett said that during the first and third quarters of this month the hospital had been averaging approximetely \$6,700 a day. He added that their collections were down to \$871,000 and through yesterday the hospital had received \$141,000 in Medicare embursements for this month

The board also approved a capital expenditure of \$323.50 for the purchase of a slide file for the laboratory

Another item on the agenda dealt with a \$1,542.43 bad debt for McLean Hospital. When asked why this debt was showing up so late in the month Hazlett attributed it to "poor communications

The board approved a motion to turn the bad debts over to a collection agency with the exception of the people on the list that were known by members of the board. Those will be billed onefinal time, before they are turned over to a collection agency.

Hazlett also presented the board with \$427.81 bed medicaid debt at Highland hospital. He said that this debt can not be turned over to a collection agency, and made a motion that this be charged against the bad debt allowance in their budget. The board approved this motion. Hazlett said that the reson for

Resort owners in Canada are upset over the recent fishing flap between Canadian and United States officials. They say that American fishermen are canceling vacations because they think there is a sport fishing ban.

Sports fishing is a billion dollar industry in Canada, and more than a million Canadians yearly on lakes, streams and rivers.

These sportsmen spent \$900 million on goods and services and about one billion dollars on lodging, boats and other equipment. The anglers catch over 200 million fish per year.

Canadian and U. S. officials closed their waters to each other's commercial fishing boats in a dispute over an interim fishing treaty. But, the U. S. ban went further and included Canadian sports fishermen. Canada is trying to keep from involving the sports fishing.

If left to the people of both nations, it is doubtful there would ever have been a hassle over the issue. There are probably some in each country who would favor protectionism between the two neighbors. We believe the vast majority of North A merican people would favor uncomplicated trade between the people on both sides of the border.

There is little economic reason for the best of neighbors barriers of any kind. In fact both nations unnecessary fences?

are better served under trade without any political restrictions. Once started, trade regulations have a way of proliferating to the disadvantage of both parties. We have so much in common with our

neighbors to the north that it is a shame to let political restrictions start to hamper any commerce, social or economic, between us.

The people of both Canada and the United States have more reason to drop all barriers than to increase any now in force. If people and commerce could move as freely between the two nations as it does between our states and their provinces we would both gain far more than we would lose.

Our Coast Guard and their enforcement agencies have always cooperated in many ways to help each other in search amd rescue missions. It would be a great shame to pit them mow against each other over this fishing flap.

People in commerce have always been able to solve problems with each other to the advantage of both. It is only when the political regulators enter the picture that the witches' brew of argumentative anger begins to boil over.

Good neighbors do not need high fences erected between them. Why not begin to be the best of neighbors and do away with all unnecessary fences?

Incentive in a tax plan

MARTHA ANGLE AND ROBERT • WASHINGTON (NEA) — Conventional economists shudder at the mention of his name, but Rep. Jack Kemp, R-N. Y. is onto something.

At a time when most practitioners of the "dismal science" are fretting about the federal deficit and the inflationary potential of President Carter's modest tax cut, the former Buffalo Bills quarterback is going for the long bomb.

Jack Kemp wants to cut taxes. Not just a smidgen, as Jimmy Carter has proposed, but a whole lot. With Sen. William Roth R-Del., he is pushing for a 30 percent slash in personal income tax rates over the next three years.

Although it hasn't a prayer of passing, the Kemp-Roth tax bill is driving congressional Democrats up the wall not because they are sure it's ridiculous but because it just might work.

As Kemp reminds them at every opportunity, his plan is patterned after the enormously successful tax cuts that President John F. Kennedy intitiated in 1963.

Those across-the-board cuts, which reduced personal income tax rates nearly 20 percent, produced the highest real investment growth in modern history, the fastest growth of real disposable income. the biggest spurt in real industrial output — and the lowest inflation rate of recent times.

The Treasury Department expected the Kennedy tax cuts to mean a revenue loss of \$89 billion for the years 1963-68. Instead, they produced a \$54 billion increase in revenue for that period as a result of accelerated economic activity.

Economists can and do argue incessantly about the applicability of the Kennedy tax cut experience to today's conditions. But what is compelling about Kemp's approach is not the fiscal impact so much as the psychology involved.

"I am not an economist," the four-term congressman says, "but I understand human behavior and I'm an expert on incentives."

Ah yes — incentives. There lies the crux of the matter. Jack Kemp believes the existing tax structure insidiously penalizes traditional virtues of thrift, hard work and investment while rewarding consumption, debt and leisure.

Why work harder to gain morenominal income when you merely wind up in a higher tax bracket and the government gobbles up a larger share of you hard-earned salary? Why put money into a saving account at 5.5 percent interest when inflation of 7 percent leaves you with a net loss of purchasing power? Why buy stocks and bonds when you can invest in real estate on borrowed money. deducting the mortgage interest? "People don't work for pre-tax income, they work for take-home pay. Investors don't look for pre-tax profit, they worry about the net,"-Kemp says.

Unless tax rates are slashed significantly, inflation will continue to push wage-earners into even-higher tax brackets, he argues. "Even if nomianl income keeps pace with inflation, the government gets more than its share of the extra dollars.

Most audiences Kemp addresses have no trouble at all understanding his point, even if they find his arithmetic difficult to follow. Even workers who have received steady pay increases over the past few years, increases at least commensurate with the inflation rate, are discovering they have less money in terms of actual purchasing power than they started with. That is why the Kemp-Roth bill is not likely to go away. Republicns have already embraced it warmly, and it is gaining democratic adherents as well. Economists may argue forever about its fiscal feasibility, but it is the only tax plan on the table that addresses the incentive issue.

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

Consumer hotline

TWO FEDERAL agencies have combined efforts with a state agency in Colorado to establish a consumer hotline for reporting suspected antitrust activites. The Federal Trade Commission, the Justice Department and the state attorney general have formed a control troika to encourage informers. It is patterned after one in Pittsburg.

In addition to the hotline number (free to the informer) a pamphlet has been made available to explain antitrust laws. The chairman of the Federal Trade Commission said. "We want to remind people that these laws are there as a part of the basic fabric of protection for consumers. When businesses agree to control the market or price fix or rig bids. the consumer suffers."

Take a look at the Postal Service. No competition is tolerated in the handling of first class mail. So its customers are captive and the government does its own price fixing and decides the kind and amount of service it will give for the price fix.

Where government has entered the field

TWO FEDERAL agencies have of power generation and distribution, it is ombined efforts with a state agency in the same story.

At present it appears that governmental agencies are moving to control vital water supplies.

The government will not allow any competition in the issuing of a medium of exchange. Yet its handling of our coinage and currency has cost consumers billions. If a private company had a similar fiscal policy it would not be long until all the officers would be jailed.

Although he pays more to government than to any other organization he has no choice in price or kind of service and must participate to the exact extent decreed.

There is no hotline for customer complaints against this fromidable of all monopolies.

Encouraging free market

We read with delight the latest reports from Paris that Prime Minister Paul Barre is really going through with his plan to begin freeing the French economy from price controls and at the same time end government subsidies to inefficient enterprises both public and private.

Having skinned through the national elections in March. Mr. Barre announced his intentions to try free-market policies with more determination than at any time since 1945. In April, he freed up prices of goods produced by public enterprises. This week he has begun a three-month phasing out of controls on the private sector.

The political parties of the left are shrilly protesting this "social injustice" and everyone braces for unleashed "inflation." But the entire economy, left and right, will benefit as these government barriers to commerce are lifted. The only prices that will "rise" will be on those goods that were uneconomic to produce at controlled prices. Production, not inflation, is contained by price controls.

Just as impressive was Mr. Barre's willingness to let the Boussac textile empire go into bankruptcy rather than continue shoveling tax francs into that subsidy pit. "The era of unrestrained spending of public funds on enterprises whose management is unable to run them profitably is over." he says. The decision gives credibility to his earlier policy pronouncements that the government will indeed resist the passionate appeals of management and labor to finance operations that cannot compete on their own. Draining efficient enterprises of resources to subsidize the obsolete is a losing game for the entire economy, left and right.

It is nice to be able to commend Mr. Barre for these steps, especially since we have been critics of some of his earlier initiatives. But then, we had been criticizing him for doing just the opposite of what he now is doing. The Plan Barre, remember, was an austerity scheme to end inflation through higher taxes and price controls. At one point, in protesting taxes on capital gains, and we sided with what opinion polls showed to be the position of the French left.

The news from Paris then, is good. And, as the new approach develops, we trust. Mr. Barre will eliminate the taxes he imposed under his old plan.

How to be a wise dental consumer

Your money's worth"

If you are a typical American you probably will need the services of a dentist more frequently than those of a physician during your lifetime. For that reason, waiting to find a dentist until you are hit by a painful emergency can be an expensive stopgap and a poor substitute for regular checkups and a thorough program of preventive home care. How, then, can you choose a good

dentist?

Ask friends, neighbors, or co-workers for referral to dentists with whom they are pleased, advises Dr. Hal Gronlund of the American Dental Assn.'s Council on Dental Health and Health Planning. "Or call your local physician, pharmacist or hospitals with accredited dental services, for suggestions."

If you cannot get a personal referral, look in the yellow pages under "dentists" or "associations" for your own local dental society which will name qualified dentists near you. Or write the American Dental Assn., 211 E. Chicago Ave., Chicago, Ill. 60611, for information.

Weigh carefully: convenience of location, the dentist's appointment schedule, general appearance of office, dentist and staff, availability or provisional arrangements in case of emergency. Note whether the dentist takes — in the

absence of recent. usable X-rays from your former dentist — a set of X-rays, one of dentistry's most valuable diagnostic tools, gets a record of your medical and dental history, including allergies and past illnesses, thoroughly examines your teeth and supporting structures before initiating treatment.

Check for these indicators: (a) a good dentist will always show concern for your personal comfort; (b) if you are of reproductive age, you will be given a lead apron to wear while X-rays are being taken; (c) prescribed medications and drugs will be carefully explained; (d) alternate methods of treatment will be explained; (e) provisions for emergency care will be available; (f) you will be told how you will feel after a treatment session so you can plan your appointments (no romantic date on the day of oral surgery). Check when and what you may eat.

Don't be alarmed if your dentist refers you to a specialist for some phase of treatment — orthodontic care, root canal therapy. periodontal treatment, children's very special problems.

Be sure your dentist's personality makes you feel comfortable and secure. You should be able to communicate with ease.

Never hesitate to dicuss fees, both for immediate work and future treatment. Many dentists want you to open the discussion of fees and payment plans in advance of treatment, and will be cooperative in structuring payment schedules you can meet. Ask about the cost of treatment before you begin. Have your dentist explain treatment options open to you.

Ask for a bill itemizing services, rather than one marked "for services rendered." Computerized billing is error-prone, so if you suspect an incorrect charge, question your dentist.

If you hold some form of dental insurance, check in advance which services will be covered, which won't be, what percentage of your fee will be paid by the policy. If insurance is involved, take the essential documents with you.

Don't cut corners, for in terms of oral health. initially high expenditures can easily turn out cheaper in the long run. A simple extraction, for instance, can cause more problems and eventual dental work than having the tooth saved through marginally more expensive root canal therapy. Beware of so-called bargains in dental care. Avoid cutrate opportunities and assembly-line dental operations.

Always question the need for extractioneven when wisdom teeth are involved. Ask about treatment options for saving the tooth, and seek a second opinion if you are unsure.

If you have reason to believe a dentist has performed inadequately or irresponsibly, talk and try to work out a mutually agreeable solution. If this measure fails, contact your local dental society "peer review committees."

As a final caution, protect your teeth by dutiful preventive care — regular checkups, proper brushing and flossing, proper diet and oral hygiene. Your teeth were meant to last a lifetime.!

But in what could turn out to be a development of special significance, foreign money is increasingly buying parts of the U.S. itself.

According to one estimate by a realtor in California, an area of prime interest for land purchases, as much as 20 percent of all farmland currently changing hands may be going to foreign buyers.

The precise level cannot be determined because the new ownership in many cases is concealed, purchases having been arranged through trusts, banks, offshore companies and other intermediaries. But one such agent, a Belgian company cited in a New York Times survey of the situation, put European investment in U.S. farmland at \$800 million last year alone.

And a Midwestern brokerage and land management firm admits having sold some \$70 million in real estate to non—Americans during the past four years.

New money is usually welcome in an economy, but there can be misgivings when it involves actual physical possession by foreigners — as U.S. interests learned repeatedly in years past when internationalization of business usually meant buying in by Americans.

At present 20 states have laws either barring or restricting ownership of land by nonresident aliens. Such laws can be gotten around, however, and there could be a question as to their constitutionality.

While the trend may be disquieting, it is not likely to reach the point where Americans are threatened with having their entire country bought out from under them.

It does have an immediate disadvantage in that the money non—Americans are willing to drop into U.S. real estate is driving prices in some areas beyond the reach of the home folks.

life or simply warding off disaster. When you know what the options are when a problem exists-or if you know where to find or create the optionsyou then know how to cope. And this knowledge increases your independence, your self-

reliance, and your confidence. In taking greater responsibility for your life, you need to be able to distinguish between things that can be changed and things that cannot be changed. You can change a lot about yourself-you can lose weight, quit smoking, move to a new place, or change jobs. You also can change some of the conditions in the world about you. But you can't change the fact that the world about you will change-that friends and relatives will die, move away, grow up. Institutions also will change as people change.

Coping also requires the ability to be realistic-to see things as they-are, not as you think they should be. For example, many marital conflicts stem from one partner's idealistic view of what he or she thinks marriage should be-or what the other spouse should be. Many of these conflicts could be resolved if each partner would listen to the other, try to -find out who the other person is, and decide jointly how each person's needs can best be met. This is equally true of other interpersonal relationships

When you say "I can't cope," what you may really mean is "I won't cope." For you do have the capacity to learn how to cope with problems whether they deal with finances, family, work, the household, or any of a numto present unjust ber of problems that deal with people relationships. 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

DEAR DR. LAMB - I had a heart attack a year and a half ago and the doctor said I didn't need any surgery but'I have weight problems and lung congestion. I weigh 186 pounds and am 66 years old. don't smoke or drink. I take Slow K, Lasix and Lanoxin. Will I ever be able to recover completely? How come my heart controls the fluids coming out of my body? My ankles swell up and I get short of breath also

DEAR READER - Often the weight gain a person has with heart failure is associated with the accumulation of fluid. And it does accumulate in the ankles and can accumulate in the abdomen. or it can accumulate in the lungs and chest cavity.

The mechanism of fluid retention and swelling is relatively complex but when a person has heart failure he tends to retain salt in the body. That's why you are taking Lasix to help to eliminate the excess sodium salt. With salt an excess amount of water is retained, which increases the amount of water in the circulatory system. This causes water to literally leak out of the circulation into the tissue spac-

To explain this in somewhat more detail, I am sending you The Health Letter number, 11-6, Swelling: Causes and Managements. This issue will also give you information on the type of swelling that occurs with injuries and sprains and how they should be treated, as well as the basic concepts of how fluid accumulates in the body. Other readers who are interested in information about swellings can send 50 cents with a long, stamped, self-addressed envelope for this issue to me in care of

this newspaper, P.O. Box 326, San Antonio, TX 78292. When the fluid accumulation is due to heart failure the best approach is to try to correct the heart condition if at all possible. That's also why you are getting Lanoxin, which is a digitalis preparation to strengthen the contractions of the heart mus-

It's difficult to say what you can expect from your future condition but whatever you can do to help gradually reduce your weight will probably help

you. That means limiting your total calorie intake and limiting particularly your fat and cholesterol intake. I suspect your doctors have already asked you to limit foods that contain sodium salt. Anybody taking diuretics or water medications such as Lasix often

needs to replace potassium. That's why you're getting Slow K. To give you more information on the importance of the balance between sodium and potassium I am also sending you The Health Letter number 10-12, Salt: Your Vital Sodium and Potassium Balance. DEAR DR. LAMB - Is

By GEORGE W. CORNELL AP Religion Writer When the world peered into

the tiny town of Plains, Ga.; its close, intertwined but strained fabric frayed and broke. "A wall went up," says the Rev. Fred Collins. "Plains was fragmented.

That breach in the little. southern hometown of President Carter, population 680, seems gradually to be starting to mend, ministers there say, but only slowly and marks of the division remain.

"It takes time for the wounds to heal, but something like that is beginning to happen," says the Rev. Don Wilson, pastor of the Plains Baptist Church, to which Carter's family had belonged and which split because of antagonisms brought to a head over racial policies.

"It takes a long time to get over it completely," Wilson adds. "But things are moving along pretty good. Some of the folks left and founded another church. We're plugging along, too.

Those who left in late 1976 formed the Maranatha Baptist Church, and after meeting for more than a year in a Lutheran church four miles away, it this week began constructing its own building in Plains.

The structure, to be finished in four or five months, will be of brick, colonial-style architecture.

'Some' progress has been made in respect to the differences, but it's a deep thing," says Collins, the new church's pastor for the last year. "Some hurt feelings and bitterness remain, but it's getting better as time goes by. Compared to a year ago, you wouldn't believe how deep the hurt was thn."

What caused that rupture in church and community? Both pastors in telephone interviews maintained that the question of admitting blacks was not the fundamental cause, but only a surface catalyst that triggered other long-time frictions and iealousies.

"It was like a dead stick of dynamite just waiting for a cap to detonate it," Collins said, with the race issue being the firing cap. "It was not the big thing that divided the church. It only provided the tangible thing over which to take sides."

thing." He generalized that "personality clashes" over a

long period were behind it. Neither church has yet admitted a black to membership, and both say none has applied since the break, which came after a black minister. Clennon King, who lives 40 miles away in Albany, Ga., was refused admission to the Plains Church in the fall of 1976.

It now has a "watch care" committee to determine eligibility for membership. Would being black be an obstacle? "I'd hope not," Wilsonesaid. "It's something the church hasn't had to face.

At the new Maranatha church. Collins said race definitely was no barrier. "The doors are open to any person," he said, pointing out that the congregation has formally affirmed that "open door" policy.

"We only found out about it by a chance phone call. They say we failed to comply with a 1975 Supreme Court decision which resulted in a set of guidelines for bilingual education.' Bednar said the TEA had been negotiating with the Office of Civil Rights for two years on Texas' bilingual program "and they have continually delayed or not gotten back to us on our proposals. Now they turn around and say we are not in compliance. Bednar said the state first turned in a bilingual plan in October 1977 and received word that it was fine with some minor changes. However, in March the revised plan was ruled deficient. The attorney said he thought the money holdup was "an arm-twisting game" by federal education officials. "They want school districts to admit they have discriminated and get better position in the suit against the state which is scheduled in November," he said.







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
